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This case is reconsideration of a death that was initially determined to be chargeable to the mining industry in 2016.

In a unanimous decision, the Chargeability Review Committee has determined that the death of should not be charged to the mining industry. a 46-year-old shuttle car operator, was fatally injured when a personally owned vehicle in which he was a passenger was involved in an accident on the mine's access road. The accident occurred after and the driver of the vehicle, also a mine employee, had concluded their shift, changed clothes, and exited the mine's parking lot. Driving in the direction of the public highway, the driver lost control of the vehicle after the brakes malfunctioned. The vehicle gained speed as it continued down the approximate 9% grade of the roadway until it struck the road berm and rolled over. According to a statement from the driver, the vehicle was traveling in excess of 50 mph at the time it impacted the berm. The posted speed limit for the road was 21 mph. Both the MSHA and the Sheriff's Office investigations found that the braking system of the vehicle was defective. The MSHA investigation also found that wearing his seatbelt when he was partially ejected from the vehicle. The MSHA investigation did not find hazards or violations associated with the condition or maintenance of the access road.

The death certificate lists the manner of death as accidental. The immediate cause of death is listed as multiple blunt force trauma, including subdural and epidural hemorrhages. A single motor vehicle accident is listed as the underlying cause of death. An autopsy was performed but the report was not provided.

Based on these findings, the Committee members concluded that died an accidental death unrelated to mine related work activities, mining activities, or mining equipment, and that his death should not be charged to the mining industry.
