I am an accident 6 investigator with the Mine Safety and Health Administration, an agency of the United States Department 10 of Labor. 11 With me is Tim 12 Williams, from the Solicitor's 13 Office, John Collins and Dave 14 Stuart with the West Virginia Office of Miners' Health, 15 Safety and Training. 17 I've been assigned to 18 conduct an investigation into 19 the accident that occurred at 20 the Sago Mine on January 2nd, 21 2006, in which 12 miners died 22 and one was injured. 23 The investigation is 24 being conducted by MSHA and the West Virginia Office of

Page 7 1 Miners' Health, Safety & Training to gather information to determine the cause of the accident. And these 5 interviews are an important 6 part of the investigation. At this time, the accident investigation team intends to interview a number 10 of people to discuss anything 11 that may be relevant to the 12 cause of the accident. After 13 the investigation is 14 completed, MSHA will issue a 15 written report detailing the nature and causes of the accident. 18 MSHA accident reports 19 are made available to the 20 public in the hope that 21 greater awareness about the 22 causes of accidents can reduce 23 their occurrence in the 24 Information obtained future. through witness interviews is

- A. I was motorman over there.
- Q. And when did you --- do you
- recall the date when you started at
- Sago Mine?
- A. It was in --- I think it was
- in July like two years ago.
- Q. In 2004?
- A. I believe. I'm not real
- certain, but it's been a couple years
- ago.
- Q. And your present position is
- what?

1 Yard man. Q. Yard man. And I believe you said you held that position for well, when did you start in that 5 position? 6 A. It's been --- it probably would be eight months ago, something like that. Before that, I was kind of yard man plus a motorman. 10 know, I loaded the cars, plus I 11 hauled them underground. 12 Q. And did you hold the same 13 position, the yard man, on January 14 2nd, 2006, the day of the accident? 15 A. Yes, sir. Q. Starting whenever you arrived 17 at the mine that morning, can you 18 just kind of describe what occurred 19 until you left the property? 20 A. Well, I got there probably 2.1 around 5:30, got dressed, went into 22 the dispatcher trailer and had I 2.3 don't know, two or three cups of

coffee and just BS'd with the men.

And then a little after 6:00, one of

1 the maintenance foreman had some parts there that he wanted to take underground, so I got the fork truck and went to get a pallet to haul it 5 downhill. Well, while I was out there doing that, we had this violent lightning strike. And I mean, it pretty well lit the place up like 10 daylight. I carry a, I quess you'd 11 call it a walkie-talkie, in case they 12 need to get ahold of me. Well, I 13 heard the dispatcher hollering for 14 everyone underground. 15 And I figured something was So I went back to the wronq. 17 dispatcher trailer and when I went 18 in, he couldn't get ahold of anyone 19 underground. And we have a belt 20 system where a bunch of the COs and 21 stuff are going crazy. One and Two 22 belt was still running, but the rest 2.3 of them weren't. 2.4 So I tried to help him with 25 what was going on there. And then

1 the superintendent and them decided they were going underground to investigate, which I offered to go with them and they told me I couldn't 5 because I wasn't certified. And they went in. And I helped Flea with the dispatching as best I could. And in a little bit, I talked with some of them underground. 10 They said they thought they had had 11 an explosion and told us to get help, 12 which we proceeded to do. 13 And then Dick brought the One 14 Left crew out. And they requested 15 that I load fly boards and curtains and nails and spads for them to take 17 back in with them, which I did. 18 And then in a little while 19 there was trucks coming in and just 20 bringing all kind of supplies in. 21 were trying to, you know, get ready 22 for the rescue. 2.3 And the rest of that day ---24 it was probably around noon or so the government wouldn't allow me over the

- hill anymore. So I just more or less
- stood around the rest of the day and
- did what I could. But there wasn't
- much we could do.
- ⁵ Q. Do you have any mining
- 6 certifications, like mine foreman,
- 7 examiner?
- ⁸ A. No. I used to have a shop
- fire's card, but it's ---.
- Q. And who is your immediate
- supervisor?
- A. Carl Crumrine.
- Q. How long has he been your
- supervisor?
- A. Eight months, probably,
- something like that.
- Q. On the day of the accident,
- did you begin your shift at the
- normal time?
- A. Yes.
- Q. And we'll kind of go back
- through your activities during the
- day and try to fill in some of the
- blanks.
- ²⁵ A. Okay.

- Q. What time did you get to the
- mine that day?
- A. Did I get to the mine or start
- work?
- ⁵ Q. To the mine.
- ⁶ A. It was probably around 5:30.
- 7 Q. Okay. Whenever you got to the
- mine, what did you do next then?
- ⁹ A. Just went in and got dressed,
- ready to go to work.
- Q. After you were dressed and
- getting ready to go to work, what did
- you do next?
- A. I went to the dispatcher
- trailer and drank coffee and talked
- 16 to the men and stuff.
- Q. Okay. Do you recall what time
- that might have been?
- ¹⁹ A. It was probably 20 'til 6:00,
- something like that.
- Q. And the dispatcher's office,
- the CO system and the screen,
- everything was normal, ---
- ²⁴ A. Yes.
- Q. --- at that point?

- ¹ A. Yes, it was.
- Q. And then whenever --- did the
- men go underground at the normal
- time? Approximately what time did
- 5 they leave to go?
- ⁶ A. It was --- I'd say they
- 7 probably left out of there at maybe
- five 'til 6:00, to get over the hill,
- ⁹ to get on the mantrips and go.
- Q. And everything was normal up
- to that point?
- A. Other than the violent
- lightning storm, yes.
- Q. A lightning storm. Okay.
- When they went down, they went down
- over the hill to go to the mantrips
- then what did you do?
- A. I just sat there and drank
- coffee.
- Q. Okay.
- A. I mean, you know, I was kind
- of waiting on orders as ---
- Q. Sure, I understand.
- A. --- as to what to do.
- Q. And up to that point, had you

- had any conversations with Mr. Toler
- and Mr. Crumrine or anyone at that
- ³ point?
- ⁴ A. No.
- ⁵ Q. Okay.
- ⁶ A. Because Carl was off that day.
- 7 It was a holiday and he wasn't there.
- Q. After you were done drinking
- your coffee, what did you do?
- A. I got the forklift and went to
- qet the pallet to take the parts over
- the hill for the maintenance foreman.
- ¹³ Q. Okay.
- A. He was going to take it
- underground.
- Q. And approximately what time
- was that?
- A. I would say probably 6:15.
- Q. Okay. And then when you went
- to prepare those, then what did you
- ²¹ do?
- A. Well, by that time, all the
- confusion had started underground. I
- mean, I was in the process of loading
- 25 the pallet with the parts.

- Q. Was that up by the bathhouse
- or was that down in the pit?
- 3 A. No, it was by the bathhouse.
- 4 Q. All right. Go ahead.
- ⁵ A. And by the time I got it down
- there, I knew there was something
- wrong, so that's when I came back to
- help the dispatcher with ---.
- ⁹ Q. Okay. At the first sign that
- you knew something was wrong, where
- were you?
- A. I was in the forklift behind
- the office.
- Q. Okay. And how did you know
- that?
- A. Well, it was a very violent
- lighting --- I mean, I can't say that
- it struck, but I mean, it lit the
- place up like daylight.
- Q. Okay.
- A. And then I heard the
- dispatcher hollering for anyone
- underground.
- Q. Okay. When you say you heard
- the dispatcher, how did you hear it,

- I mean over a phone?
- ² A. I have a walkie-talkie that I
- carry. And, you know, that way the
- dispatcher or whoever needs me, if
- you page a mine phone, it comes in
- over the walkie-talkie.
- ⁷ Q. Okay.
- A. You know, if I'm on a part of
- the property and they need me, all
- they got to do is holler.
- Q. Okay. So the people
- underground can communicate with you
- on the surface, ---
- A. Yes.
- Q. --- through that walkie-
- ¹⁶ talkie?
- A. Through the mine phone, yes.
- Q. Anything that's said over the
- pager phone, you can hear?
- A. As long as they're paging.
- Q. Okay.
- A. Now, they have to page in
- order for me to hear.
- Q. Okay.
- A. You know, if they just use the

- hand and talk like you do on a
- regular mine phone, ---
- o. Yes.
- A. --- I can't hear them. But as
- long as they're paging, I can hear
- them, yes.
- 7 Q. Can you talk back to them?
- 8 A. Yes.
- ⁹ Q. But they have to continue to
- hold the pager button down for you
- ¹¹ to ---
- A. Yes.
- Q. --- continue to speak to them?
- A. I mean, they can hear me, but
- unless they page, I can't hear them.
- Q. Okay. So that's how you knew
- there was something wrong?
- ¹⁸ A. Yes.
- Q. And what did you hear over the
- walkie-talkie at that point?
- A. I just heard Flea hollering
- for mainly Two Left, because
- according to the COs, that's where
- the problem was.
- Q. Okay. And what was Flea

- saying?
- ² A. He was just hollering for them
- 3 to try to get them to answer.
- Q. Okay. And you heard that over
- ⁵ your phone?
- ⁶ A. Yes.
- ⁷ Q. And then when you heard that,
- 8 what did you do?
- A. I went to the dispatcher's
- office to see what was going on.
- Q. So you never did go down in
- the pit at that point yet?
- ¹³ A. No.
- Q. So you went to the
- dispatcher's office?
- ¹⁶ A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What did you observe there?
- You know, kind of give me a little
- bit of what went on there.
- A. Well, I just walked in and I
- 21 asked Flea what was going on. They
- said, well, we've lost the power on
- the beltlines. One and Two belt was
- still running, but the rest of them
- weren't. And I saw that about --- I

- believe it was six of the COs were
- pegged on the monitor.
- Q. And do you recall which six
- 4 that was?
- ⁵ A. I believe it was three on Two
- Left and three close to the tail of
- 7 Four belt. I think the first one or
- two on Four belt at the tail were
- showing dead. They were gray.
- Q. And that gray color, that's
- what it does whenever you have a loss
- of power?
- A. Loss of power or they're
- disconnected, whatever, yes.
- Q. Do you ever fill in as
- dispatcher?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Okay. Then after you saw
- those were dead, then what happened?
- A. Well, it's a little hard to
- remember.
- Q. That's okay. Take your time,
- you know.
- A. I went in and asked Flea what
- I could do to help. And of course he

- was pretty busy. And I talked to
- several guys underground that called
- 3 out, because Flea was on the
- telephone trying to get ahold of ---
- we tried calling Raymond Coleman and
- 6 Chuck Dunbar.
- Q. Who's Raymond Coleman?
- 8 A. He's one of the officials.
- ⁹ Q. Okay.
- A. But I'm not sure what his
- title is. But you know, we were
- trying to let them know that
- something was wrong.
- Q. Yes. And when you said you
- had --- or there was a conversation
- with people underground, who would
- that have been?
- A. Well, during the day, I talked
- to ---.
- Q. No, I mean at that point
- there, whenever you initially ---.
- A. At that point?
- Q. Yes.
- A. Initially, I think the first
- one I talked to was John Boni.

- Q. Okay. And what was the extent
- of that conversation?
- 3 A. I guess he was along Three
- Belt. And he bent over, checking a
- ⁵ pump. And he said he felt the air
- change.
- ⁷ Q. Okay.
- 8 A. And he called out and asked me
- ⁹ what was going on. He said he
- thought we had had a fall. And he
- asked me what the COs were doing and
- I told him.
- Q. What did you tell him?
- A. I told him that the ones on
- Four Belt were going crazy. And he
- 16 said he thought we had a problem.
- Q. Did he say what that problem
- might be?
- A. No. At first he thought it
- was a major roof fall.
- Q. Yes.
- A. Because he said he could feel
- the pressure from where he was. And
- I really can't remember what all was
- said.

- ¹ Q. So that initial conversation
- was with Mr. Boni?
- 3 A. I believe he was the first one
- 4 I talked to, yes.
- ⁵ Q. All right. And then after
- ⁶ your conversation with him, then go
- ⁷ ahead, continue.
- ⁸ A. Owie Jones called just a
- ⁹ little after that.
- ¹⁰ Q. Okay.
- A. And he was up around One Left
- switch.
- Q. And you received that call?
- ¹⁴ A. Yes.
- 0. You took that call?
- ¹⁶ A. Yes, sir.
- Q. All right.
- A. That might not have been his
- initial call. You know, Flea may
- have talked to him before that. I
- really don't know.
- Q. Okay. But you don't recall
- Flea speaking to Mr. Jones at that
- point? You didn't hear any
- conversations with Mr. Jones?

- A. No, not unless he talked to him before I got in there.
- ⁴ A. But Owie told me he was trying
- 5 to get to Two Left, but he said it
- was so smoky and stuff that he
- couldn't get up there. And he really
- didn't know where he was. And I told
- him there was help coming, and to
- either stay where he was or get back
- in fresh air, which he told me he was
- going to try to get to his brother.
- Q. At that point --- when was the
- first thought that there may have
- been an explosion, or how did you
- realize that there was an explosion?
- A. Well, it was probably after
- Dick and all of them went
- underground. Dick called out and
- said, we had a major explosion.
- Q. Okay.
- A. You know, I kind of thought
- that, but I didn't know.
- Q. Well, had they gone
- underground before your conversation

- with Mr. Jones?
- ² A. Yes.
- Q. So you had your conversation
- with Mr. Jones. And then what
- ⁵ happened?
- ⁶ A. Well, Ron Grall called. He
- said he was at the maintenance
- shanty, which is --- it's either
- ⁹ Seven or Nine block on Four belt. He
- had been on the One Left mantrip.
- And he told me that he and Paul
- Avington were at the maintenance
- shanty and they were okay.
- Q. Do you know approximately what
- time that might have been?
- ¹⁶ A. No, sir.
- ¹⁷ Q. Okay.
- A. I can't tell you.
- Q. Sure.
- A. I didn't look at times.
- 0. I understand.
- A. But I told him that Dick and
- them were in there, and Dick was
- getting ready to bring One Left crew
- out. And I told him that if they

1 were in fresh air, okay, just stay at the track and wait on Dick, that way, you know, they could get a ride out, which I quess that's what they did. 5 Q. Now, I'll ask you, you said 6 you didn't --- or a moment ago you said you didn't remember times, but do you happen to remember, or is there some way you can relate what 10 time Mr. Wilfong and Mr. Toler ---? 11 Who all went underground? 12 A. Dick Wilfong, Al Schoonover, 13 Jeff Toler and Vern Hofer. 14 Q. Do you know approximately what 15 time they might have gone underground? 17 A. Yeah. I could make a quess, 18 but I can't tell you ---. You know, 19 there was so much going that I wasn't 20 worried about times. 2.1 Q. Sure. Okay. Had you spoken 22 to them prior to them going 23 underground? 2.4 A. Yes, sir. 25 O. And when was that?

- ¹ A. Probably 20 'til 7:00 or
- something like that. That's just a
- ³ quess.
- Q. After the explosion?
- ⁵ A. Yes, sir.
- ⁶ Q. And what was the extent of
- that conversation?
- ⁸ A. Well, they just said they were
- going under to see what happened.
- And I told them I wanted to go with
- them, and they told me I couldn't go.
- So that was --- that was pretty
- well ---.
- Q. Was that up around the
- dispatcher shanty that you had that
- conversation?
- ¹⁷ A. Yes.
- Q. And did they have any --- do
- you recall, did they have any
- detectors or anything with them?
- A. I'm not sure.
- ²² Q. Okay.
- A. I mean, I don't know.
- Q. And after you had this
- conversation, did you go into the

- dispatcher shanty then?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And then that's whenever you
- had these calls that we've just
- ⁵ discussed?
- ⁶ A. Yes.
- ⁷ Q. After you had your
- 8 conversation with Mr. Grall, then
- ⁹ what occurred?
- A. I believe that might have been
- about the time that --- that might
- have been about the time that Dick
- called out and said that we'd had a
- major explosion and we needed help.
- Q. And Dick, who would that have
- been?
- A. Dick Wilfong.
- Q. Wilfong.
- A. Yes, the maintenance foreman.
- Q. All right. And tell me a
- little more about that conversation.
- A. Well, he just said that, we've
- had a major explosion. And he said
- we need help and we need help now.
- Q. Okay. And then what happened

1 then? A. Well, he told me he had got the One Left crew and he was going to bring them out. And I guess they 5 started out with them. And then Jeff 6 Toler, the superintendent called me. And he said, I want fly boards, curtain, nails, spads an extra hard hat and two monitors sent in. 10 Q. Monitors. When you say 11 monitors, what do you mean? 12 A. The ITX methane monitors. 13 Q. Okay. Methane detectors? 14 A. Yes. Sent in with Dick when 15 he gets out there, which I went out and proceeded to get all that 17 together. And when Dick got there, I 18 loaded it on the mantrip for him. 19 Q. After you had that 20 conversation, you went to --- you 21 left the dispatcher shanty at that 22 point then? 2.3 A. Yes, sir. 24 Q. And you went to gather

material that he had asked for?

- did you get for him?

- Q. Where did you get those
- 8 detectors?
- A. Out of the dispatcher's
- office. That's where they keep them
- to charge them.
- Q. And then you gathered up the
- supplies, the supplies that he had
- asked for?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And what did you do next?
- A. I took everything over the
- hill and waited for Dick to get out
- there. And it was pouring rain down.
- Got soaking wet. Once Dick got out
- there, I loaded the stuff in the
- mantrip for him to take back in.
- Q. Okay. When Dick came out,
- then he brought the One Left crew
- out, ---

- ¹ A. Yes, sir.
- Q. --- those that were
- underground?
- 4 A. Yes.
- ⁵ Q. Was there any conversation
- among any of those people that you
- ⁷ might have had?
- 8 A. I didn't at that time, no.
- ⁹ Q. And what conversation did you
- have with Mr. Wilfong?
- A. Just asked him if there was
- anything else that he needed. And he
- said, no, he needed to get back in
- there and he just pretty well went
- back.
- material onto the ---
- ¹⁸ A. Yes.
- Q. --- mantrip?
- A. Of course Dick and a couple
- other guys helped me, you know. I
- didn't load it all myself.
- Q. Okay. Did anyone qo
- underground with Mr. Wilfong?
- A. Vern Hofer.

- O. Just the two of them went
- underground, back underground?
- 3 A. At that time, ---
- O. Yes.
- ⁵ A. --- yes.
- ⁶ Q. Okay. Then what did you do?
- 7 A. Well, I went back up to the
- 8 dispatcher's office to help with
- ⁹ communications and stuff.
- Q. Prior to going underground,
- did anyone go over and check any of
- the mine openings for methane or
- carbon monoxide, or did anybody make
- examinations at that point?
- A. I believe John Boni did when
- he got outside. But now before the
- initial group went underground, I
- really don't know.
- Q. Okay. But at that point when
- you were in the pit, did you ever
- observe anyone doing that?
- A. No, sir. Now, they may have.
- I don't know.
- Q. Okay. But you never say
- anyone make an examination?

- ¹ A. No, sir.
- Q. So then after they left to go
- back underground, what did you do
- 4 then?
- ⁵ A. I just went back to the
- dispatcher's office and helped. By
- that time the telephone was ringing
- off the hook. I quess word got out.
- ⁹ Q. When you went to the
- dispatcher shanty, who was in there
- with you?
- A. Well, at that time there was
- Flea and John Boni. And there were
- several of the One Left crew members
- in there also.
- ¹⁶ Q. Okay. And what were your
- activities at that point? Were you
- assisting in some fashion?
- A. I was just assisting Flea.
- You know, if he was on the mine phone
- and the telephone rang, I answered
- it. If he was on the telephone and
- the mine --- if someone called on the
- mine phone, I answered it.
- Q. And did you ever, at any

- point, do any monitoring of the mine
- openings or anything?
- ³ A. No.
- Q. No. Do you recall anyone ever
- ⁵ going to the pit to make any
- examinations?
- A. No, sir, I don't. But, you
- know, they may have. I really don't
- ⁹ know.
- Q. Do you recall anyone ever
- saying what the carbon monoxide
- levels might have been in the pit or
- the openings or anything?
- A. The only thing I heard was we
- didn't have a detector to monitor,
- 16 that it was too high.
- Q. Okay. Going back to whenever
- Mr. Wilfong and Mr. Hofer came out
- and you guys were loading these
- supplies, during that conversation,
- did they indicate at all what CO
- levels they might have known about or
- anything like that? Was there any
- discussion to that effect?
- A. The only thing they told me

1 was they had fresh air and they weren't reading a lot of methane or I don't know exactly what point they were at, at that time, you know. 5 Q. When you went back to the ---6 getting back to whenever you're in the dispatcher shanty and One Left crew members were in there, okay, and you were assisting Flea by answering 10 telephones. The telephone calls that 11 you were getting --- did you make any 12 telephone calls? 13 A. No. 14 Q. Okay. Then what were your 15 activities for the rest of the day? Just kind of fill in the rest of the 17 day there for me if you would, 18 please. 19 A. Well, once MSHA got there and 20 shut us down it was pretty much stand 21 around and do nothing. 22 Q. Okay. Do you recall anyone 23 calling the mine rescue team? Were 24 you part of that at all?

A. Yes, sir, Johnny Stemple

25

- called them.
- Q. But were you involved in any
- of that?
- ⁴ A. Well, he called me and told me
- that he couldn't get ahold of the
- director or president, whoever it is
- you're supposed to notify.
- Q. You mean the company people or
- 9 MSHA?
- A. No, the mine rescue team.
- ¹¹ Q. Oh, okay.
- A. I quess they have a president
- or a trainer or something. And he
- tried to get ahold of them and he
- couldn't.
- 16 Q. All right.
- A. And he asked me to go over in
- the office and get the list of the
- mine rescue team, to give him some
- more phone numbers, ---
- Q. Okay.
- A. --- that he could get ahold of
- 23 someone.
- Q. All right.
- 25 A. And I did that.

- Q. Okay.
- A. I guess I did use the phone
- because I think I had to call him
- back.
- ⁵ Q. All right. And then you gave
- him a list of the mine rescue teams
- to call or the ---?
- ⁸ A. Well, it was the Barbour
- 9 County team, which was the closest
- team.
- Q. All right.
- A. And he just needed some
- numbers to get ahold of one of them
- so that they could get ahold of
- everyone else.
- Q. And how many phone numbers did
- you give him, one or two or ---?
- A. I think it was like three.
- Q. Three phone numbers?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And what other subjects might
- you have talked to Mr. Stemple about?
- 23 Anything? Or was that the extent of
- ²⁴ it?
- A. I really can't remember

- talking about anything else, other
- than, you know, just telling him we
- needed help.
- ⁴ Q. And what other individuals did
- you speak with maybe over the
- telephone? Do you recall any
- onversations you might have had with
- someone else when you answered the
- ⁹ phone?
- A. I spoke to some woman from The
- Exponent. I told her I had no
- comment.
- ¹³ Q. Okay.
- A. I mean, there was all kind of
- news media calling. You know, we
- didn't talk to them. I really can't
- remember talking to anyone as far as
- a conversation over the phone.
- Q. Do you recall approximately
- what time that might have been,
- whenever Mr. Stemple called?
- A. Not really, but I'd say it was
- maybe a little after 7:00 that I
- talked to him.
- ²⁵ Q. Okay.

1 A. But he had had phone contact before. You know, I don't ---. Q. What makes you think that? A. Well, I think Flea talked to 5 him first. I mean, I'm not sure. 6 Q. Okay. But you didn't hear that conversation? A. No. Q. What makes you think that, you 10 know, that he had a conversation with 11 Flea? 12 A. Well, we were trying to get 13 ahold of everyone in the company that 14 we could, you know, to notify them 15 that something was wrong. And I think Johnny Stemple was the first 17 one we got ahold of, or that Flea got 18 ahold of. I didn't get ahold of him. 19 Q. Okay. And then after you had 20 the conversation with Mr. Stemple, and providing him with the phone 22 numbers that he wanted, then what did 23 you do? 24 A. I really can't remember. 25 we stayed in there until I guess the

- ¹ CO levels started getting so high
- coming out of the pit mouth that they
- made us evacuate the dispatcher
- 4 trailer.
- ⁵ Q. Okay.
- ⁶ A. And they had us all around
- behind the offices. Actually, they
- wanted us to leave the property, but
- ⁹ we stayed. They told us unless we
- were part of the rescue, we had to
- leave.
- Q. Who was that that told you
- that?
- A. I believe it was Mr.
- Satterfield.
- ¹⁶ Q. Okay.
- A. They told him that I was part
- of the rescue, that I needed to load
- the supplies if they needed it.
- Q. When you say they, who was
- they?
- A. Raymond Coleman's the one that
- told him that.
- Q. Okay. So you didn't have to
- leave?

- ¹ A. No.
- Q. And then what did you do then?
- At that point there what happened?
- ⁴ A. We just stood out there for,
- you know, probably two or three hours
- and talked and really didn't do
- anything. We weren't allowed to do
- ⁸ anything.
- ⁹ Q. You may have already answered
- this, but were you ever underground
- at Sago Mine?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. When was that?
- A. Well, I ran motor there for a
- good while.
- ¹⁶ Q. Okay.
- A. And the last time I was
- underground was like two weeks prior.
- 19 It was on a Saturday two weeks prior
- to the accident.
- Q. What was the purpose of your
- underground involvement that day?
- A. I was ballasting track on Two
- Left. Actually, it was on Christmas
- Eve day. I worked that day and

- ballasted track.
- Q. Are you familiar --- or during
- your travels underground, would you
- have been familiar with the old Two
- ⁵ Left Main seals?
- ⁶ A. No, sir. I was never up
- ⁷ there.
- Q. Okay. And you didn't deliver
- any supply? I know you said you were
- a motorman extra. Did you ever
- deliver any supplies up in that area
- 12 at all?
- A. No, sir. At that time, I
- wasn't underground. Until that
- Saturday I ballasted track, I had
- 16 never been to Two Left. I mean,
- that's the only time I was ever up
- there.
- Q. And then what time did you
- leave mine property? Do you have any
- idea?
- A. On the day it happened?
- ²³ Q. Yes.
- A. It was roughly 10:30 that
- night.

1 Q. And what did you do from the time that you were asked to leave the property and you didn't leave the property, what did you do the rest of 5 the day there? 6 A. Pretty well stood around out there, hoping that the men would get out. Q. Were you assigned any duties 10 during that period of time? 11 A. Off and on a truck would come 12 in and I'd unload them. We had a 13 bunch of Kennedy stoppings came in, 14 extra curtain, foam packs. And, you 15 know, just preparing in case we needed all this. But most of the 17 time we was just standing around 18 doing nothing. 19 Q. And I think you did say you 20 were never asked to go into the pit 21 to make any methane, oxygen or CO 22 readings? 23 A. No, I wasn't asked to.

Do you have anything,

- John?
- BY MR. COLLINS:
- Q. Mr. Marsh, how long have you
- been employed by Anker, including
- ⁵ Spruce Fork?
- ⁶ A. Roughly 40 years.
- 7 Q. And do you have a West
- 8 Virginia coal miner's certificate?
- ⁹ A. Yes.
- Q. Are you a certified
- electrician?
- ¹² A. No.
- Q. Mine foreman?
- ¹⁴ A. No.
- Q. Any other West Virginia
- certifications?
- A. (Indicates no).
- Q. You said that you were having
- a bad lighting storm on January the
- 2nd. Was it still dark, ---
- ²¹ A. Yes.
- Q. --- at that time?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And from what location did you
- observe the lightning? Where were

- you at when you seen the lightning?
- A. Oh, I was in the forklift
- $^{\scriptscriptstyle 3}$ behind the office going to get a
- ⁴ pallet.
- 5 Q. Was that after the day shift
- 6 crew had entered the mine?
- ⁷ A. Yes.
- Q. In your opinion, where was
- that lightning at?
- A. The way it looked to me, it
- was everywhere. I mean, it lit the
- sky up like it was daylight for just
- a second or two.
- Q. You said you never helped
- build the seals ---
- ¹⁶ A. No.
- Q. --- at Two Left?
- A. I loaded the supplies to go in
- there.
- Q. Did you load the seal
- material?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Were those Omega blocks?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Are they different than normal

- Omega blocks?
- ² A. Some of them were. Most of
- your Omega block are eight inch. And
- I guess they ordered six inch ---
- something about you top them off with
- six inch or something.
- ⁷ Q. Those were different sizes of
- 8 Omega blocks ---
- ⁹ A. Yeah, ---
- Q. --- they used in the seal?
- A. --- as far as thickness.
- 0. When those blocks came into
- the mine, were they separated
- different than normal Omega material?
- ¹⁵ A. No.
- 16 Q. Was there a different --- were
- there boards that you loaded with
- that material list?
- A. No, because I don't think they
- used any wood in that, but I'm not
- real sure.
- Q. Wedges, that you remember?
- A. I may have loaded some wedges,
- but I really can't remember.
- Q. What about the mortar for the

- seals?
- A. It was a --- it's not B-Bond,
- it was mine sealant, I think they
- 4 called it.
- ⁵ Q. A different kind that you
- 6 would normally use?
- ⁷ A. Yes, sir.
- 8 O. That was for the seals?
- ⁹ A. For the seals.
- Q. You were there the morning
- when the explosion occurred, Mr.
- Marsh. What time do you think it was
- clear that the surface knew they had
- had an explosion?
- A. In my opinion?
- Q. Yes.
- A. Probably 6:45. But that's my
- opinion.
- Q. And the two detectors --- I
- think you probably cleared this up
- for Dennis, but the two detectors you
- sent in were multi-gas detectors ---
- ²³ A. Yes.
- Q. --- you gave to Dick?
- A. They're ITX detectors.

1 Q. Then just to clarify some of the time. I think you said that Johnny Stemple called back and said that he was having trouble getting 5 hold of the Barbour County mine 6 rescue station? A. Yes, sir. Q. And that you weren't sure what time that was, but you think it was 10 around 7:00 a.m.? 11 A. 7:00, 7:30, I mean I'm not 12 sure. 13 Q. And that Flea had already 14 talked to Johnny Stemple prior to 15 that conversation? A. Yes, sir. 17 Q. Do you remember what three 18 numbers you gave him, not the numbers 19 but perhaps the individuals? 20 A. No, sir, I don't. 21 O. You don't remember at all? 22 Like if I said, is Chris Hite 2.3 (phonetic) one of them, do you know 24 if you gave him that number or not?

A. No. I gave him the number two

- man on the list, but I can't remember
- 2 what his name is.
- Q. And you also said around
- twelve o'clock the government
- wouldn't let you go back into the pit
- anymore?
- 7 A. Yeah, it was around there.
- Q. Do you know why they didn't
- want you to go down there?
- A. They said CO levels were too
- high and they didn't want anyone down
- in there.
- Q. Mr. Marsh, you've been pretty
- involved there in the rescue attempt,
- recovery, rehabilitation of the mine.
- Do you have anything that you'd like
- to --- that you could offer us or
- help us, any information you think we
- don't have, ---
- A. Nothing I know of, John.
- Q. --- as to what may have
- occurred?
- A. I mean, in my opinion, we had
- a lightning strike that blew up the
- mine somehow, but I don't know how.

- Q. Dick Wilfong came back outside and you mentioned the things that you put on the mantrip. Did you also put on any SCSRs, extra self-rescuers?
- ⁵ A. No, sir, not at that time.
- 6 And I believe that --- well ---.
- Nothing.
- Q. Then you mentioned it wasraining.
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Pouring down rain I think is
- what you said?
- A. Yes, at that time.
- Q. Did that continue for a while?
- How was it?
- A. Roughly a half hour I would
- say. But now by that time the
- lightning had pretty well eased up.
- You know, when the lightning storm
- was, it was raining, but not real
- hard. But the lightning kind of
- eased up and then the rain really
- poured down.
- O. If Number One Belt was
- running, Mr. Marsh, would the stacker

- belt have also been running?
- 2 A. Yes. If the stacker wasn't
- running, it would shut Number One
- down.
- ⁵ Q. Do you know if there's a fan
- alarm in the dispatcher's office? If
- the fan goes down, does it set off an
- 8 alarm in the dispatcher's office?
- ⁹ A. No.
- Q. It doesn't or you don't know?
- A. I don't believe. I don't
- believe it does. Now, there's a
- siren down at the fan which you can
- ¹⁴ hear, ---
- ¹⁵ Q. Okay.
- A. --- but I don't believe
- there's one in the dispatcher's
- office.
- MR. COLLINS:
- Okay. Thank you.
- BY MR. SWENTOSKY:
- Q. When Mr. Wilfong called out
- and said they had a major explosion
- and they needed help, do you know
- approximately what time that might

- have been?
- ² A. No, sir.
- Q. Okay. Did he happen to say
- what kind of help? Did he just say
- 5 help or ---?
- ⁶ A. He just said we needed help.
- 7 Q. Help.
- 8 A. You know, he didn't
- ⁹ really ---.
- Q. He didn't elaborate or ---?
- A. No. I mean, I took for
- granted he needed mine rescue teams
- and that sort of help, but he really
- didn't say what we needed.
- Q. Okay. When he asked for help
- then, what did you do? Did you tell
- anyone or call MSHA or anything like
- that?
- A. We called Johnny Stemple.
- Q. So that's what you --- that's
- what led you to call Mr. Stemple, ---
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. --- was whenever he said he
- needed help?
- A. Yes, sir.

1 O. And I think Mr. Collins asked you about, were there any selfrescuers taken underground after Mr. Wilfong came out and you sent all the 5 --- when you sent detectors and 6 boards and nails and all this other stuff. Did you say they did take self-rescuers underground or ---? A. If they did, they got them on 10 their own. I didn't load them. 11 didn't see them take any. 12 MR. SWENTOSKY: 13 Okay. Can we take a 14 short break here? Go off the 15 record. SHORT BREAK TAKEN 17 BY MR. SWENTOSKY: 18 Q. When you were --- you talked 19 about when you first thought it was 20 an explosion that occurred. Okay. 21 And do you recall what time that was? 22 I may have asked you this, but ---. 2.3 A. Not really. There was so much 24 going on that ---25 O. Yes. And I understand that.

1 A. --- I wasn't worried about times. I was just ---. O. And how did you know or how did you come to know --- to think it 5 was an explosion? 6 A. Well, the way the COs were going crazy in the mines, on our computer screen. And then when they called out, I talked to different 10 people and they had seen all kind of 11 dust. They felt different air 12 changes, and you know, just 13 experience in the mines, I thought it 14 was an explosion, but I didn't say 15 anything to anyone about it until Dick Wilfong called out. And I 17 believe at that time, he was up 18 around Four Drive or somewhere around 19 in there. And he said, we had a 20 major explosion. Q. Is that --- I'm sorry. 22 ahead. 2.3 A. Well, he had like 15 years' 24 experience on a mine rescue team, so he would know from the conditions.

- Q. Okay. And that's the first
- 2 --- would that be then the first
- person that would have used the word
- explosion?
- ⁵ A. Yes. To my knowledge.
- ⁶ Q. Who were the first company
- people to arrive at the mine, other
- than the normal company people that
- 9 were already at the mine?
- A. Carl Crumrine was probably the
- first to arrive.
- ¹² Q. Okay.
- A. And then Raymond Coleman and
- Chuck Dunbar and all of them showed
- up. But I'm not certain what order
- they came in.
- Q. Do you happen to remember ---
- A. I can't tell you a time.
- Q. --- what time? You knew my
- next question, huh?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. During the period of
- time that you were answering the
- phone and then making some calls, an
- example, one of those to Mr. Stemple,

- what was Flea --- what was he doing
- ² at that time?
- 3 A. If I was on the phone, he was
- ⁴ probably on the mine phone. And we
- were notified that MSHA had put a (k)
- order on us and if we talked to the
- men underground attempting rescue, to
- 8 tell them that we had a (k) order and
- they needed to evacuate.
- Q. Who told you that, that there
- was a (k) order?
- A. Johnny Stemple.
- O. And where was John at that
- time?
- A. To the best of my knowledge,
- 16 he was home. He was on the
- telephone.
- Q. Okay. Were you on the
- telephone with him?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And he told you that there was
- a (k) order on the mine?
- A. Yes, sir. That's when he had
- notified MSHA of what was going on.
- Q. So he had been notified ---

- he, Mr. Stemple, had been notified of
- the (k) order while he was at home?
- 3 A. He was either at home or on a
- 4 cell phone.
- ⁵ Q. Okay.
- ⁶ A. I really don't know. I talked
- 7 to him on the telephone, but ---.
- Q. Well, that call --- did you
- make the call to him when he ---?
- Did you make the call to him when you
- learned of the (k) order, or did he
- call you?
- A. He called us.
- Q. Okay.
- A. See, he notified the state and
- federal and the mine rescue teams and
- everything. I guess --- I'm not
- sure, but I think it was Mr.
- Satterfield that he got in touch
- with, with MSHA.
- Q. Okay.
- A. Which they automatically put a
- (k) order on us over the phone. And
- he called and notified me of that.
- Q. And he called and notified you

- of that?
- A. Yes, sir. I just happened to
- answer the phone when he called.
- Q. And you wouldn't happen to
- ⁵ know what time that was, would you?
- ⁶ A. No, sir. It was before noon.
- ⁷ Q. And then who did you tell that
- information to, relay that
- ⁹ information to?
- A. Vern Hofer called out to --- I
- guess they had advanced the
- telephone. And he called out to see
- if they had communications. And I
- notified him at that time that we had
- a (k) order and they were to evacuate
- the mines and not to proceed any
- further.
- Q. Okay.
- A. And to the best of my
- knowledge, that's what they did.
- Q. Did you tell anyone else on
- the surface that there was a (k)
- order on the mine?
- A. I told Flea.
- Q. Flea, okay.

- A. I'm not sure --- I talked to
- 2 John Collins. John told me if I
- talked to any of them, to tell them
- that they needed to come out of the
- ⁵ mines.
- ⁶ Q. So the first company person
- that you had spoken to was Mr. Hofer,
- 8 at that point. And he was the first
- person --- company person that was
- notified of the (k) order?
- A. As far as I know.
- Q. Okay. When you spoke to Owen
- underground, ---
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. --- did you ask him where he
- was?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What did he say?
- A. He told me he was on Four belt
- somewhere, but he wasn't sure where
- 21 he was.
- Q. And he would have been using a
- pager phone?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And you were in the

- dispatcher's office on that pager?
- ² A. Yes, sir.
- Q. When you were speaking with
- Mr. Stemple, going back to him for a
- second, was the One Left crew out of
- the mine yet?
- A. No, I don't believe. They may
- have --- I guess they were. Yeah, I
- believe they were.
- Q. Your first call with Mr.
- 11 Stemple or ---?
- 12 A. The one where he said we had a
- (k) order. I know they were out ---
- Q. At that time?
- A. --- at that time.
- ¹⁶ Q. Okay. So then you actually
- had three --- would I be correct in
- saying that you had three
- conversations with Mr. Stemple, three
- separate calls?
- 21 A. Yes, I would say.
- Q. And it was the one with the
- discussion of the (k) order, when you
- absolutely know that the One Left
- crew was out of the mine?

- ¹ A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What about whenever he asked
- you to provide him with a list of
- persons on the list, what about that?
- ⁵ A. I believe the One Left crew
- was on their way out, but I'm not
- ⁷ certain if they were out at that time
- 8 or not.
- ⁹ Q. Okay. The walkie-talkie that
- you have, ---
- A. Uh-huh (yes).
- Q. --- is that the same type of
- walkie-talkie that the men use
- underground in the sections?
- ¹⁵ A. No.
- Q. They're not?
- A. No. Mine's a handheld
- walkie-talkie. I mean, if I got on
- the same frequency as them, it's
- possible that we could talk.
- Q. Well, the two --- are you
- familiar with walkie-talkies, as far
- as appearance is concerned, with the
- men use underground on the sections?
- A. Yes.

- Q. Do they look the same?
- ² A. More or less, but theirs has a
- 3 microphone or a ---. It has a cord
- on it and similar to what the police
- ⁵ have, where you clip this little
- 6 microphone on your ---
- Q. Microphone, okay.
- ⁸ A. --- and they can talk. Now
- mine you've got to push a button on
- the side of it and talk into it.
- Q. They both have a flexible
- aerial on?
- A. Yes.
- Q. The ones underground and the
- one that you have do?
- A. Uh-huh (yes).
- Q. So then the only difference,
- in appearance, is one has a corded
- microphone?
- A. They have a cord, yes.
- Q. You don't happen to know the
- model number or anything like that,
- do you?
- A. No, sir, I don't.
- Q. But you know as far as the

- frequency is concerned, in that way
- they're different?
- 3 A. I would say they are. I mean,
- 4 I really don't know. The ones we
- have or that I carry has like three
- or four different frequencies on it.
- ⁷ Q. Okay.
- ⁸ A. But I have to be turned on a
- ⁹ certain frequency in order to talk to
- the people.
- Q. And just let me go through
- this one more time. And I apologize
- for doing this ---
- A. Okay.
- Q. --- another time, but ---.
- When the pager button on the mine
- phone, the pager phone underground,
- you can hear whenever --- as long as
- the pager button on that particular
- phone is held down?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. When that button is let go by
- the person underground, then you
