5	Safety & Training.

10	Branch Mine.

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MR. KOERBER: Mr. Stover, I'm going to give you three items. One is a memorandum which contains the address for the board of appeals, which is the administrative tribunal that's charged by statute with hearing minor discrimination The discrimination statute is cases. found in West Virginia Code 22A-1-22. Feel free to discuss that with your attorney at the close of the interview process, but this is the address where if you would believe that you were discriminated against because you were participating in this interview, you can bring your claim at this address. I would caution you, though, that should you believe you were discriminated against, you only have 30 days from the day of the discrimination to file your claim. Okay?

KOERBER: Okay. At this time I'd like to allow Mr. Farley to begin the 11 interview. 12 13 **EXAMINATION** BY MR. FARLEY: 14 Q. Mr. Stover, thank you for coming today. 15 You're welcome. 16 Α. I'll begin with a little background 17 Q. information if you don't mind. Where are you 18 currently employed? 19 A. Marfork Coal. 20 What do you do at Marfork Coal? 21 **Q**. 22 Α. I'm an instructor, and I'm also a registered nurse. 23 Instructor and registered nurse? 24 Q.

1 A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. Now, how long have you worked in the coal mining industry?
 - A. I worked in the coal mining industry in '81 and '82, and then I have been gone until 2007.
 - Q. When did you become a registered nurse?
 - A. 1996.
 - Q. Where did you get your training? Where did you go to school?
- A. Well, back then it was the College of West

 Virginia, which is, what, Mountain State now. Yes,

 sir.
- Q. Have you ever actually practiced as a nurse in a hospital?
- 15 A. Yes, yes.
- Q. How long did you do that?
- 17 A. From '96 up until 2007.
- Q. In 2007 you came to Marfork?
- 19 A. I came to Independence.
- 20 Q. Independence?
 - A. Yes, sir, at that time.
- Q. How many Massey companies have you actually worked for?
- A. Just Independence and Marfork.

Q. When was it you came to Marfork again?

- A. That was in -- May made me two years at Marfork. This May made me two years I have been at Marfork.
- Q. All right. Now, what's your area of responsibility with Marfork, or what was your area of responsibility as of April 5th of this year?

 Let me put it that way.
- A. I'm the instructor. I do all the instruction for Route 3, which that includes Elk Run, Marfork, and it did Upper Big Branch and Parker Peerless.
- Q. When you say you were the instructor, what type of training do you actually do?
- A. Mostly what it is is Massey, if it's a new hire or even a contractor that's going to work on Massey property, they have to go through what they call MIT. That's Massey's initial training, and that consists of our policies, you know, clothing, safety glasses, you know, how we expect things to be done like that.
 - Q. Do you do any other training?
- A. I participate in annual retraining. I'll help with that.

Do you have any coal miner's 12 Q. certifications? 13 14 Α. Yes. What do you --Q. 15 Well, you mean as far as, like, I'm an 16 instructor, also a diesel instructor, and dust 17 certified. 18 All right. Do you have like a West 19 Ο. Virginia coal miner's certification? 20 No, no. 21 Α. 22 Q. Given the fact that you are an RN, did the

company ever use you as their statutorily required

emergency medical service attendant on the job

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site?

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- Like if somebody gets hurt, I'm the -because I work day shift, I would be the one that would go, go to the site. Yes, sir.
- On April 5th, what was your location at the time of the explosion?
- I was off that day. I had a doctor's appointment, and I did not -- when I heard about that was around six o'clock that evening.
- Q. Did you have any involvement in the rescue and recovery operation?
 - Α. No, sir. No.

MR. FARLEY: I think Mr. Vance may have some more specific training related questions.

EXAMINATION

BY MR. VANCE:

- Again, Mr. Stover, thank you for coming in Q. on this. We're trying to do this investigation and check on the training of the people here that brought you in. You said you're an instructor. You're an approved MSHA instructor?
- 22
 - Α. Yes.
 - How do you get your instructor's approval? Q.

- A. That was in 2007, applied for it.
- Q. Applied for it. Did you go through any training?
- A. I applied for it, and then I had -- and I don't remember the name -- somebody came out and monitored me.
 - Q. Monitored your class?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. You said you do Massey initial training.

 Can you go through some of the materials that you use to conduct that training with?
- A. Well, a list of videos which you've seen, some of those, a list of videos. Then we have a contractor handbook, a green handbook that we give out. I go through that whole handbook with them. That consists of, you know, like if you're a red hat, you've got to have a red hat, talking about safety glasses, how metatarsals are required, safety clothing.

You know, if there's accidents on the property, how you have to go get an accident report filled out. I would go over inspection of hand tools. I do that with them. Electrical, about locking and tagging. I'd go over that with them.

Like the requirements of headlights and seat belts and stuff like that on the property.

Shelter, I'll show the shelter film with them, our fresh air base shelter, and then I'll speak with them about that, talking about the regulations like how many feet to be kept within the face and how they're going to receive — it's law you have to receive training on that during the year, two hours of training. I do that with them. I'll also do the rescuers with them.

- Q. Are you hourly or salary?
- A. Salary.

- Q. Salary. Yes, sir. Do you have any, during your training, any mine specific such as approved plans for UBB escapeway maps or anything --
 - A. No.
 - Q. -- that you cover?
- A. No, I don't.
 - Q. Do you conduct this training for contractors that work at UBB, too?
- **A. Yes.**
 - Q. Does anyone else conduct training there for the contractors at that site?

1 A. At UBB?

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- Q. Uh-huh. No, at Marfork.
- 3 A. No, sir, no.
 - Q. No contractors use that site?
 - A. Well, talking about -- well, Jim Gump will come in there or Butch. His first name was the only one I knowed him by, was Butch, and they worked through David Stanley.
 - Q. David Stanley.
- 10 A. Right.
 - Q. Do you do any training for their contractors?
- 13 **A. Yes.**
- Q. What training do you do?
- A. Their MIT training.
- Q. MIT training. Same as you do with the employees?
- A. Right.
- Q. Do you complete a 5023 for these employees?
- 21 **A. Yes.**
- Q. Explain how you fill it out.
- A. I was marking -- I would fill it out, and
 I would mark experienced miner on it, and I would

always put on it less site specific, because I did not do site specific. That's when you informed me that I was putting the date on it, and that's -- I should not put a date there.

- Q. But are you saying that MIT training is not experienced miner training?
 - A. Certain aspects of it is.
- Q. According to 48.5, experienced miner training, does it cover all the subjects?
- A. It covers the subjects that I mark on the 5023 form, like hazardous conditions, first -- not first aid -- self-rescuer, right, and electrical, which those I mark that part of it, yes.
- Q. Who continues to give them the training that you don't? You mark it as not completed?
- A. Right. And it would be at the mine site itself.
 - Q. Mine site?
 - A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. Do you send a form with the new employees stating that they need fill out at the mines about the mine tour and methods of miners --
 - A. Yes.

Q. -- and that should be conducted when?

- A. At the mine site, right.
 - Q. When is it to be signed?
 - A. When it's complete.
 - Q. When it's completed?
 - A. Yes, sir.

- Q. Do you say you do training for several mines there?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. You said awhile ago that you don't have no specific plans, escapeway maps?
 - A. No, I don't go over it with them, no.
- Q. When you began foreman at Marfork as an instructor, did the company go over their policies and procedures of how to conduct the training for their employees and contractors there? Did they provide you any training on that?
- A. Johna did. Johna would sit and talk to me about that, yes.
- Q. Can you remember what it consisted of, what the training was?
- A. Like, I would watch him do that class, the MIT class, I watched him do it a couple times, and then he would let me after that he turned it loose to me. Well, he observed me a couple of

times before he turned it over to me. Yes, sir. 1 You also said you do the strata training? Q. 2 Α. Yes. 3 Did you do that for the supervisor that Q. 4 examines these stata refuge chambers at UBB? 5 Yes. Well, no, not for UBB. No, I did 6 Α. 7 not do shelter training for UBB. Q. Do you know who does that? 8 At that time, Berman Cornett was over there, and he was the one that did the strata 10 shelter training at UBB. 11 Do you do any training for the automatic 12 Q. mining systems operators, AMS system operators? 13 14 Α. No. Do you know who does that? 15 Q. 16 Α. No. Have you ever done any training for the 17 Q. AMS operators at the mines? 18 19 Α. No. Are you familiar with the S1, P2 training 20 Q. program at Massey? 21 22 A. Yes. Do you do any training to the employees or 23 the supervisors concerning the S1 and P2 training? 24

- A. No, sir. No.
 - Q. Do you know who trains the employees or the salary people, supervisors on the S1 and P2?
 - A. No, no.
 - Q. Have you ever observed it being conducted?
- 6 A. No.

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- Q. Could you explain, just outline about what the S1 is?
- A. S1 is like their policies on certain procedures, how they want things done. Like requirements like, you know, safety glasses, hard hats, and there's other issues in there like I don't know. I don't know.
- Q. Have you seen the form that they fill out for each employee in that S1 mentor program? Are you familiar with it?
 - A. I'm familiar with that.
- Q. Is that to be conducted at the training center, some of it, or is that all to be conducted at the mines?
 - A. The part of it, the mentor program?
- 22 **Q. Yes, sir.**
- A. No, that's done at the mines, the mentor is.

- Q. Did you conduct any other training than what you've mentioned so far here?
- A. Just the standard, just certain parts of annual retraining.
- Q. Do you do any training on lifeline shelters that they use, the refuge chambers at the mines?
 - A. No, I don't do that.
 - Q. You don't do that.

- A. When you say life, I'll show them a basic lifeline, you know, one that I have there, the two kinds that we use, you know, the cone and then the aircraft aluminum wear.
- Q. Explain your SCSR training for us. Okay? How do you conduct the SCSR training?
- A. They'll watch a film, have them watch a film, then they'll have to switch from one rescuer to the other one. Okay? Then once they complete that, then I'll have them wear the canister, and I have them go in a dark room to wear the canister. That's in class.

In annual retraining, you know, I always make them -- before they do that, they put on dark glasses, they have to put on glasses that you

cannot see out of, they've got to put a rescuer on. Then they'll switch to another one with those glasses on. Then after that, then I'll give them the canister, and they'll go out and they'll go through the smoke trailer wearing the canister.

- Q. That's the expectations, right?
- A. Yes, sir.

- Q. Have you observed Jim Gump or Dave Stanley people training their employees?
- A. I have heard him talk. I have not seen him do hands-on with anything, no.
- Q. Do you do any part of the training? Just the MIT? You said you did the MIT part for them?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And so Jim Gump, he does the training for them?
- A. He would come in and speak to them about an hour about their policies and, you know, their pay and all that stuff.
- Q. Have you done training for Mountaineer Labor Solutions, any of their employees?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. How about Riot Concrete, have you done any training for them?

A. Yes. 1 It consists of MIT training, the same, Q. 2 correct? 3 Α. Yes. 4 Did you observe any of their contractors 5 Q. doing any other training besides your MIT training? 6 7 Α. No. MR. VANCE: That's all I've got. 8 **EXAMINATION** 9 BY MR. MCGINLEY: 10 I have a few questions, Mr. Stover. 11 Q. Ι didn't catch all of what you said about your 12 background. You worked for two years in the coal 13 mine? 14 Worked a year, probably about a year and 15 Α. four months. 16 Q. Where was that? 17 That was Carbon Fuel. A. 18 Q. Carbon Fuel? 19 That's in Boone County. A. 20 21 Q. In Boone. 22 A. It's no more.

That was there, in North Carolina, 15 also. 16 What did you do with Patton? 17 Q. Α. Installed air compressors and run steel 18 line for air compressors. 19 Any other jobs in North Carolina? 20 Q. That's the only two I had in North 21 Α. Carolina. 22 So that really covers the period until Q. 23 (b) (7)(C) 1995? 24

- 3 A. I'm sorry. Allen Powellton.
 - Q. Why did you go underground?
 - A. Just to take a tour.
 - Q. How long did that last?
 - A. That was all day long. That was an eight-hour shift.
 - Q. Did it have a longwall there?
- 10 **A. No.**

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- Q. What are the videos that you show in the MIT training?
- A. One is environmental insurance. Most of these are Massey. One is environmental insurance. Another one is Massey Is the Right Way to Do It, is what it's called. Strata shelter training, self-rescuer, that one. And it's an MSHA, show one of MSHA's hearing.
 - Q. MSHA?
 - A. Hearing. It's a --
- Q. You mean auditory?
- A. Yes. Then there's another one of Massey's videos I show on locking and tagging and one on the HazCom material.

- Q. Now, this training course lasts a total of eight hours?
 - A. No, sir.
 - Q. How many hours?
- A. Depending on how many I have in class, it's usually around three and a half to four hours.
 - Q. You show seven videos?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. How long are they? I mean, just approximately. Are they all 25 minutes?
 - A. No, some of them is not, no.
- Q. Some are shorter?
 - A. Fifteen. Some are shorter, yeah.
 - Q. How much talking do you do? For example, if you show the MSHA hearing video, do you say anything about it, or do you just move to the next video?
 - A. I move to the next one, and I do -- all my talking will come at the last, once all the videos and the rescuers are done, I'll do all my lecturing at the end of the class.
 - Q. Have you written out your lecture? I mean, do you have sort of an outline?
 - A. No. The guideline I go by, it's a little

contractor book that we go by.

- Q. What's that book called?
- A. It's Massey's Contractor Handbook is what it's called.
 - Q. That handbook is given to each trainee?
- A. Yes.

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- Q. How long is that book? I mean, has it got 10 pages or 500?
 - A. No, 10 or maybe 12, something like that.
- Q. Just sort of like a three-ring binder
 or --
- 12 A. No, it's just a little --
- 13 Q. It's bound?
 - A. Yeah, paperback book.
- Q. So it's only about 10 pages. Is it just sort of like an outline form?
- 17 **A. Yes.**
 - Q. Things to watch out for. What would that --
 - A. For each section, like the first section will tell about the clothes that they wear. The second section would be about hand tools, and the third would be about electrical. Then another one is about welding, and then one is about belts, and

then the other one is about the escapeways and the S1 shelters that we have underground.

- Q. Now, in your lecture after the videos, do you talk about each of these things?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. What do you say about welding?
- A. Especially like if I got a lot of red hats, and I usually do, you know, I always tell them, I say, what's the first thing you've got to do before you light a torch underground? Right.

 And I'll give them the methane, we'll do all that. Then I'll say, how often do you got to monitor that? All right.
 - Q. How often do they have to monitor?
- A. Continuously. If you're burning or cutting, it's continuously.
 - Q. What do you tell them about escapeways?
- A. I'll give them what I always do, I tell them about, you've got escapeways in the mines. I tell them, I say, when they do your mine site specific tour, they'll show you those escapeways.

 And then I also got examples of my lifeline that I use, and I make them say it out loud. I'll say, tell me your color of your primary escapeway.

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They'll say green. I say, you know, you tell me
your secondary. They'll say amber, then they'll
tell you red. I do that with them. And I'll show
them the two different kinds of lifeline that we
use over there.
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- Q. What do you say about communications in the mine, emergency communication?
 - A. That's done at the mine site.
 - Q. Do you talk about rock dusting?
- A. No.

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- Q. Do you know anything about rock dusting?
- 12 **A. Yes.**
 - Q. How can you tell when rock dusting in a mine complies with state and federal regulations and when it doesn't?
 - A. You have to do samples.
 - Q. That's really the only way you can tell?
 - A. Well, it should be white. If it's covered, it should be covered, but the samples is the way.
 - Q. But just by eyeballing it, even if it's white, you don't know if it's compliant?
 - A. No, no.
- Q. Do you have an S1 manual?

- A. There's one in the office, yes.
 - Q. That includes S1, PT.
- 3 **A. P2.**

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- 4 Q. Or P2.
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
- 6 Q. But you don't have one yourself?
- 7 **A. No.**
- Q. Do you refer to the S1 manual once a month, once a year or ever?
- 10 A. No, no.
- Q. So you couldn't really tell us what
 Massey's requirements are in the S1 manual?
- A. No, I couldn't tell you -- no, sir.
- Q. You were asked about whether you were the designated medical person in case of emergencies.
- 16 **A. Yes.**
- Q. You're that for which mines?
- A. Anything over Marfork, which we --
- 19 Q. All of the Marfork mines?
- 20 **A. Yes.**
- 21 **Q. 12 or so?**
- 22 A. Pardon?
- 23 **Q. 12 or so mines?**
- A. I think it's eight or nine, I think,

1 | maybe.

- Q. Who's that designated person on the other shifts? You work day shift only, correct?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Who were the designated medical people?
 - A. It would be the ENTs that's on that crew.
- Q. What's a 5023 form? We want to make sure the record is clear, and there was some discussion of those forms.
- A. Yes, sir. That's the MSHA form that you have to fill out on training that you do, such as experienced miner training or has, you know, new task training; any training that you do that needs to be filled out, a record of it. Annual retraining also goes on that. We fill that out for annual refraining.
- Q. So that I understand, you say you do not do experienced miner training?
 - A. Site specific.
 - Q. Site specific.
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. But you do with regard to, what, hazardous conditions, self-rescuer?
- A. Less site specific, yes, sir.

Q. How much of your work involves your 1 nursing skills and how much involves training, 2 approximately? 3 Probably 90 percent of the training; 4 Α. nursing skills, probably 10. 5 When you're answering a question about S1, 6 7 you said S1 involves wearing safety glasses? Α. I know that's part of it, some parts of it. 8 Right. Do you know anything else that S1 Q. involves? 10 Α. No. 11 Do you know, is there any formal S1 12 Q. training for hourly workers, miners working 13 underground? 14 Α. I don't know. 15 I don't have any further questions. 16 Q. you, sir. 17 You're welcome, sir. Α. 18 Well, let me ask you one follow-up 19 Q. question. I think maybe you've answered this 20 before, but have you ever seen a longwall? 21 22 Α. Yes. Operating? 23 Q.

Yes.

Α.

Q. Underground? 1 Α. Yes. 2 And that would be? Q. 3 At Independence, at Revolution. 4 Α. And when was that? 5 Q. 2007. A. 6 7 Is that that one time you said you were Q. 8 underground? No, that was when I was at Independence. 9 10 Q. So how many times have you been underground since 2007? 11 Α. I don't know. 12 Is it like more than those two times? 13 Q. Yes. 14 Α. Ten times? Q. 15 No. 16 Α. Less than 10? 17 Q. A. Yes. 18 Why did you go underground at Revolution? 19 Q. Just to watch the longwall. 20 A. How long did you observe it? 21 Q. That was all day. If I went underground, 22 A. it was a whole shift. 23 24 So they gave you a sense of how that Q.

operates. That was approximately what year? 1 Α. 2007. 2 Are you an hourly or salary? Q. 3 Α. Salary. Some people have a salary plus they can 5 Q. have overtime. Is that --6 7 No, I don't get paid for overtime. Α. Q. So it's just straight, straight salary? 8 Yes, sir. A. 10 MR. MCGINLEY: I don't have any other questions. 11 RE-EXAMINATION 12 BY MR. FARLEY: 13 A couple of quick ones. Q. 14 A. Yes, sir. 15 For Marfork and Performance, which would 16 have included the UBB mine, who would have 17 performed the mine foreman continuing education 18 training required by state law? 19 There were two different classes done that 20 Α. I know of. I participated in one of those. 21 22 was always four instructors, me and Johna Bowles and Berman Cornett, and I don't know who the fourth 23 one was at that one. 24

Do you have instructors approval with the 1 Q. Office of Miners' Health Safety & Training? 2 Α. Yes. 3 What subjects have you been approved to Q. teach by the state? 5 Like diesel. Α. 6 7 Or what programs? Q. Diesel, I do the diesel and continuing 8 Α. education, that. That's it for the state. 10 Q. Done any 80 or 40-hour apprentice mine classes? 11 No, but I'm certified. I'm sorry. Yes, 12 80 and 40, but I have never done them. 13 Now, make sure I didn't miss something 14 Ο. here. When you worked at Carbon Fuel back in the 15 early '80s, what did you actually do there? Were 16 you an underground miner? 17 Α. Yes. 18 I assume you had a coal miner's 19 Q. certificate? 20 Yes, but you know, after all those years, 21 22 I have never went back and got it, a copy of it, because everything was lost in a flood, so... 23

What was lost in the flood?

24

Q.

The card, because I didn't work from '81 1 Α. through 2000 --2 When you say lost in the flood, was this 3 lost in the flood by you or lost in the flood by the agency? 5 No, by me, by me. I mean, it's on file. 6 7 I just never went and got it. Q. All right. 8 Yes, sir. Α. 10 MR. FARLEY: I got you. Thank I don't think I have anything else. 11 RE-EXAMINATION 12 BY MR. VANCE: 13 When they trained you to be an instructor 14 Q. there, did they tell you or show you how to 15 correctly fill out a 5023? 16 Yes, they round showed me, yes. 17 Α. You said when you fill out a 5023, you 0. 18 mark experienced miner training, MIT, less site 19 specific or mine tour. Which one was that? 20 I would write less site specific 21 Α. Right. and mine tour, means I didn't do none of those. 22 Would you date it the same as completed or 23 would you --24

I dated it. 1 Α. Did you do anything else to the 5023 to Q. 2 show that the other subjects wasn't covered? 3 Not until you showed me, no. 4 Α. So actually you wasn't completing the 5 Q. training, but you was dating the 5023 saying that 6 7 the training was complete? 8 A. Right. Yes. No one ever did tell you that was wrong? Q. No. No, sir. 10 A. So you assumed that all the mine specifics 11 Q. was being done at the mines? 12 Yes. 13 Α. 14 RE-EXAMINATION BY MR. MCGINLEY: 15 Q. A couple more questions. In that 16 regard --17 Yes, sir. Α. 18 -- you assume that the other training that 19 Q. you didn't do was being done at the mines; is that 20 correct? 21 22 A. Yes. Do you know whether it was actually done? Q. 23 No. 24 Α.

When you finished with the three and a 1 Q. half, four-hour training videos, how long is your 2 talk at the end of the videos? 3 Average, probably 40 minutes to 50 minutes Α. after that. 5 Is there any way that you assess whether 6 7 the trainees understand what they've heard, seen in the videos? 8 I question them. Yes, I do. Oh, yes. 10 Q. Typically, how many trainees would you have in a group? 11 Pardon me? Α. 12 Typically, how many will you have? 13 Q. sure there's a range. 14 Α. It varies. I can have anywhere from three 15 up to 20. 16 How long does the questioning go on, or do 17 Q. you just say, do you have any questions? 18 No, I'll question them when I go through 19 my little book and then, yeah, I always ask them do 20 they have any questions three or four times, 21 especially at the end of the class, you know, 22 because I say, now is the time to ask me now about 23

anything that we went over today.

- Now, do you ask them any questions about 1 Q. what they've learned from the videos and your talk 2 about the SCSR? 3 Yes. I'll ask them. Do you feel Α. comfortable doing this? You know, I ask them how 5 long does a rescuer last when they put it on. Yes, 6 I do. 7 Do these people commonly come in with no 8 Q. understanding of mining terminology? 10 Α. Yes. So what do you do in terms of the subjects 11 Q. you cover to teach them what various terms --12 I go down to the basic format that I can 13 do, start from -- you know, you start from scratch 14 and go. Yes, because there's some -- yeah, there's 15 16 some that comes in there that's never even put a 17 rescuer on. Q. Well, and some have never heard of an 18 19 escapeway. Yes. Yes, sir. 20 Α. So how long does this questioning period, 21 Q.
 - I leave that up to them. As long as they Α. keep asking, it's open to them until the class is

1 finished. Yes.

- Q. Is there any way you can really tell if they understand what they've been shown?
- A. Some you can by, you know, estimation on how they answer your questions and stuff like that. Yes.
- Q. Are there some that you're feeling they really don't get it yet?
 - A. Some.
- Q. Is there any way when they go on for this other training that you're assuming that you sort of let the other trainers know at the mine site that you think maybe they're a little slow and not picking up at least the things that you've --
- A. Yes, I have called them before. Yes, I have. Yes.
 - Q. Has that happened very frequently?
 - A. No, not frequently, no.
- Q. So who would train, for example, UBB, you know, the trainees that go to UBB and you're assuming that there's mine site training, who would you call to say, you know, there's a couple of guys here that are a little weak, you better watch out for them?

1 Well, at the time up there, Berman was the Α. 2 safety man up there. I would call and tell him, 3 yes. 4 Who would do the on-site training at UBB Ο. 5 that you thought was being done? I don't know at UBB. I don't know. 6 You don't know if it was Berman or the 7 Ο. 8 shift foreman? You have no idea? 9 Berman would not do that. You know, 10 usually it would be the superintendent or the mine 11 foreman, you know. 12 MR. MCGINLEY: Thanks. Thank 13 you. 14 THE WITNESS: You're welcome, 15 sir. 16 MR. KOERBER: Mr. Stover. **17** THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 18 MR. KOERBER: I just want to let 19 you know that after the interviews are 20 over, there may be certain individuals 21 that we recall for a second interview. 22 Whether you'll be one of those people or 23 not, nobody knows at this point in time. 24 I just want to make you aware of that.
