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- 1 PROCEEDINGS
- 3 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 4 Good morning.
- 5 MR. MILLER:
- 6 Good morning.
- 7 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 8 My name is Bob Wilson. We're here this
- 9 morning with Wayne Miller, from the Office of Miners'
- 10 Health, Safety and Training. I'm with the Office of
- 11 the Solicitor, United States Department of Labor.
- 12 With me is Jasey Maggard, an accident investigator
- with the Mine Safety and Health Administration. Also
- 14 present are several individuals from the State of West
- 15 Virginia. I'll ask that they identify themselves for
- 16 the record.
- 17 MR. BECK:
- 18 I'm Jim Beck, I work for Davitt McAteer
- on the independent team.
- 20 MR. FARLEY:
- 21 I'm Terry Farley with the West Virginia's
- 22 Office of Miners' Health, Safety and Training.
- 23 MR. O'BRIEN:
- 24 John O'Brien with the Office of Miners'
- 25 Health, Safety and Training.

- 1 MS. MONFORTON:
- 2 Celeste Monforton with Davitt McAteer's
- 3 independent team.
- 4 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 5 There are also several other members of
- 6 the investigation teams present in the room here
- 7 today. All members of the Mine Safety and Health
- 8 Administration Accident Investigation Team, and all
- 9 members of the State of West Virginia Accident
- 10 Investigation Team participating in the investigation
- of the Upper Big Branch Mine explosion, shall keep
- 12 confidential all information that is gathered from
- each witness who voluntarily provides a statement,
- until the witness statements are officially released.
- MSHA and the State of West Virginia shall keep this
- information confidential, so that other ongoing
- 17 enforcement activities are not prejudiced or
- jeopardized by a premature release of information.
- 19 This confidentiality requirement shall not preclude
- 20 investigation team members from sharing information
- 21 with each other, or with other law enforcement
- officials. Everyone's participation in this interview
- 23 constitutes their agreement to keep information
- 24 confidential.
- 25 Mr. Miller, government investigators and

- 1 specialists have been assigned to investigate the
- 2 conditions, the events and circumstances surrounding
- 3 the fatalities that occurred at the Upper Big Branch
- 4 Mine on April 5th, 2010. The investigation is being
- 5 conducted by the Mine Safety and Health Administration
- 6 pursuant to Section 103(a) of the Federal Mine Safety
- 7 and Health Act, and by the West Virginia Office of
- 8 Miners' Health, Safety and Training. And we all
- 9 appreciate your assistance in this investigation.
- 10 After the investigation is complete, MSHA
- 11 will issue a public report detailing the nature and
- the causes of the fatalities, in the hope that greater
- awareness about the causes of accidents can reduce
- their occurrence in the future. Information obtained
- through witness interviews is frequently contained in
- these reports. You should know that if you request
- 17 confidentiality, confidentiality will only be granted
- on a case-by-case basis. Your statement may also be
- 19 used in other enforcement proceedings. You may have a
- 20 personal representative with you present during the
- 21 taking of your statement, and you may consult with a
- representative at any time. Do you have a
- representative with you today?
- 24 MR. MILLER:
- 25 No.

- 1 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 2 You may refuse to answer any question,
- and you may request a break at any time. A court
- 4 reporter will record your interview. Please speak
- 5 loudly and clearly. If you do not understand the
- 6 question asked, please ask that the question be
- 7 rephrased. Please answer each question as fully as
- 8 you can, including any information you have learned
- 9 from someone else.
- 10 Again, I would like to thank you in
- 11 advance for your appearance here today. We appreciate
- 12 your assistance in this investigation. Your
- cooperation is critical in making the nation's mines
- 14 safer.
- 15 After we have finished asking questions,
- 16 you will have an opportunity to make a statement and
- 17 provide us with any additional information that you
- believe to be important. If at any time after the
- 19 interview you recall any additional information that
- 20 you believe to be relevant to the investigation,
- 21 please contact either Norman Page at the number in the
- letter provided to you or Terry Farley with the State.
- 23 At this time I would ask that the court reporter swear
- in the witness.

- 1 WAYNE MILLER, HAVING FIRST BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED
- 2 AS FOLLOWS:
- 3 -----
- 4 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 5 All right. At this time, I'll turn it
- 6 over to Terry Farley.
- 7 EXAMINATION
- 8 BY MR. FARLEY:
- 9 Q. Good morning, Mr. Miller, how are you?
- 10 A. Good.
- 11 Q. Would you please begin with your name, home
- 12 address and phone number, please?
- 13 A. Hubert Wayne Miller, (b) (7)(C)
- 14 (b) (7)(C)
- 15 Q. Okay. Thank you. How long have you worked for
- the West Virginia Office of Miners' Health, Safety and
- 17 Training?
- 18 A. About five and a half years.
- 19 Q. Okay. What's your current position with Miners'
- 20 Health, Safety and Training?
- 21 A. Electrical inspector.
- Q. Okay. Did you start as an electrical inspector?
- 23 A. No.
- Q. Okay. When did you become an electrical
- 25 inspector?

- 1 A. January 1st of 2005?
- Q. Okay. And you work out of our Oak Hill office; is
- 3 that correct?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 Q. Okay. Who's your immediate supervisor?
- 6 A. Steve Snyder.
- 7 Q. Okay. What's your total number of years that
- 8 you've worked in the coal mining industry?
- 9 A. A little over 40.
- 10 Q. A little over 40. Must have started young. Do
- 11 you mind telling us where you were before you came to
- 12 Miners' Health, Safety and Training?
- 13 A. Started out at Eunice Mines for Bethlehem Steel.
- 14 Went to Harris Mines for Eastern, worked at ---.
- Q. This would have been my guess back in the '70s?
- 16 A. Yeah.
- 17 Q. Okay.
- 18 A. And then worked for Armco Steel, which later
- 19 became Eastern, which became Peabody. And I've done
- 20 some work as a directional driller underground.
- 21 Q. Okay. All right. Have you had any specialized
- training relating to the type of work you do?
- 23 A. Other than just ---?
- Q. Engineering, electrical matters, anything like
- 25 that?

- 1 A. No.
- Q. Okay. Do you possess a West Virginia coal miner
- 3 electrician's certification?
- 4 A. Yes.
- 5 Q. Okay. How long have you had that certification?
- 6 A. Since '73.
- 7 Q. Okay. Do you possess West Virginia underground
- 8 mine foreman fire boss papers?
- 9 A. Yes.
- 10 Q. Are you currently assigned to inspect the Upper
- 11 Big Branch Mine?
- 12 A. Currently? No.
- Q. Okay. Is it, to your knowledge, the Office of
- 14 Miners' Health, Safety and Training policy and
- 15 practice to do electrical inspections at all
- underground mines at least once a year?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. Okay. When did you first inspect at the Upper Big
- 19 Branch Mine?
- 20 A. I would say '06.
- 21 Q. 2006?
- 22 A. Yeah.
- 23 Q. What type of an inspection did you do at that
- 24 time?
- 25 A. Electrical.

- 1 Q. Okay. Now, that being about what, four years ago?
- 2 A. Uh-huh (yes).
- Q. Is there anything particularly significant about
- 4 that inspection from four years ago that we might need
- 5 to know?
- 6 A. No.
- 7 Q. Okay. Was it your typical electrical inspection?
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 Q. Now, just maybe in general terms, how do you
- 10 typically go about an underground electrical
- 11 inspection?
- 12 A. As to like where I start?
- 13 Q. Yes. Just a general idea as to how you proceed.
- 14 A. I will usually try to start on one end of the
- mine, to the other, so I can keep in order what I'm
- doing and work my way to the other end.
- Q. Okay. Now, when is the most recent inspection you
- made at the Upper Big Branch Mine?
- 19 A. I finished up at December of '09, and went back
- one day about January the 3rd or 4th, to abate
- violations and show the next inspector what I had done
- and what he can pick up.
- Q. Okay. Now, did you perform a complete electrical
- inspection of the mine at this time?
- 25 A. No.

- 1 Q. Okay. When did you actually start this inspection
- 2 that you just referred to?
- 3 A. Probably late November.
- 4 Q. Late November, okay. November of 2009?
- 5 A. Yes.
- 6 Q. Okay. Do you recall how many Notices of Violation
- 7 you may have cited during that inspection?
- 8 A. No.
- 9 Q. Would you like to look at your inspection
- 10 report ---
- 11 A. Yeah.
- 12 Q. --- for that time, just to refresh your memory if
- 13 need be?
- 14 MR. FARLEY:
- 15 I've handed him a copy of his inspection
- report dated 12/30/2009, which provides some summary
- and encompasses Notices of Violation that he issued
- 18 during that inspection. Also, there's a copy of the
- inspection report dated January 5, 2010, which has
- some minor information about the same inspection.
- 21 BY MR. FARLEY:
- Q. Now, if I understood you correctly, you didn't do
- a complete electrical inspection at this time?
- 24 A. No.
- Q. And why is that?

- 1 A. Randy Smith was assigned this mine and he started
- 2 the inspection, and he was moved to the assistant
- 3 inspector-at-large position out at Oak Hill, and he
- 4 didn't get to complete his assignments.
- 5 Q. Okay. So do you recall how many --- approximately
- 6 how many inspection days you sent there during the
- 7 month of December of 2009?
- 8 A. No. I've got nine here, but I don't know how many
- 9 of them were in December.
- 10 Q. Okay. All right. Now, at the time of this
- inspection, when you took over for Randy Smith, before
- 12 entering the mine, did you review any of the mine
- 13 examination books?
- 14 A. The electrical books.
- 15 Q. Okay. Meaning the books that the mine operator
- 16 completes, referring to the mine equipment?
- 17 A. Mine equipment, yes. Electrical inspections.
- 18 Q. Okay. Now, when you entered the mine in general,
- 19 did the conditions in the mine correspond or were they
- 20 consistent --- the conditions of the equipment, I
- should say, did they correspond or were they
- 22 consistent with what you read in the examination books
- 23 before you started?
- 24 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Now, maybe if you referred to the map here,

- do you recall --- now what you have in front of you is
- a map of the general area of where the explosion
- 3 occurred.
- 4 A. Uh-huh (yes).
- 5 Q. Now, on the wall in front of you is a map --- a
- 6 smaller scale map of the entire mine. Feel free to
- 7 refer to either one. I think there's even a laser
- 8 pointer here if you would like to use it. Or you can
- 9 stand and point if you like. Do you recall how many
- of their underground sections were operating at that
- 11 time in December?
- 12 A. The best I remember, what they called at that time
- 13 Number Four section, which was back ---.
- 14 Q. You can use the pointer if you like.
- 15 A. Yeah. I got to remember where that is, because I
- 16 didn't actually go there. But it is back off of the
- 17 left side here --- why ain't my pointer working. I'm
- not sure exactly, but it was maybe this one.
- 19 Q. Okay. Now ---.
- 20 A. And I didn't go to that section, but that was one
- of the sections working.
- 22 Q. Now, can you be a little more specific on where
- 23 you're pointing to?
- A. That is what, 78 Break; right? And ---.
- Q. Okay. Would it be just outby the existing

- 1 longwall panel there or the active longwall panel?
- 2 A. Yes, but I'm rethinking my thoughts now. I think
- 3 Number Four section was in here. I'm not sure.
- 4 Q. Okay. Well, now we say in here, can you be more
- 5 specific, please?
- 6 A. I know it was off of this panel over here on the
- 7 left, but I'm not exactly sure where. I didn't go to
- 8 that section because Randy Smith had already made it.
- 9 Q. Okay. Now, that would appear to be crosscut 55
- 10 coming from the Ellis Portal, Ellis switch?
- 11 A. I suppose.
- 12 Q. Okay.
- 13 A. That section was running, and the number --- what
- 14 did they call it? Number Three section, which is on
- the south side of the mine, was working.
- 16 Q. Okay. When you say south side, would that be
- 17 closer to the main UBB Portal at Montcoal?
- 18 A. Yeah. This is the north side, and the south side
- is on the other portal.
- 20 Q. Okay. Was 22 Headgate section operational at that
- 21 time?
- 22 A. No.
- 23 Q. Okay.
- 24 A. They had their equipment up there, but they had
- some water and ventilation problems at 22. They call

- 1 that Two section at that time.
- Q. Okay.
- 3 A. One and Two and the longwall were idle.
- 4 Q. Okay. Now, do you recall where and how you
- 5 entered the mine first? Did you enter at the UBB main
- 6 portal?
- 7 A. Main portal.
- 8 Q. Okay. Now, in your inspection report, I think you
- 9 show a Notice of Violation issued on December the
- 10 30th, 2009 there. You apparently cited the company
- for not providing transportation to enter the mine?
- 12 A. Uh-huh (yes).
- 13 O. Is that correct?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. All right. Can you elaborate on that violation a
- 16 little bit, what led you to cite that violation?
- 17 A. It's a long story, but I was having trouble
- 18 getting in the mines everyday. And I understand that
- 19 you have to limit the number of mantrips, but I
- 20 finally told them that I was going to be in the mine
- 21 by 9:00. The mantrip we usually took in was the one
- the chief on the midnight brought out. And I felt
- 23 that would give him --- he could be out here by 7:30,
- 24 which allowed him enough to do his normal duties and
- give him an hour to charge, even if it's a little

- 1 extra. And I told him I went underground by nine
- 2 o'clock.
- Q. Okay.
- 4 A. And this particular day, it was a little after
- 5 9:00, and I was going to be forgiving with him, and a
- federal inspector came up, and asked where the
- 7 superintendent was, and they said, well, he's
- 8 underground. And I said, well, if he's underground
- 9 why don't I have a ride? Because I'd already asked
- 10 for one. So I issued the citation.
- 11 Q. Okay. Now, I assume that violation was abated, I
- 12 presume?
- 13 A. Yes. Uh-huh (yes).
- 14 Q. Okay. Now, having asked that question, during
- 15 your inspection there in December of 2009, did any
- 16 employee of the UBB Mine or Performance Coal Company
- 17 at any time attempt to impede your inspection?
- 18 A. I don't know exactly how to answer that. The
- 19 president at one time directed the men that were
- 20 transporting me in another direction. He had a
- 21 longwall belt down, and we were on our way to the ---
- 22 probably Number Two section, and told him to go get
- 23 that belt started.
- Q. Okay. Now, how much did that delay you in where
- 25 you were intending to go?

- 1 A. Maybe 20 minutes at the most.
- Q. Okay. Did you by chance address it with him, or
- 3 anyone in management?
- 4 A. I didn't at that time, no.
- 5 Q. Okay. Now, feel free to use your inspection
- 6 report there.
- 7 A. Okay.
- 8 Q. What part of the mine did you actually inspect
- 9 during this period of time?
- 10 A. What is now called number 22 Headgate. Yeah.
- 11 Which is right here (indicating). They called that
- 12 Number Two section at the time.
- Q. Okay. And where were the workings for 22 Headgate
- 14 at that time?
- 15 A. Not very far. Probably maybe up in here
- 16 (indicating).
- 17 Q. Meaning about half the distance we currently see
- on the map, inby the location where the panel turns
- 19 off?
- 20 A. Yes.
- 21 Q. Okay. Is that fair?
- 22 A. Yes.
- 23 Q. Okay.
- A. And I made that complete section of equipment.
- 25 And up the North Mains. All they had up there was a

- distribution box and one pump. And this construction
- area here, they had scoops and chargers.
- Q. I think you're pointing to what we're now --- most
- folks are referring to as the Eight North section?
- 5 A. Yeah. I think.
- 6 Q. Am I correct.
- 7 A. Uh-huh (yes). They called it North Mains at that
- 8 time.
- 9 Q. Okay. But the section was not active at the time?
- 10 A. No.
- 11 Q. Not actively producing?
- 12 A. Didn't have anything up there, any equipment other
- than one pump and an electrical distribution box.
- 14 Q. Where was the pump located up there?
- 15 A. The best I remember, about in here. This area
- 16 right here (indicating).
- 17 MR. MAGGARD:
- 18 We've got that set area here in a larger
- 19 version. It might be easier for the witness to ---.
- 20 MR. FARLEY:
- 21 Okay.
- BY MR. FARLEY:
- Q. Why don't you mark the map for us ---
- 24 A. Okay.
- 25 Q. --- rather than trying to explain it?

- 1 A. Let's see here, they had --- now, the best I
- 2 remember, this pump was over in here. It may have
- 3 been --- that's just the best I remember. The
- 4 distribution box was about right here somewhere
- 5 (indicating). And that's all they had up there as far
- 6 as electrical equipment.
- 7 Q. Okay. Why don't you write up here pump. Make a
- 8 notation n on the map to what you're referring to
- 9 there.
- 10 WITNESS COMPLIES
- 11 A. And I'll say I'm going to try this right here.
- 12 BY MR. FARLEY:
- 13 Q. Okay. Let's start with Eight North here and work
- our way back; okay? While you were in this area now
- 15 known as Eight North, did you --- were you in here,
- where the faces are now located, or where the faces
- 17 were located at that time?
- 18 A. No.
- 19 Q. Okay. Did you take any methane readings in that
- 20 area up there?
- 21 A. Yes. I don't know that I took my spotter out, but
- I kept my spotter on at all times, and it stays on.
- Q. Okay. Do you recall that it alerted you to any
- 24 methane content whatsoever?
- 25 A. No, it did not.

- 1 Q. Okay. Now, outby the location where the
- distribution box is, the map reflects that there's a
- gas welled area, in a block, which is, according to
- 4 --- as the map reflects about probably 200 by 200.
- 5 A. Uh-huh (yes).
- 6 Q. Did you travel in the vicinity of that block?
- 7 A. No.
- 8 Q. Okay. And your methane detector did not indicate
- 9 you had any methane in that area?
- 10 A. No.
- 11 Q. Okay. All right. Did you find any problems with
- the pump, and/or the distribution box during your
- inspection up there?
- 14 A. With the pump, it had a breaker in it, which was
- too large for the size pump.
- 16 Q. Okay. Is that something you cited?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. Okay. Was it abated?
- 19 A. Yes.
- 20 Q. Okay. Now, I think you inspected what's now
- 21 called the 22 Headgate section?
- 22 A. Uh-huh (yes).
- 23 Q. Did you examine each piece of section equipment
- 24 or ---?
- 25 A. Yes.

- 1 Q. Okay. Did you specifically check the continuous
- 2 mining machine?
- 3 A. Yes.
- 4 Q. Okay. Did you happen to test or inspect the
- 5 methane monitor on the continuous mining machine?
- 6 A. No.
- 7 Q. Okay. Did you see the mining machine in
- 8 operation?
- 9 A. No. It wasn't running.
- 10 Q. Okay. Was it an idle day?
- 11 A. Well, that's more of the trouble they had over the
- ventilation. They wouldn't run that section either.
- 13 Q. Okay. And when you say trouble with the
- 14 ventilation ---?
- 15 A. As I was explaining, they had water, somewhere
- behind the longwall, was messing the ventilation up.
- 17 They weren't running their longwall Number One
- section, which was now, I guess, Headgate 21, and the
- 19 22 Headgate section.
- 20 Q. Okay. Now, this explanation, who did that come
- 21 from?
- 22 A. Management.
- 23 Q. Okay. Were you, at any time, in the area where
- this problem was said to have existed?
- 25 A. No. No.

- 1 Q. Okay. Did this require any evacuation of the
- 2 mine?
- 3 A. No.
- 4 Q. Okay.
- 5 A. They did mention ventilation changes. Some days I
- 6 was there that required evacuations.
- 7 Q. Okay.
- 8 A. I know on one particular day I went down there and
- 9 they didn't have anyone underground, they was making
- 10 ventilation changes.
- 11 Q. Okay.
- 12 A. Rather than the people making the changes.
- 13 Q. Do you recall the particular day. If you reviewed
- 14 your inspection report, can you tell us when that day
- 15 might have been?
- 16 A. Later in December.
- 17 Q. Later in December?
- 18 A. Yes, sir.
- 19 Q. Okay. After Christmas?
- 20 A. Probably after Christmas, yeah.
- Q. Okay. While you were there, did you develop any
- 22 understanding of the Upper Big Branch Mine shift
- 23 schedule; how they operated?
- A. No. But I knew what starting times and quitting
- times were on the dayshift.

- 1 Q. Can you look and maybe --- can you tell us when?
- 2 A. I think the dayshift started at 7:00 and ended at
- 3 3:00.
- 4 Q. Okay.
- 5 A. And that's really the only shift I worked, while I
- 6 was there, so that's the only one I was interested in.
- 7 Q. Okay. Was the section now known as 22 Headgate
- 8 the only coal-producing --- as you said, it wasn't
- 9 producing at the time. Was that the only active
- 10 working section that you inspected during this ---
- 11 A. Yeah.
- 12 Q. --- December 2009 inspection?
- 13 A. Yes.
- 14 Q. Okay. Did you develop any understanding of what
- 15 the makeup of that section crew was? I mean, I quess
- 16 where I'm going with that question is, did it appear
- to you that any one person might have been assigned
- 18 the duties of seeing to the ventilation, like a
- 19 ventilation man, or ventilation person?
- 20 A. No, I don't know.
- Q. Okay. Do you know if they rotated shifts?
- 22 A. As far as I know, they did not.
- Q. Okay. Now, was the continuous mining machine on
- 24 the 22 Headgate section the only mining --- continuous
- 25 mining machine that you inspected while you were

- 1 there?
- 2 A. Yes, but I was thinking there were two miners on
- 3 that section.
- 4 Q. Okay.
- 5 A. Yes.
- 6 Q. Did you happen to inspect both of them?
- 7 A. Yes.
- 8 Q. But you didn't check the methane monitor on
- 9 either; ---
- 10 A. No.
- 11 Q. --- is that correct? While you were outside the
- 12 mine, did you pay any particular attention to the mine
- bulletin boards in and around the mine office?
- 14 A. I don't know that I paid particular attention, but
- 15 I noticed them as I go by.
- 16 Q. Okay. Did you ever notice any signs or letters or
- memorandums that might have been addressed to
- 18 employees at Upper Big Branch or Performance Coal
- 19 Company, or employees of the mine that offered any
- 20 remarks such as vacation would be canceled if
- 21 production does not improve? Something like that?
- 22 A. Yes. I don't know where I saw it at, but it was a
- letter from the president. I don't remember how it
- was stated, but more or less if things didn't pick up,
- 25 they wouldn't need the people there.

- 1 Q. Okay. Do you recall the president's name who
- 2 might have ---?
- 3 A. Yeah. Chris Blanchard.
- 4 Q. Okay. Now, was this memorandum, or letter, or
- 5 sign, did it have a signature?
- 6 A. I don't recall.
- 7 Q. Okay. But you would have seen that in sometime in
- 8 December; is that correct?
- 9 A. Yeah.
- 10 Q. Okay. Now ---.
- 11 A. Now, let me make one more statement on that last
- one. I could be mistaken. That could have been --- I
- was there the year previous, too. It could have been
- that year, I'm not certain.
- Q. When you say the year previous, do you mean 2008?
- 16 A. '08. Yes.
- 17 Q. Okay. Do you recall when you were there in 2008?
- 18 A. It was the latter part of the year also.
- 19 Q. Okay. Were you there on a full electrical
- 20 inspection?
- 21 A. Yes, but I didn't get it completed either. We had
- another electrical inspector was assigned that mine,
- and he quit. And I was trying to catch up for him,
- and the 7th of December, my wife had a heart attack so
- 25 I didn't --- I was off for a week.

- 1 Q. All right.
- 2 A. And Eddie Blake came in and helped me. But best I
- 3 remember we got the mines completed.
- 4 Q. Okay.
- 5 A. Or very near.
- 6 Q. Now, as for your December 2009 inspection of UBB,
- 7 I understand you took over for Randy Smith, who was
- 8 promoted?
- 9 A. Yeah.
- 10 Q. Now, did you actually --- did you complete the
- 11 electrical inspection at UBB in December, or did you
- 12 hand it off to someone else?
- 13 A. Yeah. I gave it to Eddie Blake, I didn't get it
- 14 completed.
- Q. Okay. Were you involved in the Upper Big Branch
- 16 rescue and recovery operation after the explosion
- occurred on April 5th of this year?
- 18 A. I was on the surface.
- 19 Q. Okay. How and when did you learn that this event
- 20 had occurred on April the 5th?
- 21 A. I was home. I only live about a quarter of a mile
- from the main road, and I kept hearing ambulances go
- 23 by, and at first I thought it was a car wreck, and
- then I thought it must be something like a fire, and
- 25 finally I went out and asked my neighbor what all the

- 1 ambulances were for, and he said that they were --- I
- 2 believe he said a roof collapsed at UBB. So then I
- 3 called my boss, which he wasn't home, but his wife
- 4 told me there was an event.
- 5 Q. Okay. What did you do then?
- 6 A. Got my work clothes back on and went to the mines.
- 7 Q. Okay. Do you recall what time you arrived there?
- 8 A. I'm thinking it would probably been closer to six
- 9 o'clock.
- 10 Q. Okay. All right. Did you arrive at the Upper Big
- 11 Branch Main Portal at Montcoal, or did you go to Ellis
- 12 Portal.
- 13 A. Main Portal, Montcoal.
- 14 Q. Okay. What did you do then?
- 15 A. Went to the mine office to see what was going on,
- and Chris Adkins was there, explained to me that they
- had an event, and I think at that time he told me
- 18 there were three fatalities.
- 19 Q. Okay. Now, when you say Chris Adkins, is he ---
- 20 do you know his position?
- 21 A. Well, I was told he was the vice president of
- 22 Massey operations, but I'm not sure.
- 23 Q. Okay. That's fine. Did he, in any way, describe
- 24 how or why the event might have occurred? Did he
- 25 provide any information on that?

- 1 A. No.
- Q. Okay. Had any of the rescue teams arrived by that
- 3 time?
- 4 A. No.
- 5 Q. Okay. Okay. So around six o'clock, and after
- 6 your conversation with Mr. Atkins, what happened then?
- 7 A. I wrote him a closure order.
- 8 Q. Can you explain that?
- 9 A. To close the mines other than ---.
- 10 O. Call it an order?
- 11 A. Yes.
- 12 Q. Okay.
- 13 A. Until the investigation's complete.
- 14 Q. Okay. What did you do the rest of the evening?
- 15 A. Until the rescue teams got there, I tried to keep
- 16 up on the map with what was going on, because they had
- individuals underground.
- 18 O. Sure.
- 19 A. And then when the rescue teams got there, and
- 20 Steve Snyder got there, I went down in the shop and
- 21 took notes as to which rescue teams, and who were on
- the teams that went underground.
- 23 Q. All right. I think you just said that they had
- 24 people underground around the time of your arrival.
- 25 A. Uh-huh (yes).

- Q. I assume you mean the Performance or Upper Big
- 2 Branch Mine employees?
- 3 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Do you know who those people were? Or do
- 5 you have any knowledge of who they were?
- 6 A. Okay. That's Jaime Ferguson, Chris Blanchard and
- 7 Wayne Persinger. That is who Chris Adkins was trying
- 8 to contact on the phone.
- 9 Q. Okay. I think you told us that Blanchard was a
- 10 president or vice president.
- 11 A. Yeah. As far as I know he was the president of
- 12 Marfork.
- 13 Q. Okay. Now, what about Ferguson, do you know what
- 14 his position might have been?
- 15 A. He's Mr. Blanchard's assistant.
- 16 Q. Okay. What about Persinger?
- 17 A. He's Mr. Blanchard's assistant.
- 18 Q. Okay. Do you know how many assistants he might
- 19 have had?
- 20 A. No.
- Q. I'm sorry. So after you talked to Steve Snyder,
- 22 you went to the shop area, and ---?
- 23 A. Yeah. I checked people in and out.
- Q. Okay. Did you do anything else throughout the
- evening and into the following morning?

- 1 A. No.
- 2 Q. Okay. You remained primarily in the shop area?
- 3 A. Yeah. And sometimes while there wasn't --- you
- 4 know when they're coming and going. I'd go out and
- 5 talk with the people in their rescue stations.
- 6 Q. Did you happen to see or hear anything that might
- 7 have suggested how this explosion occurred?
- 8 A. No.
- 9 Q. Okay.
- 10 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 11 Jasey, just for the record let me mark
- the map as Miller Exhibit Number One.
- 13 (Miller Exhibit Number One marked for
- identification.)
- 15 EXAMINATION
- 16 BY MR. MAGGARD:
- 17 Q. Okay. Wayne, when you got --- I want to get on
- 18 this April 5th thing since that's the last --- which
- is kind of fresh on our mind, but when you got there,
- 20 and Adkins was trying to get hold of Blanchard and
- 21 Persinger and Ferguson on the phone, was he able to
- 22 contact him, was --- who all was on the phone, what
- 23 parts of the phone did --- you know, that was working
- on the system?
- 25 A. He was hollering every few minutes on the phone,

- and I think he contacted one of them. I'm not sure,
- 2 and I think eventually the mine rescue team got with
- 3 them and brought them out. But he said they had made
- 4 it to the tailgate of the longwall, and there was so
- 5 much CO there that they came back out, because they
- 6 were not under rescue equipment.
- 7 Q. Who was already there when you got to the mines
- 8 that --- from the State office and the Federal people
- 9 that was there?
- 10 A. Gary Hall was there.
- 11 0. Is that state?
- 12 A. State.
- 13 Q. Okay.
- 14 A. And shortly thereafter I got there, Jean Stuart
- 15 got there.
- 16 O. And that's also State?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 O. Was anybody from MSHA there?
- 19 A. After I got there, Fred Wills came. And then
- there were several people with MSHA came, but I'm not
- 21 sure.
- Q. About how long was you there that night?
- 23 A. I think I left there about 2:30 the next morning.
- Q. Before you left at 2:30, did you see any of the
- 25 guys like Ferguson, Blanchard, Persinger come out of

- 1 the mine before you left?
- 2 A. No.
- 3 Q. Was they still in there?
- 4 A. No. As I understood, they brought them out on the
- 5 Ellis Portal, but I'm not sure about that.
- 6 Q. Are you familiar with their communication and
- 7 tracking system at the mine?
- 8 A. Not very.
- 9 Q. Let me ask you this before I forget. Do you know
- 10 who said they had made it to the tailgate at the
- 11 longwall?
- 12 A. That was the information that I got from listening
- 13 to Chris Adkins talk on the telephone.
- 14 Q. Do you know who he was talking to?
- 15 A. No, I don't know which one of them he was talking
- 16 to, no.
- 17 Q. Was any of them using radio sets trying to
- 18 communicate or was that not working?
- 19 A. They were not working, as I understood it.
- 20 Q. While you was there, was you ever approached by
- anyone that maybe mentioned something, some
- information, that as to the reason why the accident
- 23 occurred? Any kind of information that ---?
- 24 A. No.
- Q. Give you any opinions on what they thought might

- 1 have happened?
- 2 A. Methane explosion.
- Q. When you was making the Headgate 22 equipment,
- 4 could you kind of tell me what areas that you did make
- 5 in the last inspection that you had, electrical
- 6 inspection, you made all the equipment on this
- 7 section, you made this pump up here in this
- 8 distribution box. What other areas did you go?
- 9 A. Belt heads and drives, and of course each one of
- 10 them has got a power center and several of them got
- 11 pumps, chargers, take-ups, practical equipment related
- 12 to those.
- 13 Q. Could you kind of specify which areas you went to
- on the map?
- 15 A. Okay. Naturally there's a belt drive here
- 16 (indicating). And a belt drive here.
- 17 Q. All right. When you say here, can you explain
- where you're talking and who ---?
- 19 MR. FARLEY:
- 20 So wait. Just mark them again, ---
- 21 A. Okay.
- 22 MR. FARLEY:
- 23 --- if that works.
- 24 BY MR. MAGGARD:
- Q. Or if you want to refer to spad numbers.

- 1 A. Yeah. I would say --- this belt battery's right
- 2 here and I guess that's the spad number right here.
- 3 Q. Can we read that spad number?
- 4 A. Yeah. 020237. I'm trying to get related on this
- 5 map, how that belt drive sits, because if the belt
- 6 were there, they would have to have another one here.
- 7 Okay. Here we go. Okay. 202170, here's the belt
- 8 drive.
- 9 Q. All right. And then you wrote belt drive in the
- 10 block next to ---.
- 11 A. Yeah.
- 12 Q. How's the track go in that area, does it go
- outside the belt, or ---?
- 14 A. Not in this area, I don't think. I don't remember
- 15 that it does. Some areas they had belt and track in
- the same entry but it wasn't here.
- 17 Q. What about ---?
- 18 A. Track and the same entry up here.
- 19 Q. As you was traveling along the track entries, is
- 20 that how you traveled into the mine from the UBB
- 21 Portal?
- 22 A. Yes.
- Q. As you was coming up from UBB, did you kind of
- 24 spot it along the belt entries and notice any kind of
- 25 accumulations or ---?

- 1 A. Not that I recall.
- 2 Q. As far as you know, did the rock dust appear
- 3 adequate or could you ---?
- 4 A. Yes.
- 5 Q. What other belt drives did you ---?
- 6 A. Okay. Got one here (indicating)
- 7 Q. Can you tell us where you're marking that one?
- 8 A. Okay. This is at the mouth of the longwall belt.
- 9 Q. Okay.
- 10 A. And I think they called this --- let me think.
- One of them the mother drive, which I believe would be
- this one. And I think two more, there may be one, but
- there may be one more, too, before you get to Ellis
- 14 switch.
- 15 Q. Is that basically all the equipment that you
- 16 checked during that inspection?
- 17 A. Yeah.
- 18 Q. When you was up at Headgate 22, could you kind of
- 19 explain how in-depth you went on permissibility with
- 20 this?
- 21 A. Well, I check --- I don't know exactly what you
- 22 want, but ---.
- Q. Just tell us what you ---.
- A. Permissibility?
- 25 Q. Yeah.

- 1 A. I know the one miner on the right side, you were
- 2 asking about the methane detector, the head was off of
- 3 it. And it was down in the --- say if this was the
- face, which was probably back here a bit, it was down
- 5 here. And the other miner was down in here. And they
- 6 were doing some work on it.
- 7 Q. Now, this would be inby wherever the belt tail
- 8 was.
- 9 A. Yeah. Right.
- 10 Q. Or feet.
- 11 A. Yeah.
- 12 Q. And that would be the Number One entry, and the
- other one you're saying was in the Number Three?
- 14 A. Right.
- 15 O. Okay.
- 16 A. And I know this miner was particularly --- they
- 17 had pulled it back probably to find a high spot to
- change heads or whatever reason, but they pulled it
- 19 back quite a ways.
- Q. How much equipment did they have up there?
- 21 A. Two miners, three shuttle cars and two bolters.
- 22 Oh, charger and scoops.
- 23 Q. Overall, what kind of condition would you say
- 24 their equipment is in?
- 25 A. It was good. Good.

- 1 Q. Did you have to issue any kind of permissibility
- violations while you were up there?
- 3 A. No.
- 4 Q. Could you show us some pumps that are ---
- 5 electrical pumps that you --- some areas you think
- 6 they are located and the ones that you check?
- 7 A. The only one I specifically remember was this one
- 8 up here.
- 9 Q. Okay.
- 10 A. The other ones I don't specifically remember where
- 11 they were.
- 12 Q. What kind of pump was that up here, was it a
- permissible pump or non-permissible?
- 14 A. Non-permissible.
- 15 MR. FARLEY:
- 16 And you're referring to the one ---?
- 17 A. Yes. Uh-huh (yes).
- 18 BY MR. MAGGARD:
- 19 Q. Who normally traveled with you when you ---?
- 20 A. Either Virgil Bowman, or Tom Sheets.
- Q. Did he take any notes or photographs?
- 22 A. No, he didn't take any photographs, I'm sure. And
- I don't recall that he took any notes.
- Q. Did you review the electrical map while you was
- 25 there?

- 1 A. Yeah.
- Q. Did it match what you saw during your inspection?
- 3 A. Yeah. To the best I recall.
- 4 Q. Do you recall on the electrical map any
- 5 permissible pumps in this headgate area between the
- 6 longwall panel and Bandytown fan?
- 7 A. I don't recall. They were going to send a pump
- 8 through a borehole, but they hadn't got that done yet.
- 9 I thought that maybe that might have been part of the
- 10 ventilation problem they were talking about.
- 11 Q. Up here in this headgate, how did the roof
- 12 conditions on this section appear to be?
- 13 A. Appeared to be all right, the best I remember.
- 14 Q. Did any of the miners express any concerns to you
- about anything about the mine or ---?
- 16 A. No.
- 17 Q. Have you ever went on a complaint at this mine?
- 18 Complaint investigation?
- 19 A. No, I don't think so.
- 20 Q. Have you ever seen any electrical safety features
- 21 bypassed at this mine?
- 22 A. You're talking about bridged out?
- Q. Right.
- 24 A. No.
- Q. Could you kind of go over some of the weaknesses

- 1 that they --- that the mine operator --- just kind of
- 2 go over some things that you've cited a lot at the
- 3 mine. Some areas that maybe needed improvement.
- 4 A. The biggest thing I recall is like, for instance,
- 5 the pumps would have the wrong size breakers in them.
- 6 Maybe the wrong size cables; not so much wrong with
- 7 their specific equipment, but things outby that a lot
- 8 of people feel like aren't important.
- 9 Q. How did they do as far as permissibility on pumps?
- 10 A. I mean, other than the breaker sizes and cables'
- 11 sizes, good.
- 12 Q. Okay. Did you ever observe them doing a weekly
- electrical exam, or a monthly electrical exam?
- 14 A. No.
- 15 Q. How did they normally perform their monthly
- 16 electrical exams at the mine as far as breaker testing
- 17 and ---?
- 18 A. I couldn't tell you. They were with me when I did
- 19 mine.
- Q. Have you ever inspected the CO system at the mine?
- 21 A. No. A CO system's not in state law.
- 22 Q. When you was there, did most of the guys that you
- 23 ran into or observed in the mine wear multigas
- 24 detectors?
- 25 A. I don't know that most of them did.

- 1 Q. Would you say over half?
- 2 A. I don't know about over half.
- 3 Q. Okay.
- 4 A. Probably. Probably did. I know the people that
- 5 traveled with me had them on.
- 6 Q. When was the last time you was at the longwall
- 7 section?
- 8 A. I've never been on this longwall section.
- 9 O. Never?
- 10 A. No.
- 11 Q. Have you been on a panel in the past ---?
- 12 A. A longwall panel?
- 13 Q. Yeah.
- 14 A. No, not at this mine.
- Q. Do you know of any kind of data communication they
- may have as far as getting production information from
- 17 longwall ---
- 18 A. No.
- 20 A. No.
- 21 Q. Did they have any kind of space for telephone for
- the longwall?
- 23 A. Not that I know of.
- Q. Have you ever observed the operator give an
- 25 electrical retraining class?

- 1 A. No.
- Q. Do you know who does their electrical retraining?
- 3 A. I think Dave Terry does most of their electrical
- 4 retraining.
- 5 Q. Where does he do this at?
- 6 A. Different offices, I assume. I know they have an
- office down at UBB, and one down at Marfork.
- 8 Q. Did they have an approved plan with the State of
- 9 West Virginia, or do you know?
- 10 A. As far as I know, they do.
- 11 Q. Do you think there's --- I know this is a big
- mine, it's hard to do an entire electrical inspection,
- it'd take a long --- a lot of days to do that. Do you
- 14 feel that there --- the mine operator's adequately
- 15 staffed as far as electrical maintenance personnel?
- 16 A. Be hard to say, but I'd say probably not.
- 17 O. Had you had conversations with any of the miners
- at the mine that said they weren't adequately staffed
- in their opinion?
- 20 A. No.
- Q. Is there anything else you can tell us, any other
- 22 places you've been in the mine that you might have
- some concerns about, you know, as far as the cleanup,
- 24 water accumulations, roof fall --- roof conditions,
- 25 bottom conditions, anything that you think we should

- 1 --- might be beneficial in the investigation for us to
- 2 know about?
- 3 A. No. I can tell you nothing I saw. I have some
- 4 hearsay information but, I guess it's record, but a
- 5 guy told me on the Headgate 17, and one of the
- 6 previous 16 or 15, that, you know, when they were
- 7 there, that the bottom hooved and cracked, and they
- 8 got methane out of the bottom, and they were down for
- 9 a while. So I suppose that's matter of record, if
- 10 they were down. Of course that was after the fact
- 11 that they told me that.
- 12 Q. How long did he say they were down?
- 13 A. They didn't say.
- 14 MR. MAGGARD:
- 15 I guess that's all I got.
- 16 MR. BECK:
- 17 A couple questions.
- 18 EXAMINATION
- 19 BY MR. BECK:
- 20 Q. I believe I heard you agree or say that it is the
- 21 policy of the Office of Miners' Health, Safety and
- 22 Training to conduct an electrical inspection once each
- 23 year?
- 24 A. Yes.
- Q. Does that always happen?

- 1 A. No.
- Q. What's some of the reasons why it doesn't happen?
- 3 A. Understaffed. I'll give you the instance of last
- 4 year. We had a man promoted, and course that wasn't
- 5 the only mines he didn't have finished, so we had
- 6 other mines to go to. And the year before that they'd
- 7 hired a guy that had worked, I think seven months and
- quit. And he had mines that he didn't get to, so ---.
- 9 We don't always get to them, no.
- 10 Q. Is that frequent --- I mean, is that a frequent
- 11 thing?
- 12 A. Well, we've got --- last year they came from other
- regions to help us, but we didn't get them all
- completed, as best I remember. And the year before
- 15 that, we got most of the mines at least started, but
- 16 not completed. Some of them not completed.
- 17 Q. In your career as an electric inspector, have you
- 18 ever found a methane monitor bridged out, or
- 19 jeopardized?
- 20 A. In my career, probably, yes.
- Q. How do you know if one's bridged out, or
- 22 jeopardized?
- 23 A. Well, you do the test or --- with the gas, or
- 24 simply try the test button. I don't always use the
- 25 gas.

- Q. Have you ever found that at Upper Big Branch?
- 2 A. No.
- 3 Q. No? What is the policy on checking methane
- 4 monitors on equipment?
- 5 A. I do the test button and zero.
- 7 A. Well, actually the methane monitors on the miner
- is not part of state law, it's federal law.
- 9 Q. Okay. But you would know if one was bridged out
- if you tested it to ---?
- 11 A. Yeah.
- 12 Q. And when you say you check the miner, for example,
- or the bolt, what is it that you check as part of your
- 14 electrical inspection?
- 15 A. The permissibility, the lights, the cable, the
- panic bars, miners got a power center trip switch,
- these stops on both sides and switches.
- 18 MR. BECK:
- 19 That's all I have.
- 20 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 21 Okay. We're going to take a five-minute
- 22 break.
- 23 A. Okay.
- 24 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 25 And then we'll confer, and when we come

- 1 back, we'll finish up.
- 2 A. All right.
- 3 SHORT BREAK TAKEN
- 4 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 5 Terry? Let's go.
- 6 MR. FARLEY:
- 7 Oh. I'm sorry.
- 8 RE-EXAMINATION
- 9 BY MR. FARLEY:
- 10 Q. You made mention of a methane bleeder that
- 11 resulted in the mine being idled, or down for some
- 12 period of time based on secondhand information you got
- 13 from someone else.
- 14 A. Yeah.
- Q. Did the individual happen to indicate when this
- 16 occurred?
- 17 A. No, he didn't. But that was on Headgate 17, as he
- 18 said and the one previous, which was, you know, the
- 19 longwall was out of that mine for a while.
- 20 Q. Okay.
- 21 A. And I think that this is the first longwall panel
- they had; correct, since they built the longwall back?
- 23 O. I'm not certain.
- 24 A. I'm not either, but I think it is. So it would
- 25 have been a good while back over a year or two or

- 1 more.
- Q. Okay. All right. Now, I think you indicated that
- 3 your source told you that that may have occurred as a
- 4 result of hooving in the mine floor?
- 5 A. Uh-huh (yes).
- 6 Q. Now, while you were inspecting here in December of
- 7 2009, did you notice any evidence of the floor hooving
- 8 anyplace.
- 9 A. No. Not that I recall.
- 10 RE-EXAMINATION
- 11 BY MR. MAGGARD:
- 12 Q. During your inspections of this mine, what would
- 13 you say is the highest concentration of methane you've
- 14 observed?
- 15 A. I don't remember picking up a tenth.
- 16 Q. Okay.
- 17 A. But I'm not inby, you know, I'm always in an outby
- 18 position.
- 19 Q. Most time outby?
- 20 A. Yeah.
- Q. When you got to the mine at six o'clock and Chris
- 22 Adkins was on the telephone, which individuals did you
- 23 understand him to say had made it up to the tailgate?
- 24 A. I don't recall.
- Q. You said that Persinger, Blanchard, and who else

- 1 was underground?
- 2 A. Ferguson, I think.
- Q. You're not sure if it was all three or a couple?
- 4 A. I'm not positive, but I think it was all three.
- 5 Q. Okay. About what time --- was that right around
- 6 six o'clock they was up there or ---?
- 7 A. Yeah.
- 8 Q. Okay. Did you have any other information on that?
- 9 Did you hear anything else that, I mean, like about
- 10 what they were doing?
- 11 A. Well, they were seeing if they could, as I
- 12 understood it, find anything that would help them to
- get someone out or whatever.
- Q. Do you know where the three individuals he said
- 15 that were fatalities, where they were at?
- 16 A. They were on the mantrip, that one mantrip that
- 17 they brought on outside.
- 18 O. Was it already outside when you arrived?
- 19 A. Yes.
- 20 MR. MAGGARD:
- 21 I guess that's all I got.
- BY MR. MAGGARD:
- 23 Q. Oh, yeah, one other question. Had you ever heard
- that was any information you might have obtained that
- 25 might have indicated that it was possible that this

- 1 mine may have been operating two miners at the same
- 2 time on the headgate section or anywhere else in the
- 3 mine?
- 4 A. I don't know how to answer that. I worked there
- 5 at one time, but I was on the midnight shift.
- 6 Therefore, it didn't produce coal. But I'm just about
- 7 reasonably positive that they did at that time. But
- 8 that was back in '94, '95, '96.
- 9 MR. BECK:
- 10 Couple questions.
- 11 RE-EXAMINATION
- 12 BY MR. BECK:
- Q. Do you know when the last full electrical
- inspection was done at Upper Big Branch?
- 15 A. I'm reasonably sure that we finished, Eddie Blake
- 16 and I, in '08.
- 17 O. '08? Which month, approximately?
- 18 A. That'd been December.
- 19 Q. And you described a situation when inspectors at a
- 20 mine doing an electrical inspection, and something
- 21 happens that he has to go somewhere else? For
- 22 example, the fellow that got promoted?
- 23 A. Uh-huh (yes).
- Q. Or for whatever reason he can't complete it, and
- it's handed off to another inspector, ---

- 1 A. Uh-huh (yes).
- 2 O. --- how does that work? I mean, how do you know
- 3 that you're not doing the same thing over again, and
- 4 missing something here, or missing something there?
- 5 A. About all you can do is get with that individual,
- and get with their notes and go from there.
- 7 Q. So you look at his notes and talk to each other?
- 8 A. Yeah.
- 9 O. There was a discussion about a memo that was
- 10 supposed to have been posted on a bulletin board from
- 11 Chris Blanchard, the president of Performance Coal,
- more or less stating that if things didn't pick up,
- then vacation would be canceled?
- 14 A. It didn't say vacation was canceled. The way I
- understood it, it said that the people in charge, they
- 16 wouldn't need them anymore if they didn't pick things
- 17 up.
- 18 O. In your travels, have you ever seen that anywhere
- 19 else? Anything similar to that? Whether it be at
- 20 Massey Mine or another company?
- 21 A. No.
- 22 Q. Would that have been --- do you think people would
- 23 have taken that as a threat?
- A. Well, it seemed threatening to me.
- Q. We talked about some of the things that you

- 1 thought were their shortcomings in their electrical
- 2 area. If I understand right, one of them being not
- 3 enough attention to outline things.
- 4 A. Uh-huh (yes).
- 5 Q. Is that something that is common in this mine or
- 6 other Massey mines? Is that like a common
- 7 denominator, or mines in general?
- 8 A. Pretty much common to mines in general.
- 9 Q. Why do you think that is?
- 10 A. Well, in my opinion, just like a pumper and he's
- 11 supposed to --- or a mine foreman or whoever needs to
- pump water, he'll grab the pump and set it and won't
- pay particular attention to what size cable's on it or
- who get one starter box to go with a pump --- wrong
- 15 size pump. That's my opinion, and I haven't seen it
- 16 done.
- Q. So you claim that they're just placing more focus
- on things where the actual production is going on?
- 19 A. Right.
- 20 Q. And one last thing. You stated that you thought,
- 21 but probably weren't adequately set in their
- 22 electrical or maintenance roles.
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. What makes you feel that way?
- 25 A. Just back when I was talking about the pumps

- should go --- the pumper is supposed to install the
- 2 pump, the electrician should be there to make sure
- 3 they're properly installed.
- 4 Q. Who is, or who was the maintenance chief at UBB,
- 5 when you were there?
- 6 A. Rick Nicole.
- 7 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 8 Terry, anything?
- 9 RE-EXAMINATION
- 10 BY MR. FARLEY:
- 11 Q. One final thing. When we started out here, I
- think you indicated that you began your inspection at
- 13 UBB, you were taking over from Randy Smith?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 O. Okay. So he would have --- is it fair that he
- would have completed some portion of the electrical
- inspection before you got there?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 MR. FARLEY:
- 20 That's all.
- 21 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 22 Jasey?
- 23 RE-EXAMINATION
- 24 BY MR. MAGGARD:
- 25 Q. Since, you know, you used to work there ---. I

- opened that up; didn't I? Are you familiar with the
- 2 P2 Manual?
- 3 A. No.
- 4 Q. Okay. Did the move crew run a lot of coal on the
- 5 third shift after a belt move?
- 6 A. No. Not when that was there.
- 7 Q. Did you ever see any kind of signs posted, memos
- 8 allowing P2 or S1 standard to be violated by Chris
- 9 Blanchard?
- 10 A. No. Chris Blanchard wasn't there when I was
- 11 there.
- 12 Q. But after --- during your inspection you never
- seen any other memos or --- that might have mentioned
- 14 those kinds of standards?
- 15 A. No.
- 16 MR. MAGGARD:
- 17 Okay. That's all.
- 18 MR. FARLEY:
- 19 One more thing.
- 20 RE-EXAMINATION
- 21 BY MR. FARLEY:
- 22 Q. I think you indicated that you may have worked at
- the Upper Big Branch Mine in the 1990s?
- A. Uh-huh (yes).
- Q. Okay. Approximately, when was that again?

- 1 A. '95 or '96.
- Q. Okay. The fact that you may have worked there 14,
- 3 15 years ago, does that have any impact on your
- 4 ability to do your job now?
- 5 A. No.
- 6 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 7 All right. Is that all? Okay. Mr.
- 8 Miller, again, on behalf of MSHA and the Office of
- 9 Miners' Health, Safety and Training, I want to thank
- 10 you for appearing and answering questions today.
- 11 You're cooperation is very important to the
- investigation as we determine the cause of the
- 13 accident. Because we will be interviewing other
- 14 witnesses, we require that you not discuss your
- 15 testimony with any other person. After questioning
- other witnesses we may call you if we have any follow-
- 17 up questions that we feel we need to ask you. If at
- 18 any time you have additional information that you
- 19 would like to provide the Accident Investigation Team,
- 20 please contact us at the contact information that has
- 21 been provided to you.
- 22 At this time, I want to give you the
- opportunity to provide us with any additional

- 2 A. The only thing you asked me about, a letter ---
- 3 threatening letter about people losing their vacation.
- 4 I didn't read any threatening letter, but those people
- 5 did not get their Christmas vacation last year, at the
- 6 end of '09. A lot of people were scheduled --- you
- 7 know, Massey schedules their vacation off the 20th, I
- 8 think it's Christmas and New Year's. And those people
- 9 didn't get that vacation.
- 10 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 11 And how do you know this?
- 12 A. From being down there and talking to people. I
- didn't see a letter on it, no.
- 14 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 15 And do you know why they didn't get their
- 16 vacation?
- 17 A. Because of production being down or whatever. I
- don't know for a fact, no.
- 19 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 20 And you know this just because you were
- at the mine that week, and normally they would be off,
- 22 but they were working?
- 23 A. Right.
- 24 ATTORNEY WILSON:
- 25 Did you talk to anybody about that?

Page 58 A. Well, I'm sure I did. I don't particularly remember generally who or what, but I know some of them were upset because they didn't get the vacation. ATTORNEY WILSON: All right.
