1 PROCEEDINGS 2 3 ATTORNEY BABINGTON: My name is Matt Babington. Today is 4 August 18th, 2010. I'm with the Office of the 5 Solicitor, U.S. Department of Labor. With me is Erik 6 7 Sherer, an accident investigator with the Mine Safety and Health Administration, MSHA, an agency of the U.S. Department of Labor. Also present are several people 10 from the State of West Virginia. I ask that they 11 state their appearance for the record. 12 MR. FARLEY: I'm Terry Farley, with the West Virginia 13 Office of Miners' Health, Safety and Training. 14 ATTORNEY KOERBER: 15 I'm Barry Koerber, Assistant Attorney 16 17 General, representing the West Virginia Office of Miners' Health, Safety and Training. 18 MS. MONFORTON: 19 20 And I am Celeste Monforton, with the 21 Governor's independent team. 22 23 RAY ARA, HAVING FIRST BEEN DULY AFFIRMED, TESTIFIED AS 24 FOLLOWS: 25

- 1 ATTORNEY KOERBER:
- 2 Sir, would you please state your full
- 3 name for the record and spell your last name?
- 4 A. Ray Anthony Ara. And my last name is spelled
- $5 \quad A-R-A$ .
- 6 ATTORNEY KOERBER:
- 7 And would you please provide your home
- 8 address and your telephone number?
- 9 A. (b)(7)(C) The ZIP is
- 10 (b) (7)(C) Phone number (b) (7)(C)
- 11 ATTORNEY KOERBER:
- 12 Sir, do you have an attorney or other
- personal representative here with you today?
- 14 A. No.
- 15 ATTORNEY KOERBER:
- 16 Sir, are you appearing here today because
- of a subpoena?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 ATTORNEY KOERBER:
- 20 And is this a copy of that subpoena?
- 21 A. Yes, it is.
- 22 ATTORNEY KOERBER:
- 23 Would you make that Exhibit One?
- 24 (R. Ara Exhibit One marked for
- 25 identification.)

- 1 ATTORNEY KOERBER:
- 2 And this is a copy of the green card
- 3 evidencing where Maxine signed for this. We're going
- 4 to make that Exhibit Two.
- 5 (R. Ara Exhibit Two marked for
- 6 identification.)
- 7 A. Yes.
- 8 ATTORNEY KOERBER:
- 9 Okay. Sir, the statute that gives the
- 10 Director authority to issue subpoenas requires the
- Director to pay a \$40-a-day witness fee, plus 40 (sic)
- 12 cents a mile round trip from your home to here and
- back, together with any tolls that you may have passed
- 14 to and from this place. In order to receive that
- money, we have two forms that must be filled out, one
- of which is an IRS form requesting your Social
- 17 Security number. You will receive a 1099
- miscellaneous for a \$40 witness fee. We can fill
- 19 those forms out at the end of the interview so that
- 20 you will get paid sometime in the future or you can
- 21 decline, but you must make your choice on the record
- 22 now.
- 23 A. I decline.
- 24 ATTORNEY KOERBER:
- 25 You decline the money?

- 1 A. Yes.
- 2 ATTORNEY KOERBER:
- 3 Thank you.
- 4 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 5 There are several members of the
- 6 investigation team also present in the room today.
- 7 Terry Farley will be conducting the initial
- 8 questioning.
- 9 All members of the Mine Safety and Health
- 10 Accident Investigation Team and all members of the
- 11 State of West Virginia Accident Investigation Team
- 12 participating in the investigation of the Upper Big
- 13 Branch Mine explosion shall keep confidential all
- information that is gathered from each witness who
- 15 provides a statement until the witness statements are
- 16 officially released. MSHA and the State of West
- 17 Virginia shall keep this information confidential so
- 18 that other ongoing enforcement activities are not
- 19 prejudiced or jeopardized by a premature release of
- 20 information. This confidentiality requirement shall
- 21 not preclude investigation team members from sharing
- 22 information with each other or with other law
- 23 enforcement officials. Team members' participation in
- this interview constitutes their agreement to keep
- 25 this information confidential.

- 1 Government investigators and specialists
- 2 have been assigned to investigate the conditions,
- 3 events and circumstances surrounding the fatalities
- 4 that occurred at the Upper Big Branch Mine-South on
- 5 April 5th, 2010. The investigation is being conducted
- 6 by MSHA under Section 103(a) of the Federal Mine
- 7 Safety and Health Act and the West Virginia Office of
- 8 Miners' Health, Safety and Training. We appreciate
- 9 your assistance in this investigation.
- 10 A. Thank you.
- 11 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 12 You may have your personal attorney
- present during the taking of this statement or another
- 14 personal representative, if MSHA has permitted it, and
- 15 you may consult with your attorney or representative
- 16 at any time. Your identity and the content of this
- 17 conversation will be made public at the conclusion of
- 18 the interview process and may be included in the
- 19 public report of the accident, unless you request that
- 20 your identity remain confidential or your information
- 21 would otherwise jeopardize a potential criminal
- 22 investigation. If you request us to keep your
- identity confidential, we will do so to the extent
- 24 permitted by law. That means that if a judge orders
- us to reveal your name or if another law requires us

- 1 to reveal your name or if we need to reveal your name
- for other law enforcement purposes, we may do so.
- Also, there may be a need to use the information you
- 4 provide to us or other information we may ask you to
- 5 provide in the future in other investigations into and
- 6 hearings about the explosion. Do you understand?
- 7 A. Yes, I do.
- 8 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 9 Do you have any questions?
- 10 A. No.
- 11 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 12 After the investigation is complete, MSHA
- 13 will issue a public report detailing the nature and
- causes of the fatalities in the hope that greater
- 15 awareness about the causes of accidents can reduce
- 16 their occurrence in the future. Information obtained
- 17 through witness interviews is frequently included in
- 18 these reports. Since we will be interviewing other
- individuals, we request that you not discuss your
- 20 testimony aside from a personal representative or
- counsel.
- 22 The court reporter will record your
- 23 interview. Please speak loudly and clearly. If you
- do not understand a question asked, please ask the
- 25 interviewer to rephrase it. Please answer each

- 1 question as fully as you can, including any
- 2 information you've learned from someone else. I'd
- 3 like to thank you in advance for your appearance here.
- 4 We appreciate your assistance in this investigation.
- 5 A. You're welcome.
- 6 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 7 Your cooperation is critical in making
- 8 the nation's mines safer. After we've finished asking
- 9 questions, you'll have an opportunity to make a
- 10 statement and provide us with any other information
- 11 that you believe to be important. If at any time
- 12 after the interview you recall any additional
- information that you believe might be useful, please
- 14 contact any of us at the contact information provided.
- 15 Finally, any statements given by miner
- 16 witnesses to MSHA are considered to be an exercise of
- 17 statutory rights and protected activity under Section
- 18 105(c) of the Mine Act. If you believe any discharge,
- 19 discrimination or other adverse action is taken
- 20 against you as a result of your cooperation with this
- 21 investigation, you're encouraged to immediately
- contact MSHA and file a complaint under Section 105(c)
- of the Act. Terry?
- 24 MR. FARLEY:
- 25 Mr. Ara, I'd like to advise you that the

- 1 West Virginia Mine Safety Regulations, the West
- Virginia Code, 22A, Article One, Section 22, also
- 3 provides protection against discrimination for coal
- 4 miners who participate in these type interviews.
- 5 Should you experience any such problems, I will give
- 6 you some contact information for the West Virginia
- 7 Board of appeals, which hears complaints about such
- 8 things. I'll also give you my business card and phone
- 9 number for Bill Tucker, our lead underground
- 10 investigator. Should you have any issues, feel free
- 11 to contact us. Also, I would advise you that should
- 12 you have a problem, you need to file a complaint
- within 30 days of when it happens. Okay?
- 14 A. Okay.
- 15 EXAMINATION
- 16 BY MR. FARLEY:
- 17 Q. Would you state your --- you've already done that.
- 18 Excuse me. How long have you been a coal miner?
- 19 A. Since 1974.
- Q. Been a while, 36 years.
- 21 A. Yeah. I was out for like maybe four to five years
- 22 during that time.
- Q. You've got about 30 years in?
- A. Somewhere in there, yes.
- Q. What West Virginia coal miner certifications do

- 1 you have?
- 2 A. Just a miner's certificate is all.
- 3 Q. Okay. How long have you been at Massey --- with
- 4 Massey?
- 5 A. The latter part of 2000. And they hired me into
- 6 the company in May of 2001.
- 7 Q. Okay. Where did you start to work with Massey?
- 8 A. At UBB.
- 9 Q. And you've been at UBB ever since?
- 10 A. Yes, ever since.
- 11 Q. Okay. So you were going on about nine years?
- 12 A. Yeah, it's close to about nine years.
- Q. Okay. Now, as of April 5th of this year, what was
- 14 your normal work location at the UBB Mine?
- 15 A. Up on the longwall.
- 16 Q. Okay. What was your shift?
- 17 A. Midnight shift.
- 18 Q. Okay. Now, prior to April 5th, how long had you
- 19 worked on the UBB longwall?
- 20 A. Let's see. I work a Saturday shift, which on the
- 21 midnight is a Friday night but Saturday shift.
- Q. Right.
- 23 A. That would have been --- what would that have
- been, the 3rd?
- Q. How long had you worked on the longwall? When did

- 1 you start working on the longwall? I'm sorry.
- 2 A. Okay. I don't know exactly the year or the date,
- 3 but I've worked there most of the time up on the
- 4 longwall.
- 5 Q. Okay. Well, that longwall started up I think
- 6 early September last year.
- 7 A. Oh, yes.
- 8 Q. Would you have started around that time?
- 9 A. Yes, on this --- on this particular headgate, yes.
- 10 I've been there ever since we started.
- 11 Q. Okay. I got you. Now, what was your regular job
- on the longwall?
- 13 A. I'm a utility man on the longwall.
- 14 Q. Who was your immediate supervisor?
- 15 A. Keith Stanley.
- 16 Q. Was Keith a midnight shift foreman on the
- 17 longwall?
- 18 A. Well, we had two crews, and he was my --- you
- 19 know, he was my boss on the longwall.
- 20 Q. Okay. All right. Can you name the other members
- of your crew that worked for Mr. Stanley?
- 22 A. Well, it was just --- it was just me and him and
- one more guy and then the maintenance crew.
- Q. Who is the other guy?
- 25 A. Well, one was Jimmy Williams. I had another boy

- 1 named Tommy Davis. The guy that I worked with, Terry
- 2 Dillon, he retired in January.
- Q. Okay.
- 4 A. And they just never had replaced him, and I had,
- 5 you know, a couple red hats.
- 6 Q. Okay. Now, did you have confidence in Mr.
- 7 Stanley?
- 8 A. I did.
- 9 Q. Do you feel like he made a reasonable effort to
- 10 comply with health and safety regulations?
- 11 A. Yes, I do.
- 12 Q. What was your impression of the longwall
- ventilation at UBB, now particularly in the month or
- so prior to the explosion on April 5th?
- 15 A. Well, they had some problems. Well, the reason,
- it's no secret, because MSHA had shut them down, you
- 17 know. I know one week I went to work there and they
- 18 kept us for four hours and they had --- it was either
- 19 the dayshift or evening shift, I can't remember to be
- 20 exact, but they shut them down for ventilation. I
- 21 don't know exactly where, and I got sent home. And
- then the next night I came to work, the company was
- 23 doing a ventilation change.
- Q. Okay. Now, would that have been around maybe
- 25 March 9th? Does that sound reasonable?

- 1 A. It was maybe a couple weeks before this happened,
- 2 somewhere in that area.
- Q. Okay. All right. That's close enough. Now, when
- 4 you say MSHA shut them down, how long were you down?
- 5 How long was the longwall down, the best you can
- 6 recall?
- 7 A. I think two days, the best of my recollection.
- 8 Q. Okay. Now, did you notice any change in the
- 9 longwall ventilation during the month of March? When
- 10 I say --- did the quantity and velocity of air passing
- 11 along the longwall face change during the month of
- 12 March? Did you notice a significant change?
- 13 A. Well, no, because I'm very seldom ever on the
- 14 face.
- 15 Q. Okay. Where do you normally hang out?
- 16 A. Well, it's ---.
- 17 Q. Where did you normally hang out?
- 18 A. Well, it's from the mule train --- once you get up
- 19 to the mule train, if you understand what I'm
- 20 saying, ---
- 21 Q. Yeah.
- 22 A. --- all the way up to the last open break, in that
- area, sometime down the beltline or over in Number
- Three entry. Now, the only time that we had to go on
- 25 the face is if there was as problem. Like just say we

- 1 had to go up there and we had to set a pump or the
- 2 maintenance crew needed some help from us, like you
- 3 know, they were broke down and they needed a piece
- 4 shipped up on the longwall face or shipped off or
- 5 something in that area. But other than that, you
- 6 know, I didn't stay on the face, you know, like every
- 7 night.
- 8 Q. Okay. How often did you travel across the
- 9 longwall face?
- 10 A. Gosh. That's hard to answer.
- 11 Q. Not very often, I take it?
- 12 A. No, not very often. No.
- 13 Q. Back to the ventilation issue, based on my reading
- of the longwall pre-shift and on-shift report for the
- 15 month of March, the --- as I understand it, the intake
- air on the longwall decreased from around 115,000
- cubic feet to about 55,000 cubic feet per minute
- 18 during that month. But around --- at the start of the
- 19 month it was high and near the beginning of the month
- it was at the lower end. Did you notice that change?
- 21 That would have been fairly significant.
- 22 A. Maybe at times. I don't know if I'm allowed to
- 23 say this. Just what ---.
- Q. You're allowed to say whatever you want.
- 25 A. What I don't understand is ever since I've been on

- the longwall, if the face was on the right-hand side,
- 2 the intake was on the left. If the face was on the
- 3 left-hand side, the intake would be on the right.
- 4 This time, the intake was up the track entry, and
- 5 that's the first time that I've ever seen the intake
- 6 come up the track entry. And I know when we first
- 7 started there we had to go down --- before we could
- 8 even start mining, we had to go down, plaster
- 9 stoppings and do all we could. And I was there one
- 10 evening and one of the guys that passed away, Timmy
- 11 Davis, we were going down plastering stopping.
- 12 B-Bonding is what we was doing, not just plastering
- them, and he was going and taking air readings, you
- 14 know, every time we would do a trip to see what
- 15 quantity of air that we had. And we had to do all
- that before we started running to make sure that we
- had what air that we needed to be able to operate.
- 18 O. Okay. Now, we understand that there was a
- 19 ventilation change made around February 10th of 2010.
- Now, if you were a football fan, that was Super Bowl
- 21 Sunday, if that means anything. And we understand at
- that time the return air course from the 22 Headgate
- 23 section was rerouted from where it originally traveled
- in the outby direction in the Number One entry of
- 25 Seven North to where it traveled through the crossover

- and down the longwall headgate entries in the Four and
- 2 Five entries to the outby end of the longwall and
- 3 where it came and crossed over into the tailgate. Do
- 4 you recall any such change, anything about that at
- 5 all?
- 6 A. (Indicates).
- 7 O. Sound familiar?
- 8 A. It does, but I can't remember.
- 9 Q. Okay.
- 10 A. I know that, you know, they did do a couple
- 11 ventilation changes.
- 12 Q. Okay. All right. Now, I know I asked you if you
- ever traveled across the longwall face.
- 14 A. I have, yes.
- Q. Can you give me an approximately time when is the
- last time you might have done that?
- 17 A. I cannot.
- 18 O. Okay. Well, whenever you did travel across the
- 19 longwall face, when you got to the tail side, did you
- 20 notice --- was there a date board over there where the
- 21 foreman dated up?
- 22 A. I can't remember.
- Q. Okay. Now, did you ever venture out into the
- 24 longwall tailgate entries?
- 25 A. I have before.

- 1 Q. Approximately when again?
- 2 A. I can't remember.
- Q. Okay. Would Mr. Stanley have been the person who
- 4 made the pre-shift and on-shift examinations during
- 5 your shift?
- 6 A. Yes.
- 7 Q. Now, we understand there were some doors installed
- 8 here in the longwall headgate sometime, a month or so
- 9 prior to the explosion on April 5th. And we
- 10 understand that the side partition of the doors had
- some blocks that were removed. Do you recall ---
- 12 A. I do.
- 13 Q. --- seeing those doors like that?
- 14 A. I do.
- 15 Q. Now, I said approximately a month before. Is that
- 16 correct? Is that about how you remember it?
- 17 A. Somewhere in that area. I don't know to be exact.
- 18 Q. Any idea why the doors would have been constructed
- in that manner?
- 20 A. I tell you, I honestly don't know because I had
- 21 never seen so many doors in the coal mines in all my
- life. I mean, we have to supply our own longwall and
- 23 we come and --- I mean, it seemed like every time you
- turn around you've got to open a door up. And you
- know down on the longwall --- I'm going to say two was

- 1 as set, one, two, three, four, five, six, seven,
- eight. Eight doors right there in that little short
- area. And the place you're talking about, where the
- 4 blocks are gone, I don't know if that was like for a
- 5 regulator or what. I really ---.
- 6 O. We think so.
- 7 A. Well, that's what I'm thinking, too.
- 8 Q. Speaking of doors, where did you portal?
- 9 A. On UBB side.
- 10 Q. Okay. Now, about how many sets of doors did you
- 11 normally have to pass through before you would get to
- 12 your longwall workplace?
- 13 A. Okay. I want to say two as --- just two doors is
- one set.
- 15 O. Right.
- 16 A. Okay. When you first come in, you've got one,
- two, three, four. I don't know if you've been there.
- 18 That's the red doors.
- 19 O. I've seen them.
- 20 A. Okay. One, two, three, four. When you get to
- 21 Ellis Switch, one, two, three, four --- four more
- 22 doors. And then when you get up to 78, one, two,
- three, four, five, six, seven, eight. Okay. And then
- when you get to the mouth of the longwall, you had
- one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight.

- 1 Q. I'll have to get my calculator.
- 2 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 3 Twenty-four (24).
- 4 MS. MONFORTON:
- 5 Twenty-four (24).
- 6 A. It's a lot of doors. I'm just saying two is one
- 7 set.
- 8 BY MR. FARLEY:
- 9 Q. How often did you encounter --- come upon these
- 10 doors and find one or both of them open?
- 11 A. Every now and then you may do that along ---
- mostly maybe along 78 or something. And they worked
- on that and then I think when they did a --- one of
- the ventilation changes, I think they had to turn the
- 15 doors around ---
- 16 Q. Okay.
- 17 A. --- so that, you know, the air would keep them
- 18 shut.
- 19 Q. Now, based on your understanding of the mien
- ventilation, would the doors at 78 have been a little
- 21 more critical than others maybe?
- 22 A. I don't know.
- Q. Do you know if there was an intake air crossing at
- 24 that location?
- 25 A. I'd say --- I'm thinking --- I'm thinking so. I

- 1 can't remember if that was where ---.
- Q. All right.
- 3 A. I don't know if that was the first set of doors
- 4 you went through right there. I think --- I remember
- 5 seeing an intake --- well, you know, the green markers
- for the intake.
- 7 Q. Okay. Before the explosion on April 5th, what
- 8 would have been the last shift that you worked?
- 9 A. It was a --- it was a Friday night, a Saturday
- 10 shift. That would have been the 3rd, Sunday would
- 11 have been the 4th, Monday was the 5th.
- 12 Q. Uh-huh (yes).
- 13 A. So the 3rd. I didn't even have to work. I went
- out and worked an extra day.
- 15 Q. Okay. So Saturday morning would have been
- 16 your ---
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 O. --- would have been your last shift? Now, during
- 19 your last shift on the longwall, did you see or
- 20 experience anything unusual, ---
- 21 A. I did not.
- Q. --- anything different from any other day?
- 23 A. I did not.
- Q. Did you notice any unusual smells?
- 25 A. No.

- 1 Q. Did you ever have any burning sensation in your
- eyes, particularly when you passed through the area of
- 3 78?
- 4 A. Never have.
- 5 Q. Okay. Do you recall what work you did that night?
- 6 A. I knew you was going to ask that. I can't. I've
- 7 even --- some of the guys I worked with --- that I
- 8 worked with that night, I said, you know, I can't even
- 9 remember what I done.
- 10 Q. Do you recall what anybody else might have done?
- 11 A. No. We may have been cleaning up some crash or
- something. What my main job is, we have to supply our
- own longwall. That's just something that we do,
- because we have a lot of things to bring out. And we
- get our motor supplies, we go in and we have to keep
- 16 --- we go up to the last open break, where they take
- the structure out, where they retreat, have to keep
- 18 that out, moved down. If there's enough monorail on
- 19 the rack, we have to run it down, re-hang it. We may
- 20 have to put up supply doors, take them down. We do
- all the power moves, you know, when they retreat.
- When they can't retreat more, we do the power move on
- 23 the longwall. And we get ready for that and just, you
- know, any other thing that may be on, like we may have
- to set a pump somewhere or we may have to help the

- 1 maintenance crew if they need help or --- basically
- 2 it's just utility work, anything on the longwall.
- Q. Let me ask it this way. Do you recall doing
- 4 anything during that last shift that was out of your
- 5 normal routine?
- 6 A. No.
- 7 Q. Okay. And you mentioned pumps. Were there any
- 8 pumps set along the longwall face as of your last
- 9 shift?
- 10 A. The best of my knowledge, no, that I can recall.
- 11 Q. Okay. Do you recall some previous water
- 12 problems ---
- 13 A. Oh, yes.
- Q. --- on the longwall?
- 15 A. Yes.
- 16 Q. Can you tell me about that, please?
- 17 A. Well, we had some --- we had some problems on the
- 18 face. I really don't know exactly, I quess, what ---
- 19 I don't know if it was coming out of the top, bottom
- or --- I know we had water inby the wall. I ain't ---
- 21 I've hardly ever seldom worked on a longwall that we
- didn't have some kind of water problem.
- 23 Q. Okay. Now, can you give me an approximate
- timeframe when it was, the last time you had
- 25 significant water problems on the longwall?

- 1 A. I can't give you a significant time.
- Q. Could it have been January or February?
- 3 A. Possibly.
- 4 Q. We also understand there may have been some major
- 5 problems in November or December of 2009. Does that
- 6 sound ---?
- 7 A. I don't know about the day to be accurate, but
- 8 yes, there was some water problems inby the wall
- 9 because I know around 74 Break, after we done
- 10 retreated by that, that --- I know this. My partner,
- 11 he retired in January, so I remember he wasn't done
- 12 yet, and he was one of the guys that helped us
- take --- well, Keith and Jimmy, before we got there,
- had took the pump inby and we had to replace it, and
- 15 we took the starter box in.
- 16 O. Now, ---.
- 17 A. That was over in One, Two, Number Three entry.
- 18 Q. Okay. Now, did you carry a methane detector?
- 19 A. I didn't, no.
- 20 O. Who did?
- 21 A. Keith.
- Q. Anybody else you remember?
- 23 A. Yeah, Shannon, the maintenance crew.
- Q. Anybody else you can think of?
- 25 A. Yeah, Shannon, Shannon Dickens, he carried one.

- 1 and I know Steve Gration was there. He carried one.
- 2 And why I say that like that, we had crews like when
- 3 we were working that their maintenance crew was off
- 4 and me and Keith and whoever my partner was and our
- 5 maintenance crew worked.
- 6 Q. Now, we understand that the UBB longwall panel,
- 7 shown on this map, went on line and started up very
- 8 early in September of 2009. Now, during that period
- 9 of time, while you worked as a utility man in the
- 10 vicinity of the longwall, are you aware of anyone
- 11 detecting any methane at any time at any location
- 12 around the longwall?
- 13 A. Yes. This was inby the face or was this --- I
- don't think --- I can't remember if it had started
- 15 running yet or not. I just remember this guy come
- down and told someone he got a little bit of gas and
- 17 he took off and they went up there and I don't know
- 18 what they done.
- 19 Q. Okay. Did you say that you think this was before
- the longwall went on line?
- 21 A. I think this might have been before they had
- 22 started running.
- 23 Q. Okay. Now, was the Bandytown fan on line at that
- 24 time?
- 25 A. I don't know.

- 1 Q. All right. Do you recall what the quantity of
- 2 methane was that the individual was talking about?
- 3 A. I can't remember the quantity.
- 4 Q. Did it sound like a dangerous amount? Was it more
- 5 than one percent?
- 6 A. I don't believe it was.
- 7 Q. Okay. All right. You don't recall the person you
- 8 heard that from?
- 9 A. If I think about it here in a minute, I'll tell
- 10 you.
- 11 Q. Okay. Please do.
- 12 A. Because ---.
- Q. Please do. Now, we understand that the longwall
- was equipped with two methane monitor devices. Do you
- have any knowledge of the UBB longwall methane
- 16 monitoring systems ever being bridged out, defeated or
- in any way manually overridden?
- 18 A. Not to the best of my knowledge, no.
- 19 Q. Okay.
- 20 A. Because like I say, I don't --- I don't work on
- 21 production. I don't know what goes on, unless you
- just hear it from hearsay or something like that. But
- I've never known, to my knowledge --- I ain't saying
- it ain't never been done, but just to the best of my
- knowledge, I don't know. I've not heard of anything.

- 1 Q. During the midnight --- your midnight shift, who
- was responsible for maintaining and calibrating the
- 3 longwall system methane monitors?
- 4 A. I guess it would be the maintenance crew.
- Q. Okay.
- 6 A. Electricians.
- 7 Q. All right. Do you remember having any
- 8 conversations with them about what methane monitor
- 9 maintenance or maintenance repairs or calibration ---?
- 10 A. No.
- 11 Q. Okay. I think I asked you if there were any pumps
- on the longwall face as of your last shift, didn't I?
- 13 A. You did, and I couldn't remember if they were or
- 14 not.
- 15 O. Okay.
- 16 A. There have been pumps on the face because I helped
- 17 set them. I've been in the water.
- 18 Q. Prior to the start-up of this longwall panel, what
- 19 area of the mine did you work in?
- 20 A. The same area, you know, that I explained to you.
- 21 I'll tell you again if I need to.
- 22 Q. That's all right. Were you ever involved in any
- 23 major equipment moves, moving mining machines like
- 24 miners, roof bolters, shuttle cars, et cetera, from
- one place to another?

- 1 A. Some, not a whole lot of them. Maybe like a track
- 2 bolter that we used on the longwall face when we do a
- move. Mostly them other, you know, it was like miner
- 4 sections, you know, the guys that do that. Now, as
- far as moving a lot of longwall shields, I have.
- 6 Q. Okay. Now, coming and going at UBB during the two
- or three months prior to the explosion on April 5th,
- 8 how often did you have conversations with the people
- 9 who worked on the Headgate 22 or Tailgate 22 sections,
- 10 miner sections? Did you run into them?
- 11 A. Hardly ever seen them unless we were just --- we
- were going in and they were coming out, like, you
- know, just switching out because there's --- you know,
- some of the guys I didn't know, you know, and there
- 15 was a couple that I had worked with before and another
- 16 guy specifically I know that worked on the longwall
- for a long time, used to, you know, holler at him when
- 18 he'd come by or something like that.
- 19 Q. Did you ever work with a foreman named Jerry
- 20 Burdoff?
- 21 A. Yeah, right now. I just say that because he's
- 22 kind of outside. As far as back then, no.
- Q. Now, where were you at the time of the explosion
- on April 5th?
- 25 A. In the bed. Well, the reason I say that, we were

- going --- we were supposed to go out and move power
- that night. I think I was going to be off that night,
- 3 but I think we were going out --- we were going to
- 4 have a power move on the longwall. And I had laid
- 5 down, and the guy that I was telling you about that
- 6 retired, he lives down Route 3, and all the ambulances
- 7 and everything was going by. He --- in other words,
- 8 he called and told my wife to wake me up, that
- 9 something had happened. He didn't know what. And so
- she woke me up and more or less I just turned the TV
- on and more or less, you know, ---.
- 12 Q. Were you involved in any of the rescue and
- 13 recovery work or anything?
- 14 A. No, sir.
- 15 EXAMINATION
- 16 BY MR. SHERER:
- 17 Q. I've got a few questions, Mr. Ara. The last few
- shifts you worked prior to the explosion, was there
- 19 much thumping and bumping coming from the gob?
- 20 A. Not that I recall.
- 21 Q. When was the last time you went down the beltline
- 22 coming off the longwall prior to the explosion?
- 23 A. I just can't remember. I wish I could give you
- some --- you know, some answers, you know.
- 25 Q. Okay.

- 1 A. I'll tell you, most of the time --- all the time
- 2 --- you know, we went down that line if we had to hang
- a monorail. You know, you had to run it down and re-
- 4 hang it, you know, so the cables and everything come
- 5 down. And every now and then I may just walk down to
- 6 check the monorail and see if the pins are in or
- 7 things like that, you know.
- 8 Q. Sure. The last time you were down there checking
- 9 anything, do you recall if there was any problems with
- 10 rock dust along that beltline?
- 11 A. Well, no, not any problem. I know that --- I
- can't tell you the exact time, but I know they had
- been up in there --- not real close, but they had been
- 14 up in there, you know, trying to get the beltline rock
- 15 dusted.
- 16 Q. Okay. When you got to the end of that shift on
- 17 Saturday morning, did you see the crew coming in for
- 18 Saturday
- 19 A. I can't remember exactly where we probably --- it
- 20 was probably in the switch somewhere at one point we
- went by, maybe at 78.
- Q. Did you ever have a chance to get over on the
- tailgate side of the wall?
- A. Not very seldom, just very seldom we ever got up
- 25 there. I was trying to think what they was --- was it

- 1 a tail drive sprocket or ---? I don't know how long
- 2 it was before that. Probably the last time I was over
- 3 there they was changing something on the tail entry,
- 4 and we went from 78 up and went up that way to the
- 5 tail entry and went over there and helped them for a
- 6 little while.
- 7 Q. Do you recall what that looked like back through
- 8 there the last time you were up there?
- 9 A. Well, yeah. As far as the tail line and
- 10 everything, it looked good. But you know, going up
- 11 totally before you get over in the tail entry, it's
- just, you know, like a little water here and there,
- and some spots are kind of low, but nothing drastic.
- 14 I know --- I remember getting over into the prop line,
- 15 you know, the props and everything had been set, you
- 16 know, looked good and everything.
- 0. What was the rock dust like back down through
- 18 there?
- 19 A. Excuse me?
- 20 O. What was the rock dust like on the tail side?
- 21 A. Well, the best of my memory, it wasn't too great
- 22 on the tail side.
- Q. Wasn't too great?
- 24 A. Yeah. I don't know how often they got over in
- 25 there and dusted or --- it ain't --- you know, it

- ain't like being on the main line or being over on the
- other side, you know, just all white and ---.
- 3 Q. So it was getting kind of gray?
- 4 A. Huh?
- 5 Q. It was getting kind of gray or was it black?
- 6 A. It was kind of grayish. It wasn't real, you know,
- 7 like black black.
- 8 Q. Do you think it was legal, 80 percent?
- 9 A. I'd say no, just my ---.
- 10 Q. Okay. Appreciate that. Were you surprised when
- this explosion happened?
- 12 A. Yes, I was.
- 13 Q. What do you think could have happened in there?
- 14 A. I don't really know. I mean, I've tried to ---
- 15 I've thought about it, thought about it, thought about
- it and tried to, you know, --- we talk about it. I
- mean, from the --- like I've told people that really
- 18 --- you know, I've talked to that really don't know
- anything about a coal mine or, you know, from the
- 20 longwall to the Ellis punch-out and where they felt
- 21 this, and what I'm hearing is from people on TV and
- 22 other people, you know, a big dust of wind that came
- out of the Ellis Portal. It's a long ways.
- Q. It's a long ways.
- 25 A. And you know, that just tells me in my mind ---

- 1 I'm talking about just me, and I've not been up there
- 2 yet, but anyway, that this was a tremendous explosion.
- 3 I mean, ---.
- 4 Q. It was.
- 5 A. And then when --- I just really don't --- it just
- 6 --- I don't know. It just --- and when you heard it
- 7 --- I know you heard about the crack.
- 8 Q. Sure.
- 9 A. Okay. Then I thought about that, you know. Did
- 10 it come up? Did the methane come up from there and
- 11 ignite, I don't know, ---
- 12 Q. Sure.
- 13 A. --- behind the gob line? I just don't know. It
- just --- I just know it's a tremendous explosion. I'd
- 15 like to know myself.
- 16 O. Sure. I understand.
- 17 A. It's just --- I mean, to try to think, well, was
- it that or something else or did it start up here on
- 19 the longwall or did it --- was it down here on
- 20 Headgate 22? See, I don't know anything about that
- 21 area.
- 22 Q. Sure. Now, you mentioned early on that you've
- 23 done something on the tailgate section. What did you
- 24 do up there?
- 25 A. I'm trying to --- I think it was a tail sprocket.

- 1 Q. Okay.
- 2 A. I think that's what we changed, ---
- Q. Okay.
- 4 A. --- was a tail sprocket.
- 5 Q. How did you get up there? Did you get there from
- 6 the headgate of the longwall or did you have to go
- 7 back around to get there?
- 8 A. I don't know where 78 is on here.
- 9 Q. Seventy-eight (78) is way down here.
- 10 A. Okay. Well, yeah, 78, you went --- okay. You
- 11 went --- well, 78 is right there and you go straight
- 12 up. You go --- you know, going around. You're going
- up to the longwall.
- Q. So you came up to ---
- 15 A. Yeah.
- 16 Q. --- what you call the North Glory Mains?
- 17 A. Yeah.
- Q. You came up to probably the mouth of the Headgate
- 19 22 and then ---?
- 20 A. No, no, no. We're going --- not up to the Glory
- 21 Hole. It's 78 Break. I messed up here. Seventy-
- 22 eight (78) --- where does this go?
- 23 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 24 That goes back out to Ellis Portal.
- 25 A. Okay. We don't go that way.

- 1 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 2 This here is the tailgate of the longwall
- and this is the North Glory Mains, and here's the
- 4 headgate of the longwall.
- 5 A. From 78 you come --- you know, you come straight
- 6 up that way and went to the tail entry of Headgate 21.
- And that's the way that we went up. You know, the
- 8 track runs up through there.
- 9 BY MR. SHERER:
- 10 Q. Oh, okay.
- 11 A. And it comes so far ---
- 12 Q. Oh, okay.
- 13 A. --- and then there's a scoop up there, and we took
- 14 the scoop around ---
- 15 O. Okay.
- 16 A. --- as far as we could.
- 17 Q. Okay. Thank you. For some reason I thought you
- had gone on to this tailgate section that was driving
- 19 just off the headgate.
- A. No, not the new one.
- 21 Q. Oh, okay.
- 22 A. I'm talking about the Headgate 21 tail entry.
- Q. Okay. Thank you.
- A. That's like I say, as far as for the mouth of the
- longwall, I've only been up there just a little ways.

- 1 I've never seen the Glory Hole from the UBB side.
- Now, when the longwall went to Logan's Fork, I seen
- 3 the glory Hole from that mines.
- 4 Q. Okay.
- 5 A. I've never seen the Glory Hole from this side
- 6 because the longwall was down there for about
- two-and-a-half to three years, ---
- 8 O. Sure.
- 9 A. --- and then it came back.
- 10 Q. Thank you.
- 11 A. You're welcome.
- 12 Q. Did you ever have any opportunity to travel back
- behind the current longwall, back toward the Bandytown
- 14 fan?
- 15 A. As far as I've been since the long --- since they
- started mining --- and like I was telling you earlier,
- when they retreated, we had to go inby the wall, I
- 18 think it was around 74 Break, and that's when we was
- 19 having to change that pump out.
- 20 Q. Did you ever get any further than that?
- 21 A. No. After the wall started, no.
- 22 Q. Did you get further back in there before the wall
- 23 started?
- 24 A. Yeah. I don't know exactly where it was at. I
- 25 think --- maybe you can help me. I can't remember

- 1 what break. I think it was around 78 that the
- longwall face started, you know, when we first
- 3 started.
- 4 Q. It started up right here at Break 80.
- 5 A. Okay. I was close. Okay. Yeah, before we were
- 6 in there, inby, because we still had track in there
- 7 and they still had a beltline in there and some belt
- 8 head stuff they had to get out before we started
- 9 mining, then we were back in there setting --- don't
- 10 know exactly. I know we had to set a whole lot of
- 11 props back in there before we could even start mining.
- 12 Q. Did you have to pull out that belt structure?
- 13 A. Have I ---?
- Q. Back toward Bandytown.
- 15 A. No.
- 16 Q. Okay. Now, do you run the motor much?
- 17 A. Oh, a lot.
- 18 Q. Do you have a methane detector?
- 19 A. I don't.
- Q. Do you have a buddy that works with you on the
- 21 motor?
- 22 A. Yeah. Jerry Martin, he carries one.
- 23 Q. Okay.
- A. But that only happened here --- I don't even have
- to tell you this, but this only happened here, I don't

- 1 know, the last several months because --- well, I was
- 2 told one time at Logan's Fork I come out and --- well,
- 3 you probably heard of him, Eugene White, we went and
- 4 took a gas test and everything, and they told us that
- 5 one of us where we were outby like that needed one,
- 6 and I never did get one. That's the last I heard of
- 7 it. But we had an annual retraining before this
- 8 happened, and when I went and took my gas test I know
- 9 Jerry had had his before me and he got one and I told
- 10 him that, you know, we were not there all the time
- 11 together, that I needed one, and they were in the
- 12 process of getting me one, ---
- 13 Q. Okay.
- 14 A. --- you know, to --- so that I could carry ---.
- 15 But I know when we went down --- since this happened,
- 16 I've been back and forth through UBB and Revolution
- and me or him once didn't carry one.
- 18 O. Now, before the explosion, did you ever notice
- 19 your friend Jerry's methane detector going off
- anywhere?
- 21 A. No.
- 22 Q. Okay. What about when you were working
- 23 underground? Did you ever hear of somebody get on the
- 24 mine phone or somebody tell you that there were
- inspectors on the property?

- 1 A. Well, yeah, I've heard that since I've been in the
- 2 coal mines.
- 3 Q. That's pretty common?
- 4 A. Yeah, it is.
- 5 Q. Okay. Thank you. Did you ever watch anybody work
- 6 on a methane detector or methane monitor on the
- 7 shearer of the tailgate, calibrating it or working on
- 8 it, anything like that?
- 9 A. Maybe sometime during being on the longwall I
- 10 probably have, but not paid, you know, a whole lot of
- 11 attention to it.
- 12 Q. Have you ever heard anybody talking about messing
- with those monitors or bridging them out?
- 14 A. No.
- 15 O. Did you think the ventilation in this mine was
- 16 adequate?
- 17 A. Well, I do and I don't. And why I say the don't
- 18 part is because it just seemed like there for a while
- 19 --- I know what all we had to do before we got
- 20 started, about doing the B-Bonding of the stoppings
- and getting the air --- evidently they got it or they
- 22 wouldn't have been able to run. And I'm sure when an
- inspector comes there and shuts it down, he has to
- come back and check it, you know, to okay it. So that
- tells me that it's okay, so --- you know, what happens

- in the process from the time he leaves is not saying
- 2 the company does anything wrong. You know if a
- 3 stopping gets blowed out or, you know, a roof fall,
- 4 and I don't mean a major --- or a rib roll or
- 5 anything.
- 6 0. Sure.
- 7 A. It don't take a lot for, you know, your air to get
- 8 changed, you know. And why I say that don't part is
- 9 just because of all the doors and like MSHA, you know,
- 10 shut them down and then the ventilation change, and I
- 11 noticed some of the dayshift foreman had been in there
- before, you know, trying to work on the air. It just
- 13 seemed like --- it seemed like to me that they had a
- 14 problem ---
- 15 O. Sure.
- 16 A. --- that they were trying to work on and not
- saying --- and I'm not saying that this had anything
- 18 to do with any explain, but I'm just saying that it
- 19 seemed like there was some kind of a ventilation
- 20 problem because of all the things that were going on,
- 21 trying to work on the air.
- 22 Q. Sure.
- 23 A. And I told people that --- you know, that we've
- 24 talked about and they don't --- just because of that,
- 25 that don't mean it had one thing to do with the

- 1 explosion. You could have enough air and everything,
- and just like I said, sir, in a crack and you got
- 3 to --- this is what I'm thinking. If you got a big
- 4 buildup of methane like that or something, I don't
- 5 care how much air you've got. That's my opinion now.
- 6 A. Sure. I hear you. So you think there was a lot
- 7 of fussing going on with the ventilation?
- 8 A. I don't know. There was a CO2 section over to the
- 9 right hand of us, but then they got out of there and
- 10 they were trying --- I think they were trying --- they
- were trying to where they were --- let's see now. Oh,
- 12 gosh. They were trying to --- intake, return. They
- were trying to get it right, you know. Our return ---
- no, that was this way. Anyway, their return couldn't
- come up this way, like One, Two, Three entry. You
- 16 know, their return couldn't come down here. And they
- were up there and they were getting in overcasts and
- 18 stuff and --- I think they got that all taken care of.
- 19 Q. Okay. Now, did you ever have to stay out of the
- 20 mine or get pulled out early for any sort of
- ventilation change?
- 22 A. I have before. If they were going to do it, they
- got us out. And I know the last one, when they were
- 24 going --- I can recall that they done that ventilation
- change, we didn't even go in. Only the foremen did.

- 1 Q. Sure. Do you know about when that was in
- 2 relationship to the explosion? Was it a week before
- 3 or two weeks, three weeks?
- 4 A. I'll just give you an estimate. I'm just going to
- 5 say maybe two to three weeks, somewhere in that area.
- 6 Q. Okay. Did you ever hear of people opening and
- 7 closing these track doors to try to redirect air to or
- 8 from certain parts of the mine?
- 9 A. No. We just throw up another set.
- 10 Q. Okay. That's a different approach.
- 11 A. I don't mean to laugh because I just --- that
- about wears me out, opening and closing them doors,
- especially, I mean, if I was by myself.
- 14 O. Sure.
- 15 A. I had to come out one morning by myself because I
- had a doctor's appointment or something, said,
- goodness gracious. It will be a while before I get
- 18 outside.
- 19 Q. Maybe it wore the air out trying to get out.
- 20 A. I'll tell you some hearsay. And I can't say who
- 21 said it, this and that, but the only thing I can say
- is that some of the doors, somewhere or something,
- 23 they just --- and they did do some overcasts here
- lately down on the wall and stuff, and I just heard
- sometimes they'd just throw up a set of doors

- 1 sometimes because they didn't want to take the time to
- do an overcast.
- Q. We've heard that. But when you got so many people
- 4 going in and out of the mine and so many doors, you
- 5 can pay for overcasts real quick.
- 6 A. I know. I agree.
- 7 Q. Okay.
- 8 MR. SHERER:
- 9 That's all the questions I've got.
- 10 A. Okay.
- 11 EXAMINATION
- 12 BY MS. MONFORTON:
- 13 Q. I think I just have two questions. The first is
- 14 you worked at UBB for a long time, ---
- 15 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 16 Q. --- almost a decade, and a lot of years in the
- 17 mine.
- 18 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 19 Q. And I'm just wondering over that time you were at
- 20 UBB did you notice anything different about the way
- 21 the mine operated, you know, maybe from the time you
- were there until the more recent years?
- 23 A. Yes. The only thing I can say, that I know that
- when we went to Logan's fork, I can't remember what
- year, but anyway, there were different management ---

1 I'm going to say as of superintendent and some 2 different people there. Then when we went to Logan's 3 fork there were some changes. And I just heard other people say that we've talked to --- this was before we 4 5 even came back, that, you know, it just wasn't the same with these different people. You know, it's ---6 7 and I'm saying they were like --- before when I was there, and I hate to say this, people get so jealous about the longwall. If the longwall needed it, they 9 10 got it. And I'm not saying the other people didn't 11 need it, but if you needed something, you got it. 12 didn't matter, you got it. You needed it. seemed like since that change they were --- with 13 different people running it, that they were trying to 14 cut here and cut there. And I can understand that, 15 but it was just like a different atmosphere management 16 17 people. And I just heard several people say that, and it 18 was kind of different when we came back. It wasn't 19 20 like the same when we left, you know. And I'm going 21 to say his name even. Wendell Wills was the 22 superintendent when I was there. And I'll never forget this. And I seen him at one of the wakes. 23 24 even another boy said, you know, maybe if he had been 25 there, this wouldn't have happened. And the reason I

- 1 say that because I didn't know Wendell wills was even
- 2 in the coal mines one night, and we were coming down
- 3 the track entry and here he come through the doors.
- 4 And I said, Wendell, we didn't know you were here. He
- 5 said --- and he told us, he said, I was laying in bed
- 6 and I was thinking about this air and stuff, and he
- 7 said, I just got up and come down here, went inby the
- 8 wall, checking this, checking that. And he said, I
- 9 was concerned. I don't know if you --- you know what
- 10 I'm trying to say? And it's just different people and
- just, you know, it wasn't the same.
- 12 Q. You mentioned a little bit about a cut here, a cut
- there. I'm assuming you mean like cutting corners?
- 14 A. I don't mean in --- I don't mean in safety. I'm
- talking about like in things you might need, like
- supplies and things like that for the longwall and
- work and things.
- 18 Q. So maybe it just makes it a little more difficult
- 19 for you to do your job ---
- 20 A. Right. Right.
- 21 Q. --- for you to do your job well?
- 22 A. Right.
- Q. Okay. You mentioned you worked in the mine for a
- long time, and you've always heard through your years
- when the inspector was on the property?

- 1 A. I've heard --- not every time, but I've heard
- 2 that, why sure.
- 3 Q. Kind of a common practice?
- 4 A. Why sure it is.
- 5 Q. What do you think if someone were to say to you
- 6 that notifying someone underground that an inspector
- 7 is there is illegal? Would that surprise you?
- 8 A. No, because I know at one mine I worked at one
- 9 time the superintendent of the mines anyway, they
- 10 called in and they wrote this superintendent up for
- involving himself in an investigation.
- 12 Q. For impeding the inspection?
- 13 A. Right. Yeah, for --- he told them --- they called
- 14 him. He told --- called and told. And they, you
- know, found out about it. In other words, they got
- 16 him for, you know, involving his self in an
- 17 investigation.
- 18 O. Do you think most miners understand that that's
- 19 illegal, that they truly understand that's illegal?
- 20 A. I don't really believe. I don't really believe
- 21 everyone does. Maybe some do.
- 22 Q. And so if that were really made known, what do you
- 23 think would happen to how things operate underground
- 24 when the inspector shows up?
- 25 A. Well, I think it should be made well known and put

- 1 that's illegal, you know. I think so. I think it
- 2 would --- I think it would make people think a little
- 3 bit more than just saying it's okay. Like I said,
- 4 it's happened for years and may still --- probably
- 5 still happen, but it needs to be. You know, this is
- 6 wrong and that you can be --- you know, fined or
- 7 something for --- for, you know, involving yourself in
- 8 an investigation with an inspector. I mean, now, you
- 9 know --- years ago I don't know about if it was, but
- 10 you know, I can be fined myself, not just the company.
- 11 You know, they can fine me for something and ---.
- 12 Q. Very good. I appreciate your ---.
- 13 A. It makes me think.
- Q. I appreciate your honesty. Thank you.
- 15 A. You're welcome.
- 16 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 17 Terry?
- 18 RE-EXAMINATION
- 19 BY MR. FARLEY:
- 20 Q. During your last shift at UBB, which would have
- 21 been April the 3rd, were you around the longwall
- 22 conveyor belt?
- 23 A. I don't believe I was.
- Q. Okay. Well, which --- the last time you were
- around the longwall conveyor belt, which direction was

- 1 the air movement on the belt?
- 2 A. I might --- I could be wrong. I think it was
- 3 coming up the belt.
- 4 Q. Coming toward the face?
- 5 A. Toward the face, I think.
- 6 Q. All right.
- 7 A. We'd have to --- I know we had been building ---
- 8 they're like building some, you know, belt checks, you
- 9 know, the beltline.
- 10 Q. Okay. All right. But you're not sure about when
- 11 that last time you noticed ---?
- 12 A. No.
- 13 Q. Okay. All right.
- 14 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 15 Well, there's the two documents from the
- 16 beginning. One is a copy of the subpoena. I took
- 17 that. That will be part of the interview, and that
- will be marked Ara One. And then there's a copy of
- 19 the return receipt for the subpoena. That will be
- 20 marked Ara Two.
- 21 On behalf of MSHA and the Office of
- 22 Miners' Health, Safety and Training, I want to thank
- 23 you for appearing and answering questions today. Your
- 24 cooperation is very important in the investigation as
- 25 we work to determine the cause of the accident.

- 1 We request that you not discuss your
- 2 testimony with any person, again, aside from your
- 3 personal representative or counsel. After questioning
- 4 other witnesses, we may call you if we have any
- follow-up questions. If at any time you have
- 6 additional information regarding the accident that
- 7 you'd like to provide to us, please contact us at the
- 8 contact information previously provided.
- 9 If you wish, you may now go back over any
- answer you've given during this interview, and you may
- 11 also make any statement that you'd like to make at
- 12 this time.
- 13 A. Well, the only thing I can say is --- I'm trying
- to think myself here. You know, this is a terrible
- thing that happened. I pray that it never happens
- 16 again anywhere. And I'm just here, trying to answer
- the questions the best I can. I'm not saying anything
- 18 that the company done was wrong, that may have caused
- this or any individual, that it was just one of these
- things that just --- you know, things happen in life,
- and tragedies happen, but I know at times in life that
- there is things that happen that can be prevented, you
- know, if we can prevent them, any of us, that we can
- and we should. And I know that times in life there's
- 25 negligence in things that happen in life, and I just

- 1 really hate that this happened, and it's just a tragic
- 2 thing. And I don't know --- I talk about it to
- 3 somebody every day. And just like a guy at work said,
- I wonder how long this will go that we'll --- may
- forget this. And we may probably never ever forget
- 6 this. And I know, you know, as far as UBB, like this
- 7 reporter called me, that's what he said he was, from
- 8 Utah, and he wanted some information, this and that.
- 9 And I don't even know how he got my number. He said
- 10 he was doing a documentary. This is a little bit
- 11 after this happened. And he had more information than
- 12 I even knew. And I answered a few questions for him
- and this and that. he was wanting names. I wouldn't
- give him no names. I told him I didn't want my name
- 15 put in no documentary. And then at last he wanted
- some more, and I said, I'm not giving you no names.
- 17 Anyway, he never did call back.
- 18 As far as UBB, I've been to Revolution three
- 19 times. I've been back up to UBB three times, and
- that's where I'm at now. And I couldn't wait to come
- 21 back. And like I told him, I'd go back tomorrow.
- This is after this happened. I'd go back up there now
- 23 if I could. I liked the mines. It's a good place to
- work. I've worked at Logan's Fork. I've worked at
- 25 Revolution. I've worked at Round Bottom, just a

- 1 little bit there, and --- well, I just --- I love
- working there. And it may never open back up, I don't
- 3 know, but --- or anything like that, but I liked the
- 4 mines. I liked the work. I didn't --- it could
- 5 happen anywhere. It can happen anywhere you work.
- 6 There's a possibility of it happening. It could
- 7 happen. I try --- a person --- you just have to do
- 8 the best you can and not --- you just can't dwell on
- 9 it. Since I've been back in there, you know --- when
- 10 I first went back in there that day, went back in
- there, rode the mantrip, I thought about everybody as
- 12 I was going in the drift mouth, but we just got in
- with the working and ---. God has helped me with it.
- 14 I'll just put it like that. And I like working there.
- I guess I'll work there until you can't work there no
- 16 more. That's about all I have to say.
- 17 RE-EXAMINATION
- 18 BY MR. SHERER:
- 19 Q. Can I ask you one question, Mr. Ara?
- 20 A. Yes.
- 21 Q. You said you hope that this never happens again.
- 22 A. I really do.
- Q. What can we do to help prevent this?
- A. Well, I know MSHA inspectors, all the State,
- 25 Federal, they're going to, you know, do their

- 1 inspections. And like I said, it needs to be known
- 2 well to people that --- I can't think of the right
- 3 word, they try to intercede in investigations or
- 4 things like that. You know, they can be held liable.
- 5 And I know you've got to be tough and strict and I
- 6 know you --- and you know as well as I do --- what I'm
- 7 saying, you can you so tough and strict, there ain't
- 8 a coal mines could even operate. We know that, you
- 9 know. We can be as safe as we can in the laws and
- 10 what we have to do and ---. The MSHA can do their
- job, Federal mine inspectors, State mine inspectors.
- 12 We got to do our job, ---
- 13 Q. Thank you.
- 14 A. --- the men in the mines. We've got to do our
- job, too. You all can do your all's. If we're not
- doing ours, I don't care what you all do, it won't
- work. We both all have got to work together and, you
- 18 know, do our jobs to, you know, the best of our
- 19 ability. And that's all I can say.
- 20 ATTORNEY BABINGTON:
- 21 Thank you. And again, I want to thank
- 22 you for your cooperation in this matter.
