old trespasser, suffered from dementia and wandered onto the mine property as he	was
taking a walk near his home. As he walked along a haul road he got stuck in mud up	p to
his knees and fell backwards. The temperature overnight dropped considerably and	l
was not able to stand up. The next morning family members reported him	n
missing and discovered his body later in the day.	

The death certificate indicated that his death was accidental and was due to hypothermia. An autopsy was performed and also indicated that the cause of death was hypothermia. The MSHA investigation found that signage was posted to keep trespassers from entering the mine site and no hazards were found during an inspection of the area.

Based on the death certificate, the autopsy report and the MSHA investigation, the committee members concluded that died as a result of an accident. He was not authorized to be on the property and was not performing mining related activity at the time of his death. The committee members determined that his death should not be charged to the mining industry.
