3	ATTORNEY HAMPTON:
4	My name is Polly Hampton. Today is June
5	10th, 2010. I am with the Office of the Solicitor,
6	U.S. Department of Labor. With me is John Godsey, an
7	accident investigator with the Mine Safety and Health
8	Administration, MSHA, an agency of the United States
9	Department of Labor. Also present are several people
10	from the State of West Virginia. I ask that they
11	state their appearance for the record.
12	MR. FARLEY:
13	I'm Terry Farley, with the West Virginia
14	Office of Miners' Health, Safety and Training.
15	ATTORNEY HAMPTON:
16	And by several I mean one. There are
17	actually several members of the investigation team
18	also present in the room today, and Mr. Godsey will be
19	conducting the initial part of the questioning today.
20	All members of the Mine Safety and Health
21	Accident Investigation Team and all members of the
22	State of West Virginia Accident Investigation Team
23	participating in the investigation of the Upper Big
24	Branch Mine explosion shall keep confidential all
25	information that is gathered from each witness who

1 voluntarily provides a statement until the witness 2 statements are officially released. MSHA and the 3 State of West Virginia shall keep this information confidential so that other ongoing enforcement 4 activities are not prejudiced or jeopardized by a 5 premature release of information. 6 This 7 confidentiality requirement shall not preclude investigation team members from sharing information 8 with each other or with other law enforcement 9 10 officials. Your participation in this interview 11 constitutes your agreement to keep this information 12 confidential.

13 Government investigators and specialists

have been assigned to investigate the conditions, 14 15 events and circumstances surrounding the fatalities that occurred at the Upper Big Branch Mine-South on 16 17 April 5th, 2010. The investigation is being conducted by MSHA under Section 103(a) of the Federal Mine 18 19 Safety and Health Act and the West Virginia Office of 20 Miners' Health, Safety and Training. We appreciate 21 your assistance in the investigation. You may have a 22 personal attorney present during the taking of the 23 statement or another personal representative, if MSHA 24 has permitted it, and may consult with your attorney or the representative at that time. Your statement is 25

1 completely voluntary. You may refuse to answer any 2 question and you may terminate your interview at any 3 time or request a break at any time. Since this is not an adversarial proceeding, formal Cross 4 Examination will not be permitted. However, if you 5 had a personal legal representative, that person could 6 7 ask clarifying questions. Just for the record, do you 8 have a personal representative here today? 9 MR. CRADDOCK: 10 No, I do not. ATTORNEY HAMPTON: 11 Your identity and the content of this 12 conversation will be made public at the conclusion of 13 the interview process and may be included in the 14 public report of the accident, unless you request that 15 your identify remain confidential or your information 16 17 will otherwise jeopardize a potential criminal investigation. If you request us to keep your 18 19 identity confidential, we will do so to the extent That means that if a Judge orders 20 permitted by law. 21 us to reveal your name or if another law requires us 22 to reveal your name or if we need to reveal your name 23 for other law enforcement purposes, we may do so. 24 Also, there may be a need to use the information you 25 provide to us or other information we may ask you to

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1 the nation's mines safer.

2 After we have finished asking questions,

3	you will have an opportunity to make a statement and
4	provide us with any other information that you believe
5	to be important. If at any time after the interview
6	you recall any additional information that you believe
7	might be useful, please contact or have a
8	representative contact, as the case may be, Norman
9	Page at the telephone number or e-mail address
10	provided to you in the letter that I gave you earlier.
11	Any statements given by miner witnesses
12	to MSHA are considered to be an exercise of statutory
13	rights and protected activity under Section 105(c) of
14	the Mine Act. If you believe any discharge,
15	discrimination or other adverse action is taken
16	against you as a result of your cooperation with this
17	investigation, you are encouraged to immediately
18	contact MSHA and file a complaint under Section 105(c)
19	of the Act. You may swear in the witness.

2	BY MR. GODSEY:
3	Q. Mr. Craddock, state your full name
4	A. William
5	Q and spell your last name.
6	A. William G. Craddock, C-R-A-D-D-O-C-K.
7	Q. Your home address?
8	A. (b) (7)(C)
9	(b) (7)(C)
10	Q. Okay. Your telephone number?
11	A. (b) (7)(C) .
12	Q. Are you appearing here today voluntarily?
13	A. Yes, I am.
14	Q. Has anyone made any promises to you for giving
15	this interview or offered you any rewards in
16	exchanging for making your statement? Has anyone
17	threatened you or warned you not to provide this
18	statement?
19	A. No, sir.
20	Q. How many years of mining experience do you have?
21	A. About six-and-a-half, seven, but they're I
22	don't know if I'm supposed to clarify. They've been
23	separated. I worked from '75, December, to June of
24	'79. And because of the striking, I got out of the
25	mining industry and I did not get back into it until

1	August of 2008. August 26th is when I was hired on by
2	Performance Coal Company until the present day,
3	SO
4	Q. Who did you work for? You said
5	A. Westmoreland Coal Company.
6	Q. Westmoreland Coal Company?
7	A. Yes, during the '70s.
8	Q. Was that in Eccles or?
9	A. Winding Gulf, down that way, sir.
10	Q. Do you have any mining certification for
11	specialized training?
12	A. I'm a certified electrician underground.
13	Q. Did you go through the Massey training program?
14	A. Yes, I did, sir.
15	Q. When did you do that?
16	A. From October of 2008 until October of 2009.
17	Q. Did you have to sign a contract?
18	A. Yes, I did.
19	Q. How long was that for?
20	A. Three years.
21	Q. What was the stipulation?
22	A. Just stating that I would agree to work for Massey
23	because they're paying for my schooling and everything
24	else and the expense that they've put out, that I
25	would continue to work for them for three years.

1	Q. What if you quit?
2	A. If I understand it, then we would have to pay back
3	the schooling fees. That's the way I understood it.
4	Q. Are you presently employed?
5	A. Yes, I am.
6	Q. Where are you?
7	A. Performance Coal Company, UBB.
8	Q. And you told us you started when did you start
9	at UBB? You told me once.
10	A. August I believe it's August 26th of 2008,
11	sir.
12	Q. And what is your present job title?
13	A. Outby electrician.
14	Q. And outby, do you mean by?
15	A. I work in the motor barn, taking care of mantrips,
16	Jeeps, that type of equipment, the chargers that
17	charge them. And during the that's where I'm at
18	now, sir, and that was the same title. But during the
19	and prior to the explosion, Mondays, Wednesdays and
20	Fridays I would go to the Ellis side and spend my day
21	there to take care of the mantrips and the Jeeps and
22	the motors, anything that was on that side.
23	Q. How often would you go underground?
24	A. That on the Ellis side, I would have to go
25	under like four or five breaks, and once a week I

1	would go about 15 breaks to look at the chargers up at
2	Ellis Five Head.
3	Q. How long did it tae you to perform these duties?
4	A. Well, because of the nature of the mantrips and
5	the way they come out, I would spend my day there on
б	the Ellis side, in and out.
7	Q. What were the most what were all the problems
8	that you had with them?
9	A. Well, it was maintenance service, greasing,
10	oiling, minor stuff. We had no facilities to take
11	care of major, so we would transfer to the other side
12	in the event of something you know, a major
13	failure.
14	Q. On the UBB side, how far did you ever travel
15	underground?
16	A. Ninety-nine (99) percent of the time, no, sir.
17	Twice I had to go up towards Three section to get a
18	mantrip that would not run.
19	Q. And what is Three section?
20	A. That's on the south side of the mines, the other
21	side of the mountain. There's two portals.
22	Q. Are you talking about the barrier section?
23	A. No, barrier's yes, I think they didn't
24	they call it they changed the name. It confused
25	me, sir. I believe it

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1	Q. Who is your immediate supervisor?
2	A. I would have to say well, that's a good
3	question because I pretty much work for Wayne, but
4	Paul Thompson I would say would be my immediate
5	supervisor.
б	Q. And who is he, Paul?
7	A. Paul's like over all the electricians at our
8	mines, so I would have to say him. But normally I
9	never see Paul. Wayne
10	Q. Wayne?
11	A. Persinger or, you know, they usually I pretty
12	much work by myself. I have very little intervention
13	with anybody.
14	Q. Pretty good worker.
15	A. Well, you know, he'll come to me if he needs help
16	and I don't have anything to do. Like right now I
17	have a lot of intervention with Wayne. But most of
18	the time when we're running coal I got nobody I do
19	my own thing. I'm sorry. That's probably not the
20	correct word, but
21	Q. That's all right. What was your work schedule for
22	the week of the accident? What shift were you
23	working?
24	A. I was always dayshift, and most of the time we
25	would start at $3:00$ in the morning, $3:00$ to $1:00$ , $3:00$

1	to 2:00. It depends on what was going on. We'd
2	typically start at 3:00, 3:30, to let's just say 1:30,
3	2:30.
4	Q. Okay. And how many days a week did you do that?
5	A. Five to six.
б	Q. And usually about what time did you leave the
7	property?
8	A. If I was on the Ellis side, I would pretty much
9	leave the property around between 2:15, 2:25, in
10	that range. Sometimes I'd get out
11	Q. Yes, sir.
12	A. Sometimes I'd get out of there by 2:05.
13	Q. What was the last day you worked before the
14	explosion?
15	A. The day of the explosion, sir.
16	Q. Do you know if they ran the longwall during that
17	weekend?
18	A. I was off Friday, Saturday and Sunday. I do not
19	know for sure. I really couldn't answer honestly.
20	Q. Do they ever shut the longwall down, like holidays
21	and?
22	A. Most of the time the wall ran, most of the time.
23	I didn't know a whole lot about it. You'd hear
24	intervention with people, but I know that they ran it
25	two shifts and maintenance on the third shift. They

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would run weekends when they could. But that's -- you know, that's what I hear just passing with
 somebody.
 Q. Have you ever heard of the longwall being down?
 The foreman shut the section down for something and

6 they called outside and management tells them to go
7 back and run coal, they're down for a short hour or
8 something like that, any of the sections?

9 A. No, I never heard that, sir.

Q. Have you performed any other jobs at the mineother than electrical work?

A. Basically I was hired on as an electrician, mechanical/electrical. The few times while I was a trainee or something, if I --- I'd help somebody do something, but --- you know, if I happened to be near and there was nothing for me to do, I'd help them stack block or something. But I was hired on as an electrician. That's mainly what I did.

Q. Outside or whenever you had --- you all would get with your fellow miners, did you all ever talk about conditions in the mine? Anybody ever say that they was concerned about working in a certain place or a certain area of the mine?

A. Just at the top was as little unstable, up in thearea of the sections that were driving for the wall.

You'd hear that all the time. They were watching it, but you know, I never really heard anybody say anything other than that. But that's pretty much mining. But up there it was a little bit worse. And sometimes you'd hear them say that the bottom would buckle a little bit or something.

Q. Well, talking about bottom heaving, did you ever
hear any --- ever have a floor outburst or anything
while you were there?

10 A. No, sir.

11 Q. What about the pumps behind the longwall? They 12 had guite a bit of water I understand. Who maintained 13 the pumps behind there? Did you ever go back there? A. No, sir. I don't know a lot about the pumps or 14 even what they --- I know they had some air pumps back 15 there, and Jeremy Burdoff was basically maintaining 16 17 those, him and two trainees. I'd talk to Jeremy when he'd go by me like Monday, Wednesdays and Fridays. 18 We'd talk a little bit, but basically he --- he's the 19 20 only one that I know about the air pumps. Any other 21 pumps that was up in there would be took care of by the electricians in that area. 22 23 Q. Did he ever talk to you about water --- working on 24 water that was chest deep or something?

25 A. Yeah. He said the water is pretty deep up there.

1	Q. Do you know anybody getting injured up there
2	or?
3	A. No, not that I could recall. I mean, there's
4	always injuries in a mine. You know, to recall one
5	specifically because of that water, no.
б	Q. Talking about injuries, did you have a lot of
7	people that was on light duty or several miners on
8	light duty?
9	A. No, not that I while I was there, there was a
10	couple put on light duty. And the names I really
11	can't recall the names right there. But there was a
12	couple, but I wouldn't say an extraordinary lot of
13	them, no, sir.
14	Q. Okay. Have you ever been injured?
15	A. No, sir.
16	Q. Okay.
17	A. Injured, meaning? I'm an electrician. An
18	occasional little cut or nick or something.
19	Q. Did you ever have to go to the hospital?
20	A. No, sir. No, sir.
21	Q. Okay.
22	A. I just want to make sure I'm trying to answer
23	truthfully.
24	Q. Have you ever heard any of the men talking about
25	any of the ventilation problems they've had at any of

1 the sections?

2 A. Off and on you'd hear ---.

3 Q. I mean low air.

A. Yeah, off and on you'd hear bath house rumors
where they were trying to get the air right and that
they couldn't run because they didn't have enough air.
They were working on it. And that's something that
had been an ongoing thing, taking --- trying to get
the air change up in the area.

Q. Are you aware of any time that they made any unplanned or unapproved ventilation changes for people underground?

Like I say, I wasn't involved in that 13 A. No, sir. You'd just hear them where they're 14 part of it. working on the air or they're having trouble and MSHA 15 would have them --- pull them out if the air wasn't 16 17 right or something like that. But in my job, you know, you hear a little bit of bath house rumors that 18 19 go on. But if I listened to everything, I'd never get 20 my job done, so ---.

Q. What is the extent or what areas have you visitedin UBB?

A. Well, I've been, at one point or another, down the
mainline all the way through to the Glory Hole, a
little bit past it, where the longwall first started

1 And I'm not an expert on the map, but where mining. 2 they first started, I took in the last little bit of 3 my training. It just so happened they needed me, and I was helping up in that area a little bit with 4 miscellaneous stuff, like getting a miner, working on 5 a miner, doing this and that. And when they were 6 7 setting up the new One section, the wall had already started running, and we were setting up the new One 8 section to start driving for the next wall, I helped 9 10 put in the tailpiece, the belt head, stuff like that. 11 Mainly I helped put in the fire suppression, the 12 pipes down the belt. Again, I was a trainee and I helped put in the rock box. And it was shortly after 13 that I tested out, and then I was immediately moved 14 outside, which is where they were planning to put me. 15 Q. How many times or can you imagine how close was 16 17 you up there at the longwall? A. Never been on the wall. 18 19 Q. I mean, setting up, traveling up there, how many 20 times have you traveled up to the track entry? 21 A. Before the wall ever ran I've probably been up 22 there six times. 23 Q. Do you remember any water problems they had up there? 24 A. Basically the last time I was up on the wall they 25

were --- and I didn't even walk over to it, they 1 2 were --- it was wet up there in that area. Everything 3 was wet, damp, wet. There was no dust that I can remember in my mind in that area. When they first set 4 up --- were setting up the wall, it hadn't ran yet, 5 they were still doing the borehole for the fan, for 6 7 the Bundytown (sic) fan I think is the correct ---. Ι was close enough to hear the borehole running, but I 8 never walked over to it. Again, we were working on a 9 10 miner or shuttle cars or something like that. We were 11 just helping out. I was just like an extra loaned 12 out. O. What about roof conditions up there, on the track? 13 A. Again, --- I'm trying to --- I don't want to get 14 the old Two section mixed up because that come around 15 for the tailgate. You could see occasionally where 16 17 the metal --- the metal supports along the belt, you could see where they had bowed them a little bit and 18 19 they were replacing them as necessary. I've seen that 20 a couple times. But that's mining. You see it off

Q. About the floor, did you see any floor heaving upthere?

and on.

A. When --- the longwall had already been running and
--- I'm trying to think now. We went up there --- I

wasn't working, so I'm trying to be careful. 1 We went 2 up there to get a --- what was it? They sent us up there to get something, and I'm trying to think of 3 what it was. That's when I was working on the new One 4 We weren't working up there. We were sent 5 section. up there to find a cable or pull a cable. 6 They needed 7 a cable on a cathead or something, and the wall was on the side. We were there, and when we were getting the 8 cable, you could see where they were --- the bottom 9 10 had cracked a little bit and they had an area walled 11 off where they didn't want no men to go. But I can't 12 --- I was only there once. Again, I wasn't working up there, so --- other than they had sent us to try to 13 14 get a cable, pull a cable out. O. Do you know about when that was? 15 A. The wall hadn't been running very long at all. 16 17 They were still on their first panel, I believe. Q. Was in maybe September of last year, '09, or 18 19 something? A. Well, it would have had to have been the last ---20 21 about the last month, like I say, I was floating. Ι 22 wasn't on Three. It would have been in that range of 23 --- around September, because October 6th I was no 24 longer underground. I was outside. 25 Q. Have you been to the Glory Hole?

1	A. I've been to the Glory Hole off and on a few
2	times. December of '08 Thanksgiving of '08, these
3	dates are hard to remember, we worked on the actual
4	feeder that the Glory Hole drops down into when it was
5	still running.
6	Q. Do you remember any methane readings or oxygen?
7	A. No. I had a detector. I can tell you it was hot,
8	very warm, but we did have a detector.
9	Q. Why was it warm? I mean,
10	A. Well, the equipment running there and just not a
11	lot of air ventilation at that time. They hadn't put
12	the Bundytown fan online.
13	Q. Okay.
14	A. It was very warm up there, if I had to guess, 85
15	or it was warm. You shed your shirt. You worked
16	in a T-shirt and put your coveralls with your stripes
17	back on. It was hot.
18	Q. Have you been to Eight North?
19	A. Eight North?
20	Q. Up there inby the Glory Hole?
21	A. I can't say yes or no. I know this soundsI
22	went up twice to where they were setting up One in
23	that area because in behind the power center where the
24	track used to be they had cut across. I had to
25	service a motor and I walked up and around, but I

1 couldn't tell you if it was Eight North.

2 Q. Okay.

A. It was a little bit past the Glory Hole, just a 3 little bit, not much, in that area, if I recollect. 4 Ι 5 only went up there to --- there was a motor trapped in there because they had cut the track out and they were 6 7 using it to fire boss the area behind it, and they ---8 I had to go up there. I was available, so I went up there twice, I believe, to take a look at it, sir. 9 10 O. How has the rock dusting been in those areas? 11 A. I didn't pay a lot of attention, but I know that 12 they were pretty religious about --- I don't know about the back areas. I really didn't pay a lot of 13 I didn't get into that that much, sir, but 14 attention. I know they ran the track duster all the time. 15 Q. Have you been to 22 Headgate section? 16 17 A. See, these numbers --- to me, after they were up and operating, no, I don't think so. 18 Q. Do you remember when you traveled up there about 19 20 when you got to 78 Crosscut, did you ever go through 21 any equipment doors where you went from neutral into the intake back into the neutral? 22 A. Oh, those four doors? 23 O. Yeah. 24 25 A. Oh, yeah, went through them all.

Q. Did you ever find any of them open, any of them
 left open?

3 A. Probably about eight months ago, when one was damaged, one was open, but all the others were okay. 4 5 And it was fixed. I want to say Billy graham come ---I believe it was Billy Graham come back and fixed it. 6 7 But to come through them open, I've never seen them 8 open myself. And I got to say that I religiously ---I hated it when I was sent by myself because you got 9 10 to get off, open, close, get off, open and close. But 11 it's very serious, so I definitely did --- you know, I 12 would open and close them. But I've never come through there where they were open, sir. 13 14 Q. Have you ever seen a motor crew go through there? A. No, because, again, I'm not up there that often. 15 They would --- the few times I was up there, they had 16 17 already come through or would be coming through after 18 us. 19 Q. Are you aware of any conditions which required all 20 or portions of the mine to be evacuated? A. While I was there --- one time when I was there we 21 22 had a fan go down. They pulled everybody out. The motor went out on the north fan, UBB North fan, and 23 24 they pulled everybody out of the mines.

25 Q. Any time for methane or air direction, air going

1

in the wrong direction?

2 A. Well, when they were doing their air changes, they 3 wouldn't let nobody go in. But to pull people out, the only time I actually was at the mines when they 4 5 did it was when that fan went down. And you know what, there was another time that we couldn't go in 6 7 around --- when all that big snowstorm hit, the 8 Bundytown fan went down. It kept going offline. They wouldn't let nobody go in. So I remember those two 9 And then I heard --- back up a couple years. 10 times. 11 I can't tell you exactly, before my time. When the 12 wall was running before --- not this time they're here, when it was running before I heard they hit a 13 gas well or a gas pocket, and they pulled everybody 14 out of the mines for a minimum of three days. 15 The company immediately shut it down and said, get out 16 17 That's what I heard the last time the longwall now.

18 was here.

19 Q. Do you remember when that was?

A. No, sir. I wasn't --- I didn't work at the mines.
I only heard my friend telling me, John Cooper, he's
no longer at this mines. He's --- he works for
Massey. But he told me that they said --- bath house
rumor, said it sounded like a jet engine when it was
going off. He said they immediately pulled everybody

out of the whole mines, and it was down for three days
 or more because of it.

3 Q. Are you aware any time that oncoming shifts were delayed or cancelled because of safety issues? 4 A. Well, again the Bundytown fan was offline. 5 MSHA wouldn't let them go in or the State wouldn't let them 6 7 go in because of something. That would happen off and Not that often, but it did happen. 8 on. Q. What about any concern --- I may have asked you 9 10 this, but maybe I haven't. Any concerns anybody had 11 with the ventilation system? I mean, ---. 12 A. Well, a couple times --- I don't know if it was the State or the Federal, they weren't happy with the 13 way the ventilation was in an area or --- I don't know 14

15 if it was the area or whatever. I can't remember the 16 actual areas, but it's happened probably while I was 17 there two or three times.

Q. Did anybody ever discuss with you or say anythingto you about being scared of going underground?

20 A. Not to me personally, no, sir.

21 Q. Did you ever work on the carbon monoxide system,

- 22 monitoring system?
- A. The CO system?

24 Q. Yes.

25 A. One night I was helping Billy Graham. We were

1 trying --- this was back when I was a trainee. I was 2 I was walking, looking for cuts in the helping him. 3 cable. We had a CO system that --- I was walking the UBB --- Lower Big Branch, LBB area, along the belt in 4 5 that range, down the mainline. I'd go in and out, and I was just trying to look for a cut in the cable. 6 Ιt 7 ended up being on the other side of the mountain, Tree 8 section. Somebody had ran across it with a scoop and had cut the cable, and Virgil fixed it when he came 9 10 But that's the only time I had ever touched it. in. 11 Q. Who maintains the system? 12 A. Virgil bowman, and I think Tom Sheet helps him, but I know Virgil Bowman. 13 Q. Do you ever look at the monitor outside on the CO 14 15 system? A. I glanced at it. The one downstairs, the big one, 16 17 I built the brackets and raised it up, but I didn't actually install it. 18 Q. What are the spacing of the CO monitors 19 20 underground? 21 A. I couldn't recall that, sir. I know on a section 22 we got one at the belt head and we would put one at 23 the tailpiece. I don't know the actual spacing between them. 24 25 Q. Did you ever have to take a piece of equipment out

1 of service?

A. As a trainee, I wouldn't --- that wasn't my
responsibility. As an outby electrician, several
times we took rides out of service because we felt
they were unsafe.

Q. Did anybody say anything to you for that? 6 7 A. Oh, no. You'd get the section bosses, grumbling 8 and griping a little bit. You know what I mean? Oh, that ain't going to hurt nothing. So you know what, 9 10 then you sign the book. But no, no upper management 11 has ever said anything to me ever about that, sir. 12 O. You're on the surface a lot. When an inspector pulls up at the guardhouse, do they --- either a State 13 or Federal, does the guard --- do they notify the mine 14 office that he's on his way up? 15 A. I'm not aware of it, sir. 22	gloves, I'd take them off and I'd put my fingers like
23	this about every 15 minutes. When I made my first
24	pass and I'm a good welder. When I made my first
25	pass, I started the second pass, the ripper head was

so cold that the first pass cracked. I never have 1 2 welds cracked. And so I had to take the torch and 3 warm it up. On that side of the mountain they had no air problems at all. On the other side, as a trainee, 4 5 like I said, the Glory Hole didn't have a lot of air moving there, but I had a gas detector and never did 6 7 It was hot. That side of the mountain, see no qas. 8 before they put the Bundytown fan on, did not have a lot of --- what I would consider a lot of air. 9 But 10 I'm not an expert now.

And then from that point on Roger and I were --- until he couldn't handle it no 13 more the second week, I worked like 11, 12 days 14 15 straight, 12, 13, 14 hours a day, where everybody else was on a four-day rotating shift 12 hours. And they 16 17 said --- they did not make me. They said, if you would, yes, we need you and Roger, if you would. But 18 19 I was not, at any time, ordered to work, but I did. 20 It was a long 11 days of my life. 21 Q. What was your job you did? 22 A. Maintaining the rides and trying to get them set up, get them ready, if something went wrong help them 23

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including empty trash, clean up, throw the food out 1 2 where they was bringing so much food in. And then he more or less 4 5 showed me, then told me to come back the next day. Q. Where did you go in the mine the first time? 6 7 Where did you tour in the mine? A. He didn't take me under. He just --- I went to 8 the mine site. That first day I didn't go under. 9 The 10 second day he put me with John Henline, outby 11 electrician, who went --- he more or less runs second 12 shift. And I worked for about three months with John 13 Henline. And that day he --- me and him went together through the mines and we went the north side. 14 We did not go on --- they had not opened the south side back 15 up other than just fire bossing. It hadn't been 16 opened up for coal. John and I would support the 17 sections if they needed parts, if a problem happened 18 19 to a belt head, if something here --- a waterline, 20 this or that, they needed this. But I probably --- when I was on the south side from 4 5 December of '08 until about August, late August of '09, I worked the south side, third shift, as a 6 7 trainee electrician, and I'll bet you the company made us walk the escapeway at least four or five times 8 during that time, at least four or five. But we 9 10 probably walked it another dozen walking out the 11 primary or the secondary because we didn't want to 12 wait on a ride. It was just a common thing. Q. Okay. Who was the supply motorman at the mine on 13 your shift? 14 A. When I first started on second shift, it was 15 Pappy --- I don't know his --- I'm sorry. You just 16 17 know these guys' nickname. Droopy and Pappy. I don't know their real names. I couldn't tell you, I swear. 18 19 Q. Did they use one or two motors to supply the rock 20 dust? 21 A. Two. You throwed rock dust in on me. They had 22 two motors when they were supplying. Droopy drove one 23 and Pappy drove one. The rock dust had a separate 24 motor. And the rock dust crew was Rodney and --- I 25 can't think of the other one. I'm trying to think of
