In a unanimous decision, the Fatality Review Committee has determined that the death of should not be charged to the mining industry. a 45 year old dredge operator, had completed his duties for the day and was sitting on the dredge discharge pipe when he collapsed and fell into the water. A co-worker who was standing nearby pulled from the water and emergency medical service personnel were called. He was pronounced dead later in the day at a local hospital. had paddled a small boat to the dredge at the start of the day and paddled it back at the end of his shift.

The MSHA investigation found that his duties did not include any heavy lifting or other arduous tasks. Weather conditions in the area were not considered to be a factor. The deceased was significantly overweight and had a prior history of open heart surgery. The Death Certificate listed the cause of death as Cardiac Arrest. An autopsy was not performed.

Based on the Certificate of Death and the results of MSHA's investigation, the committee members concluded that died from natural causes and that his death should not be charged to the mining industry.
