| I reviewed the investigative report in the death of should not be charged to the mining industry. It is a 59-year-old contractor truck driver, was found by a coworker slumped over and unresponsive in his vehicle. Miners performed cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and applied an automated external defibrillator. Mine emergency technicians continued resuscitative efforts and transferred to paramedics. He was pronounced dead by paramedics in the hospital ambulance after consultation with the hospital physician. |   |                               |                               |

Both the death certificate and autopsy report state that the manner of death was natural, and the immediate cause of death was atherosclerotic and hypertensive cardiovascular disease. The autopsy report also lists obesity as a significant condition contributing to the death. The MSHA investigation did not reveal any

environmental or physical conditions that contributed to the death.

Based on the autopsy report, death certificate, and MSHA's investigation, I determined that the death of was not due to mine related work activities and should not be charged to the mining industry.
