Mr. should took a break from the heat at approximately 1:00 p.m. and shortly afterwards, complained to the miner of pain in his leg and feeling ill. He then collapsed and became unresponsive The miner called 911, and began administering cardiopulmonary resuscitation. EMS and fire department personnel arrived and assumed resuscitation efforts. Mr. was transported by ambulance to the hospital where he was pronounced dead at 2:06p.m.			

The death certificate states that the manner of death was natural, and that the immediate cause of death was cardiopulmonary arrest as a consequence of atherosclerotic heart disease. As part of the investigation, MSHA inspected the explosives loading area and found no deficiencies or hazards that could have contributed to the death.

Based on the death certificate and MSHA's investigation, I determined that the death of Mr. was not due to mine related work activities and should not be charged to the mining industry.
