In a unanimous d	ecision, the Fatality Review Committee has determined that the death
of	should not be charged to the mining industry.
a 40 year old cont	ractor millwright, was walking down an incline while threading a
cable in a conveyo	or system when he collapsed. CPR was administered by co-workers
but he was prono	unced dead at the scene by an ambulance flight crew.
was on his first da	y of work at this mine site. His duties as a millwright included
installing conveyo	or systems. The mine was at an elevation of 10,000 feet.

The coroner's report listed the cause of death as atherosclerotic cardiovascular disease and hypertension with a lack of acclimation to altitude as a possible contributing factor. The coroner also noted obesity and probable hyperlipidemia among other significant conditions. The death certificate indicated that the cause of death was natural and due to an altitude-induced fatal cardiac arrhythmia and coronary artery atherosclerosis.

Based on the findings of the coroner's report and death certificate the committee members concluded that died from natural causes and that his death should not be charged to the mining industry.
