I reviewed the investigative report in the death of should not be charged to the mining industry. Mr. Land, a 52-year-old contract laborer, collapsed after complaining to his supervisor that he was feeling lightheaded and out of breath. The supervisor and mine emergency response team performed cardiopulmonary resuscitation until EMS arrived to assume resuscitation efforts.

Mr. Land was transported by EMS to the hospital, but he could not be revived and was pronounced dead.

Both the autopsy report and death certificate state that the manner of death was natural, and that the immediate cause of death was atherosclerotic and hypertensive cardiovascular disease. The MSHA investigation did not reveal any environmental or physical conditions that contributed to the death.

Based on the autopsy report, death certificate, and MSHA's investigation I determined that the death of Mr. was not due to mine related work activities and should not be charged to the mining industry.
