The autopsy exam revealed severe coronary and aortic atherosclerosis and prior coronary bypass surgery. In addition, the toxicology component of the autopsy indicated methamphetamine toxicity at the time of death. Both the autopsy and death certificate state that the immediate cause of death was "hypertensive—type and atherosclerotic cardiovascular disease" and list methamphetamine toxicity as a

significant condition contributing to the death. Diabetes mellitus is also listed as a significant condition contributing to the death. The autopsy did not find evidence of an occupational injury, and the MSHA investigation did not reveal any environmental or physical conditions that contributed to the death.

Based on the autopsy report, death certificate, and MSHA's investigation I determined that the death of Mr. was not due to mine related work activities and should not be charged to the mining industry.
