I have reviewed the investigative report in the death of determined it should not be charged to the mining industry. A 44 year old survey supervisor, was surveying stockpiles with another employee. Due to cold weather conditions, the employees were alternating work activities to permit one surveyor to warm-up in a pickup truck while the other was surveying. When the deceased failed to return to the truck, his co-worker drove around the stockpile to look for him. He found lying on the ground, face up with the survey pole lying across his chest. He was unresponsive. Mine employees performed CPR until EMS arrived but he was pronounced dead at the scene.

An autopsy was performed and the medical examiner's opinion was that death was due to atherosclerotic and hypertensive cardiovascular disease. The death certificate listed the cause of death as cardiac arrest due to atherosclerotic and hypertensive cardiovascular disease. MSHA's investigation did not identify any physical or environmental factors that could have contributed to the death.

Based on the medical examiner's report, the death certificate and MSHA's investigation, I have determined that the death of was not due to mine related work activities and should not be charged to the mining industry.
