I reviewed the investigative report in the death of should not be charged to the mining industry. Mr. 1, a 70-year-old equipment/plant operator with a medical history that included two previous myocardial infarctions, was found collapsed in a pasture area near the dredge lake. A co-worker performed cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and 911 was called. Responding emergency medical personnel conducted resuscitative efforts, including administering one shock with an automated external defibrillator (AED); however, further analysis recommended no additional shock. CPR was continued without success.

The death certificate indicates the manner of death was natural, and the immediate cause of death was acute myocardial infarction due to coronary artery disease and diabetes mellitus type II. The death certificate listed hypertension and hyperlipidemia as other contributing factors. An autopsy was not performed. The MSHA

investigation did not reveal any environmental or physical conditions that contributed to the death.

Based on the death certificate and MSHA's investigation, I determined that the death of Mr. was not due to mine related work activities and should not be charged to the mining industry.
