I reviewed the investigative report in the death of should not be charged to the mining industry. Mr. a 58-year-old excavator operator, was observed slumped over the controls of the operator cab. A miner

but could not be revived and was pronounced dead within minutes of arrival.

Both the autopsy report and death certificate state that the manner of death was natural, and that the immediate cause of death was atherosclerotic cardiovascular disease. The autopsy report lists "status post sigmoid colon resection" as a significant condition that contributed to the death. The MSHA investigative report states that Mr. was not assigned any work tasks that required strenuous effort, and the MSHA investigation did not reveal any environmental or physical conditions that contributed to the death.

performed cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and emergency medical workers arrived and continued resuscitation efforts. Mr. was transported by ambulance to the hospital,

Based on the autopsy report, death certificate, and MSHA's investigation I determined that the death of Mr. was not due to mine related work activities and should not be charged to the mining industry.
