the brakes on the forklift.	became pinned between the scrap vehicle and
the steering wheel of the trace	tor. He was declared dead at the scene.

The death certificate indicated that the manner of death was accidental and due to exsanguination (loss of blood) due to a lacerated liver from a motor vehicle accident. The toxicology screen for drugs and alcohol was negative.

The members of the committee determined that was not performing mine related work activities and that his death was not caused by mine activities or equipment. They concluded that his death should not be charged to the mining industry.
