I have reviewed the investigative report in the death of **sector and the sector and a 50 year old** determined it should not be charged to the mining industry. **Sector and a 50 year old** contract laborer, complained to a co-worker of heartburn and nausea. Later in the shift he told the same co-worker that he needed to throw up and that he needed water. The two employees walked to a vacuum truck location. The deceased said his chest hurt and he was having trouble breathing. **Sector and** drank some water and took an antacid. He began vomiting and coughing. A few minutes later, he vomited again and collapsed, striking a nearby man basket. Co-workers went to his aid and first responders were summoned. He was loaded into the bed of a pickup truck and CPR was performed while he was taken to an Air Evac Helicopter station just outside the mine gate. He was transported to a local medical facility, where he was pronounced dead.

Death Certificate Released: June 27, 2016

The autopsy report indicated that the cause of death was arteriosclerotic cardiovascular disease and that the manner of death was natural. MSHA's investigation did not identify any environmental or physical factors that could have contributed to the death.

Based on the autopsy report and MSHA's investigation, I have determined that the death of **Sectors** was not due to mine related work activities and should not be charged to the mining industry.
